

On a sunny October afternoon a few weeks ago, garden club members Barbara Powell, Kay Mosley, Marvin Mosley and chauffeured by Maurine McCuin embarked on a rural excursion.

We were looking for various pods and foliage for future dried arrangements. We drove out the Caddo Peak road. The countryside was just beautiful. After having lived in Lubbock where it's so flat, (the only trees have to be planted); the lush foliage in the Cross Plains area is a vast and welcome relief to this writer. This particular day being mid-October multi-colored foliage was abundant and truly many hued; reds, yellows, variations of browns and yes, still quite a lot of greens.

Over hill, over dell we hit the dusty trails. Up the road, down the road, up the side of mini-cliffs, into shallow ditches, we climbed, slid, and leaned. Different florals, foliage and plants were pointed out to us by Mrs. McCuin, a longtime resident of this locale. Both Mrs. Powell and Mr. Mosley have only resided in the area less than five years. This writer lived in Cross Plains as a very small child and only returned three years ago after and absence of some 44 years.

We located and gathered yucca seed pods, and many various sizes of primrose pods, all to be soaked and some to be bleached for dried floral arrangements. We had an interesting, informative, and exhilarating excursion into the local countryside. Our most exciting "find" of the afternoon were several tall, green, very stiff leaves found growing straight up out of a piece of wood or tree root in a ditch. Spotted by this reporter the leaves resembled those of a live oak tree but were much larger, longer and extremely stiff in texture. Liberated from the side of the road by Marvin, and unidentifiable by any of us, the leaves were taken home by Barbara Powell for future study and possible use in flower arranging.

Next time you go for a drive in the country, if you spot three (3) little old ladies and a rotund recently transplanted country gentleman in a slow moving car, that's not us. We're four (4) energetic, exuberant, exhilarated Cross Plains Garden Club members scrambling over hill, over dell, up the cliff, down the glen, up the road, down the roo--o-ad-----.



Benefits of Cancer Drug Surpass Risks Women who take Tamoxifen to prevent breast cancer recurrence are likely to live longer than those who do not. Studies followed more than 20,000 women for 2 to 5 years. There was a 35% drop in deaths from recurrent breast cancer for those on the drug, reported Dr. Joseph Ragaz of the U. Of British Columbia. There is some evidence that Tamoxifen raises the risk of uterine cancer and blood clots, but the studies also showed the benefits of taking Tamoxifen out-weighed the risks. Basketball Begins




When the United States Congress first declared November as National Alzheimer's Disease Month, Alzheimer's was a little-known condition thought to be a normal part of the aging process. Thirteen years late, Alzheimer's disease has become the fourth leading cause of death among the elderly, the third most expensive disease to treat in the U.S., and a disease that on any given day controls the lives of four million Americans, among them a former U.S. president.

Over the last year, Alzheimer's disease has drawn greater attention for a number of reasons. On November 6, 1994, former President Ronald Reagan announced to the world that he is suffering from Alzheimer's disease, finally putting a familiar human face on this devastating illness. The myriad research breakthroughs made in the last few months have made international headlines and spurred new hope that a cause and a cure will soon be found. From the genetics of Alzheimer's disease to a possible new diagnostic test, modern science is moving ever closer to unraveling the mysteries surrounding this irreversible brain disorder. However, there is much work yet to be done.

This advisory on Alzheimer's disease, produced by the American Health Assistance Foundation (AHAF), has been provided to present readers with facts. NEWS FOR VETERANS

OUTPATIENT CLINIC---Several Veterans have been in or called this week regarding a letter from Cary Brown, Director of the Big Spring VA Medical Center. Mr. Brown's letter gives details about the new Abilene outpatient clinic. The letter included an enrollment form and you have ten days from the November 9 letter date to send the enrollment form back to Big Spring.

There are many questions about the clinic and some are not yet answered, especially about the opening date!! Following are some questions that do have answers:

Q-Who is eligible for care?

A-Same eligibility rules apply for veterans being seen at the VA Medical Center. Additionally, a medical determination will be made by the VA to ensure that the CPCC is capable of providing required care.

Q-How does a veteran become enrolled in the CPCC?

A-Eligible veterans seen in FY 1995 at the Big Spring VA Medical Center will be sent a letter asking them if they want to enroll in the Abilene CPCC. If you do not receive a letter by December 1, 1995, you must contact Medical Administration Service at the Big Spring VA Medical Center for eligibility determination. Call 915/264-

Q-Will the CPCC provide care for

A-No. For convenience of the veterans, operation of the clinic will be most efficient by having a scheduled appointment. This is not designed to be a walk-in clinic.

Q-Will emergencies be seen and A-No. The CPCC is not equipped or

staffed for this type of care.

Q-Can a veteran receive beneficiary travel for a scheduled appointment?

A .- Yes, if eligible. The claim must be submitted to the VA Medical Center for

Q-Will a veteran who lives outside the following counties: Taylor, Nolan, Callahan - be authorized primary care? A-No. Not immediately. Will be reviewed at a later date.

O-Does a veteran have to make a copayment for medications and/or outpatient visit?

A-Yes. Same eligibility rules apply for veterans being seen at the VA Medical

Q-Will dental care be provided?

A-No. Care will be provided to eligible veterans at the VA Medical Center.

Q-Can a veteran have medications filled without seeing a health care

provider? A-No. Quality of care standards dictate a clinical professional review of each case to determine medication

Q-Can a veteran receive specialty

A-No. Not at the CPCC. Veterans will be given appointments at the VA Medical Center.

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

ABILENE AREA PECAN SHOW NOVEMBER 17


