2 County FM Roads Due Work In Project

State Highway and Public Transportation Commission has approved a \$70.5-million program to improve safety and to protect the public's investment in 3,766 miles of state-maintained highway facilities.

The program is the 1979 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program. It includes work in every part of the state.

In all, 566 projects are proposed in 193 of Texas' counties. Work on the program is divided about equally between state and US-numbered highways and Farm to Market Roads.

The program includes such work as resurfacing, widening, base repair and strengthening and spot safety improvements.

District Engineer Roger G. Welsh said the amount of work in the Abilene District under the 1979 Program will total approximately \$1.9 million and will be a protective seal coat which is an overlay of asphalt aggregate.

Work in Callahan County is included in the program Welsh stated. Projects to receive the seal coat include: FM 880 from IH 20 to Shackelford County Line for a total of 11.4 miles and FM 2228 from IH 20 to FM 880 total of 13.9 miles.

County Farmers Are Asked To Certify Crop Acreages

All Callahan County farmers are asked to certify their 1978 planted acreage, set-aside, diversion and other program acreages with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office, Oran Bains of Cross Plains, Chairperson of the county ASCS Committee, said.

"Certification is the procedure by which farmers report their 1978 program acreages as accurately as possible to insure their eligibility for receiving the benefits of price support and disaster, deficiency, diversion, or grazing and haying payments," Bains said.

In Callahan County the final certification date for program crops is July 15 for cotton and grain sorghum.

Bains added that growers not participating in the set-aside programs should report their acreages to insure the opportunity to fully participate in future programs.

After certification the ASCS county office will select farms at random for a visit and acreage measurements.

Farmers who grow marketing quota crops, peanuts, should continue to report their acreages as in the past years, with August 1st being the final date. This crop will not be affected by set-aside or other program requirements, it was explained.

Searing Sun Burns Cross Plains Area

A searing sun is turning the Cross Plains section of Texas into a scorched land of dead and dying vegetation void of watering holes.

Temperatures of above the 100 degree mark have become commonplace during the past several days. It was 103 in Abilene Monday, and at least 100 daily for the past week.

Cross Plains area crops, pastures, gardens and lawns are wilting and burning under the heat wave fanned by moderate southerly winds which help make the heat bearable.

Large amounts of moisture is needed immediately if some crops and gardens are to be saved.

Cross Plains is using an average of 300,000 gallons of water daily. It was stated by city officials Monday that there is no plan to limit water usage immediately, but if the consumption continues at pumping capacity indefinitely, a limitation may have to be implemented.

L. D. Brown Resigns Local Deputy Sheriff's Position

L. D. Brown has resigned as Callahan County Deputy Sheriff stationed in Cross Plains effective July 1.

Brown stated that he is leaving the position here with reservations. "I believe in this job, and have enjoyed being deputy here, as I enjoy law enforcement work," he added. "The reason that I am leaving is simply a matter of economics".

Brown has served as Callahan County Deputy Sheriff in Cross Plains since December 1976, having assumed the position vacated by J. H. Cox.

The Brown family will continue to make their home in Cross Plains. Brown stated that he will begin employment with Southwestern Gas Pipeline Co. in the near future. The company's home office is in Mineral Wells, but the local man will be stationed here.

Brown stated that he hopes that the public will continue to support whoever is named to fill the deputy's place in Cross Plains. He stated that he sincerely appreciated the help and cooperation he received during his tenure here.

A spokesman in the Sheriff's Office at Baird said on Monday afternoon that interviews are continuing seeking a replacement for Brown. Sheriff Bill Skinner was out of town on business at that time and not immediately available for comment.

Police Chief Is Hurt In Affray On Friday

Cross Plains Police Chief Jim Greener was injured about 10:30 p.m. Friday while attempting to break up a quarrel reportedly between Kenny Bates, 19, and another youth, a juvenile, both of Cross Plains.

Greener was rushed to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene by local ambulance. He was placed in intensive care unit there where he remained until Monday when he was moved to Room 706-B. Word received here Tuesday morning indicated that he was improving from the head injuries, reported as a fractured skull, but is still considered to be critical.

Charged in the incident is

Mitchell set bond of \$5,000 on each count, and Bates was placed in jail, being transported to Baird the next day. Bates made bond Monday and was released from Callahan County Jail.

Callahan Deputy Brown stated that investigation into the occurrence is continuing.

Apparently Greener was attempting to quite a disturbance between Bates and a juvenile when injured. It happened in the Bryant Addition near East end of Fred Tunnell Street. Greener was not on duty at the time of the quarrel.

Reportedly during the altercation, Bates attempted to get into his car and leave, and Greener was thought to have been injured when the Bates car struck a culvert on Avenue A, near the R. C. Merryman home, several yards from the fight site. It is reported that Bates left the scene, and was later arrested by Brown, Reynolds, Brown and Gosnell arrived at the site a few minutes after the crash.

