REPENTANCE

Since the fall of man, Gen. 3 great emphasis has been placed upon repentance. All faithful men entrusted with God's message have preached repentance. Ancient Nineveh "repented at the preaching of Jonah," Mt. 12:41. John the Baptist preached repentance, Mt. 3:2. Christ called for people to "Repent for the kingdom of God is at hand," Mt. 4:17. The parting charge of Christ to the apostles called for repentance and remission of sins to be preached among all nations, Lk. 24:47.

Rejecting the route of repentance, the road to ruin is the only alternative. Jesus said, "Except ye repent ye shall all likewise perish," Lk. 13:3. This fatal alternative should prompt us to learn what repentance is. Some think they have repented when they really haven't. We must not be misled; we cannot guess at the matter.

WHAT REPENTANCE IS NOT

Repentance is not merely being sorry for sin. Although sorrow is indispensable to repentance, if it stands alone it is not repentance. One may be sorry because he was caught in sin, and because of the possible penalty for that sin yet not repent. Herod, for example, was "exceedingly sorry" for the promise he made to Salome when he heard her request, Mk 6:26, but that was not repentance. He proceeded to have John the Baptist beheaded.

Conviction of sin is not repentance. Like sorrow, it is necessary. The sinner must realize his lost condition before he can repent. The powerful preaching of Peter on Pentecost convicted many of his listeners of sin. "Now when they heard this, they were pricked in their hearts and said unto Peter and the rest of the apostles, Men and brethren what shall we do?" Ac. 2:37. They were convicted of sin, but had not repented. The next verse states they were to "repent and be baptized" for the remission of sins. Conviction is not repentance; it precedes repentance.

WHAT REPENTANCE IS

Repentance is a change of will. In Mt. 21:28-29, Jesus said, "What think ye? A certain man had two sons; and he came to the first, and said, Son, go work today in my vineyard. He answered and said, I will not; but afterward he repented and went." Between the time the son said he would not go and the time he went, repentance took place. He changed his will and made an about face. Jesus called this repentance. Thus repentance is a change of will that results in a change of action.

Sinner friend, won't you change your will concerning sin?

While the regulations and guidelines adopted recently by the Postal Service are detailed they boil down to several basic steps that can help assure safe delivery.

First select a strong carton. Use a fiberboard box with the "burst-test" number printed on it.

If the box says, for instance, 125 pounds it can be used for mailing many types of merchandise weighing up to 20 pounds.

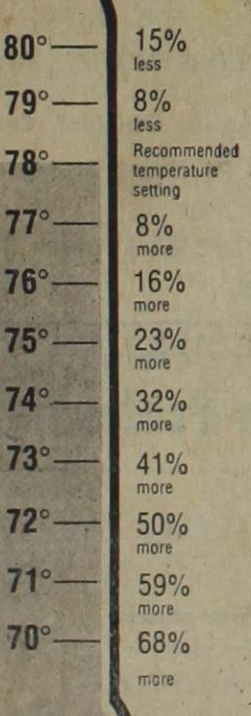
