## Poor Grain Harvest Ending In Locality

The small grain harvest in the Cross Plains area will probably be completed this week if the weather remains good.

The extremely light crop is estimated by some observers to be about one-quarter of a normal year. Glenn Winfrey, local grain buyer, said Tuesday that the harvest was probably about a quarter or less of what it was last year.

He has bought some wheat, and other producers have de-

cidied to store the grain for seed next year.

Tuesday number one wheat was selling for \$2.80 per bushel, down from the \$3.00 at the start of the harvest. That is a better price than last year, Winfrey explained, but there simply wasn't much grain made this year.

Yield is low this year with averages running from three to 17-18 bushels per acre. In most instances grade also suffers ranging from low to medium standards.

Many grain fields were not harvested this year for various reasons. Dry weather and lack of pasturage encouraged some farmer-stockmen to graze instead of cutting them.

There were isolated pockets of good grain crops, depending upon timely rain showers and condition of land the crops were on.

One observer stated that overall 1978 was a bad year for small grain producers in the Cross Plains area.

## Youth Known Here Named All-American Team Hurler

Ron Meridith, nephew of Rev. and Mrs. Knox Waggoner has been honored by being selected to the College Baseball Coaches' All-American Team as a pitcher.

He has pitched the past two seasons at Oral Roberts University at Tulsa, Okla., and he has practically re-written the school's pitching record book while leading his team to a third place ranking among the larger college Division I of the N.C.A.A.

Ron's record this season is 14-1 with the only loss being a 3-2 verdict to Texas A&M University. He has posted an earned run average of 1.69 for the season, and has registered a total of 110 strikeouts. His four-year won-loss record (including two seasons at Golden West Junior College in California) is 45 wins and 4 losses. His last game was a four-hit shutout of North Carolina in the College World Series in

Omaha, Neb., last week. The ORU Titans won by an 11-0 score. This game was witnessed by Rev. and Mrs. Waggoner and Charles Waggoner, all of Cottonwood, who drove to Omaha to attend the game.

Ron pitched one summer in the Big Country Senior Teenage league where he led the Clyde Hawks to the league championship. He was coached that year by his uncle, Knox Waggoner. Ron finished the 1978 season as the left-handed pitcher with the best record in the nation among the colleges and universities.

He has been drafted to play professional baseball with the Houston Astros, but at this writing he has not signed nor has he been assigned to a minor league team.

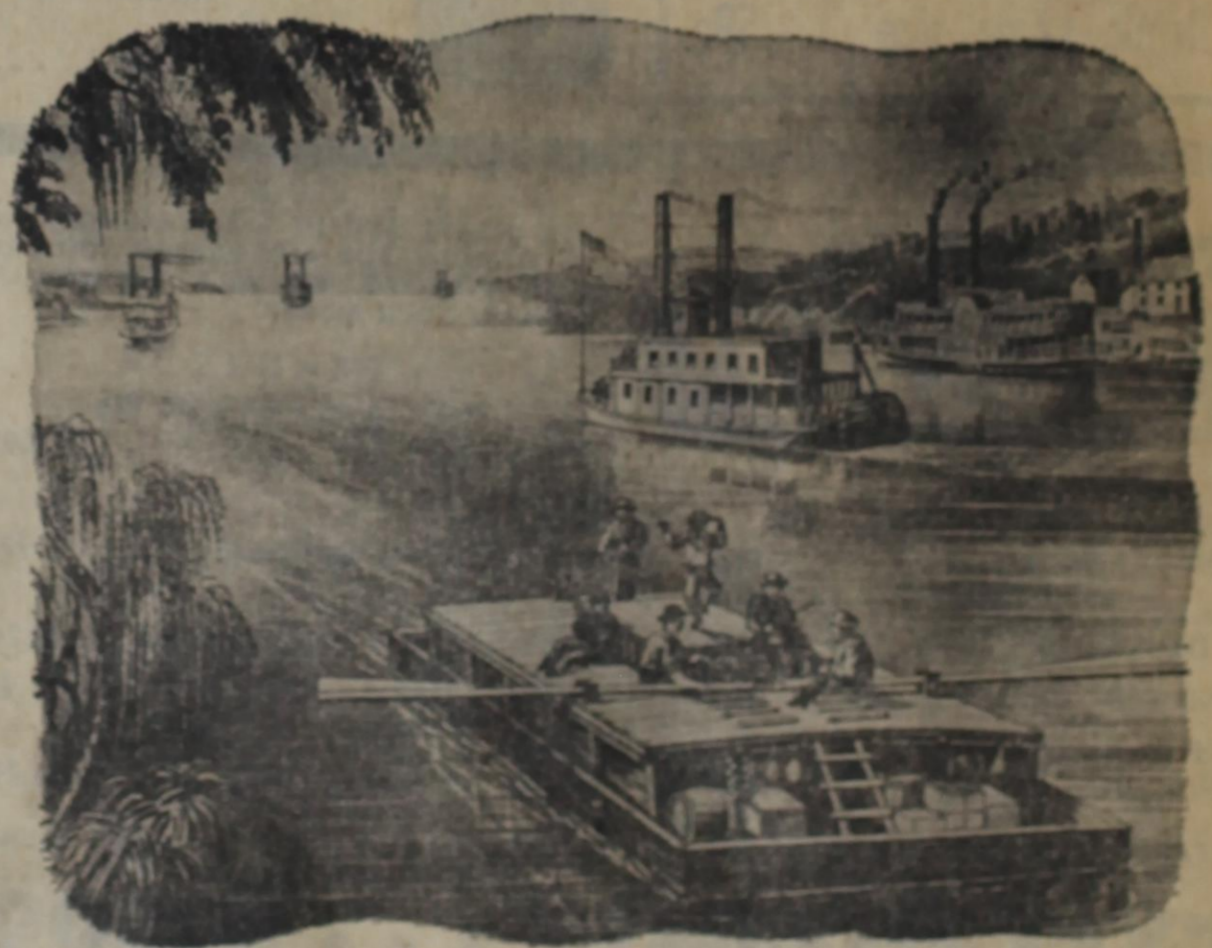