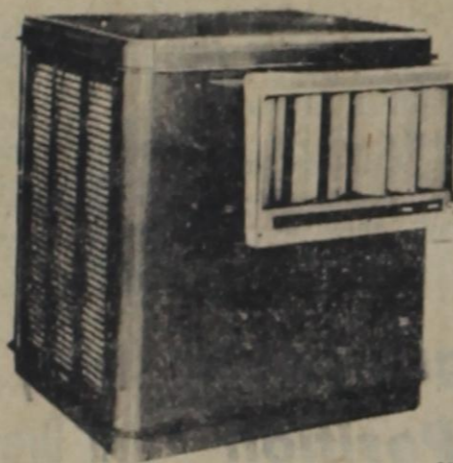

ORDINANCE NO. 6-A
AN ORDINANCE PERTAINING TO LIVESTOCK BEING KEPT WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS, PROPERTY UPON WHICH VIOLATIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE OCCUR WILL BE DECLARED A NUISANCE: PROVIDING A PENALTY:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS, that in order to protect the life, health and general welfare of the citizens of Cross Plains, it is deemed necessary to promulgate rules and regulations pertaining to livestock being kept in the city limits of Cross Plains, Texas.

In such areas of the City where livestock are being kept and two or more adjacent property owners object to the livestock being kept there, a complaint should be registered with the City Council of Cross Plains, such complaints should be in writing and signed with the signatures of the complainants. The Council will then call a meeting of the persons involved, and if the problem cannot be resolved, then the livestock will be removed by request of the City Council after due notice to the offending party.

In any quarters, such as stables, pens and yards, where livestock are being kept within the city limits, it shall be the law that a clean sanitary condition exists.

THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE SHALL CONSTITUTE A MISDEMEANOR, and any person convicted of such violation thereof shall be fined not to exceed \$200.00. Each day such livestock are kept after due notice shall be considered a separate offense and a fine levied for each day of the violation. **READ, PASSED, and ADOPTED THIS 20 DAY OF JUNE 1978.**

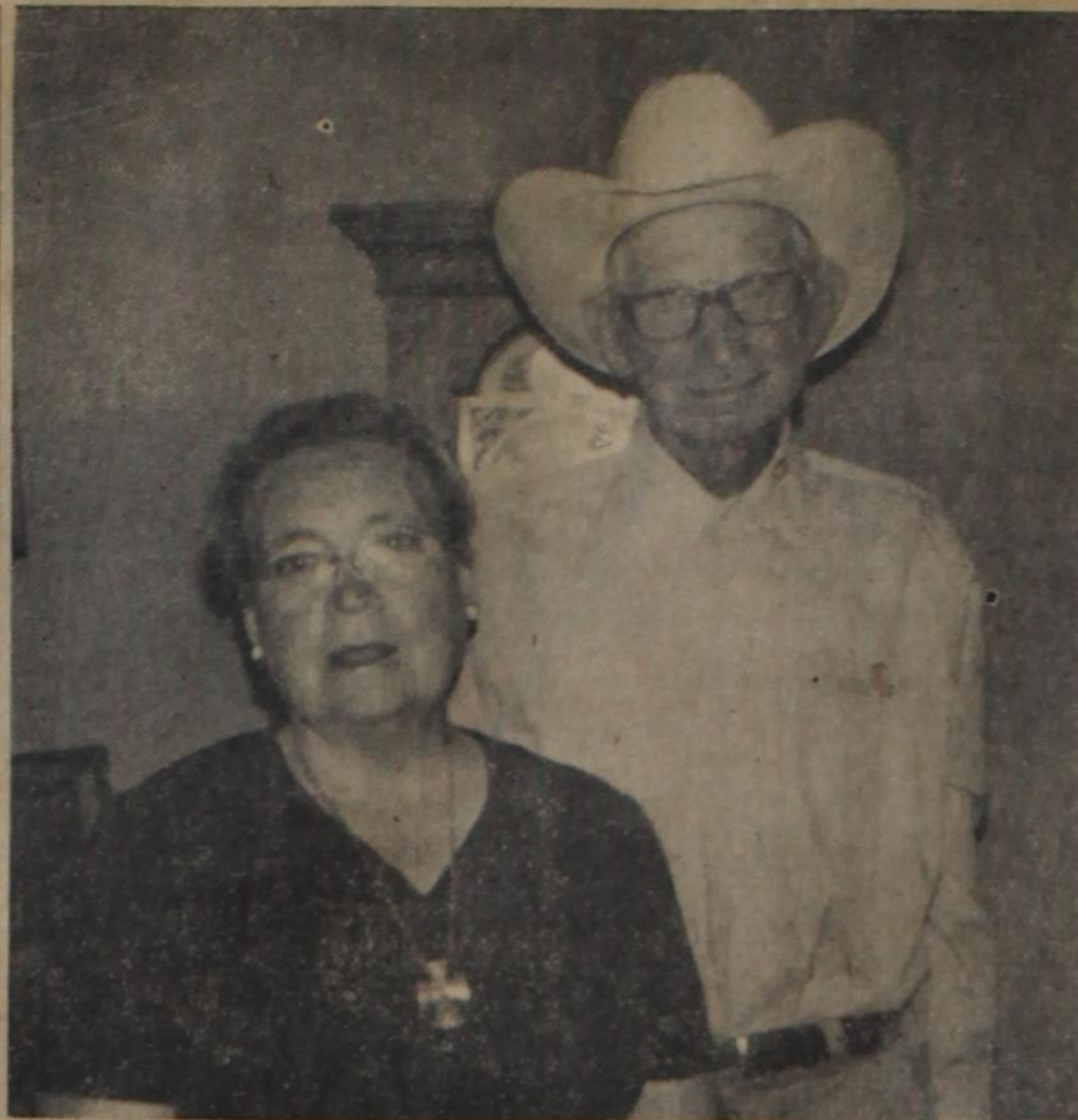
