

Town Meeting Planned Here On Monday Night

Citizens of Cross Plains will participate in a statewide program called Town Meeting: Texas Monday, March 27. Scheduled to take place at the Cross Plains City Hall from 7 to 10 p.m., the meeting will be a workshop in which citizens discuss how they can work together to make improvements in their community. The Cross Plains meeting will be hosted by O. B. Edmondson, mayor. All residents are invited to attend, and representatives

from other towns in the county will also be welcomed.

The Town Meeting is a civic event, in which participants decide the basic challenges facing their community. The meeting is an example of a new kind of public forum that gives everyone the opportunity to fully participate it was explained.

In the last two years, meetings have taken place in 185 Texas communities in 148 countries.

The program is endorsed by Gov. Dolph Briscoe and a statewide committee of 60 business and professional people. In his letter, Briscoe says, "I am pleased to encourage the citizens of our state to participate in Town Meetings."

Town Meetings: Texas is a program being offered by the Institute of Cultural Affairs, a private, not-for-profit association of concerned citizens. The entire effort is staffed by volunteers.

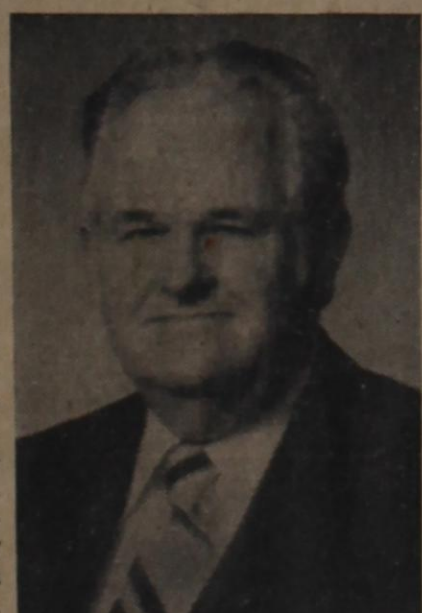

Ceremony, Plaque Honors Trooper Sammy C. Long

A bronze plaque in tribute to the late Sammy Charles Long, Texas Department of Public Safety trooper and son of Mrs. Norrel (Zelda) Long and the late Mr. Long of Cross Plains, was dedicated in ceremonies in the corridor of the Upton County Courthouse in Rankin Friday, March 3.

Long, an 18-year veteran of the DPS, was killed in the line of duty near Rankin in November 1976 was a native of Cross Plains and was well known here. He was stationed at McCamey for the entire 18 years of his association with the DPS.

The ceremonies were attended by Long's widow, Martha, and their son, Tracy, of McCamey, his mother, Mrs. Zelda Long of this city and his brother and wife, Mr. and Mrs. N. L.

Long of Brownwood. An array of Upton County officials and DPS officers and three partners of Long's also attended.

The plaque is patterned after the DPS emblem, it is reported.

Long was patrolling alone when he pursued a pickup, and was later slain by the driver, identified as Larry Darnell Ewers of Waco. A San Angelo deer hunter, who witnessed the killing, within moments felled the assailant at a distance of 150 yards. The hunter's name has not been made public.

Accompanying the bronze plaque honoring Long was a poem written by Weems S. Dykes, pastor of the First Christian Church at McCamey, which praised Long and his service to his family, community and the DPS.

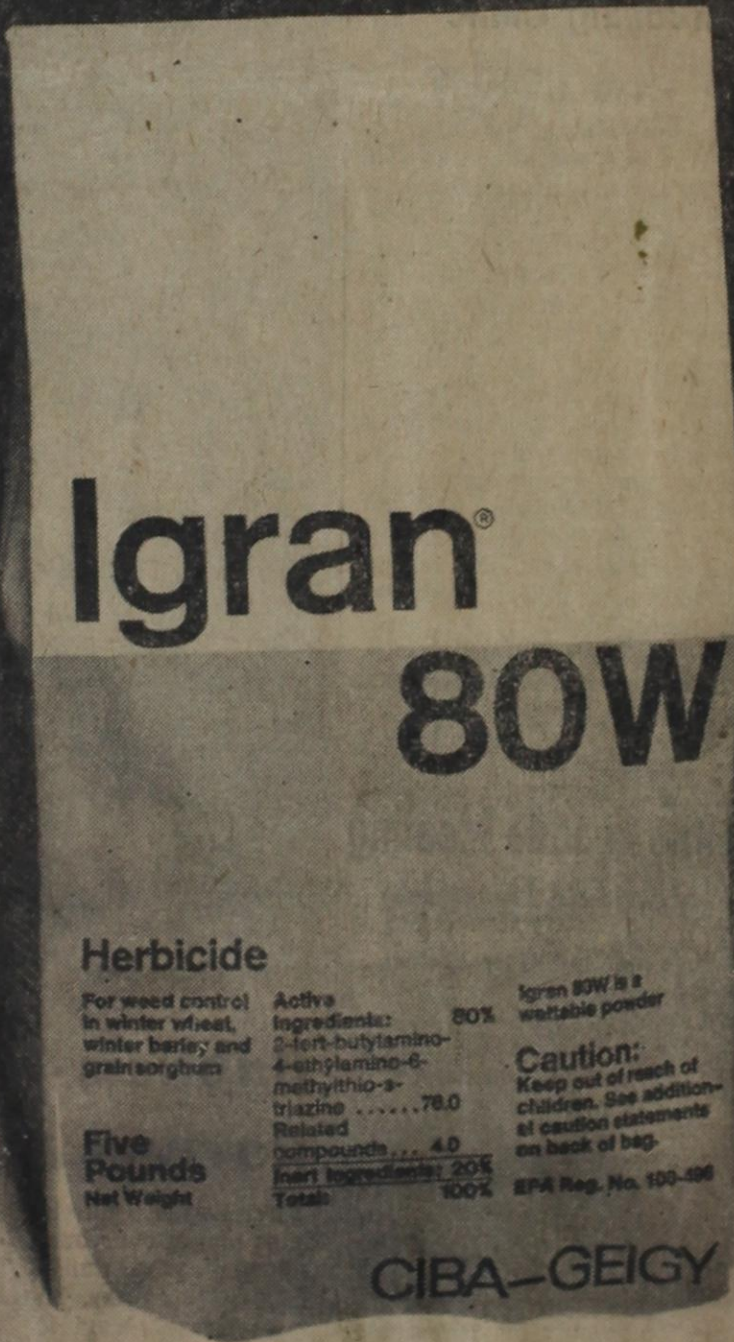

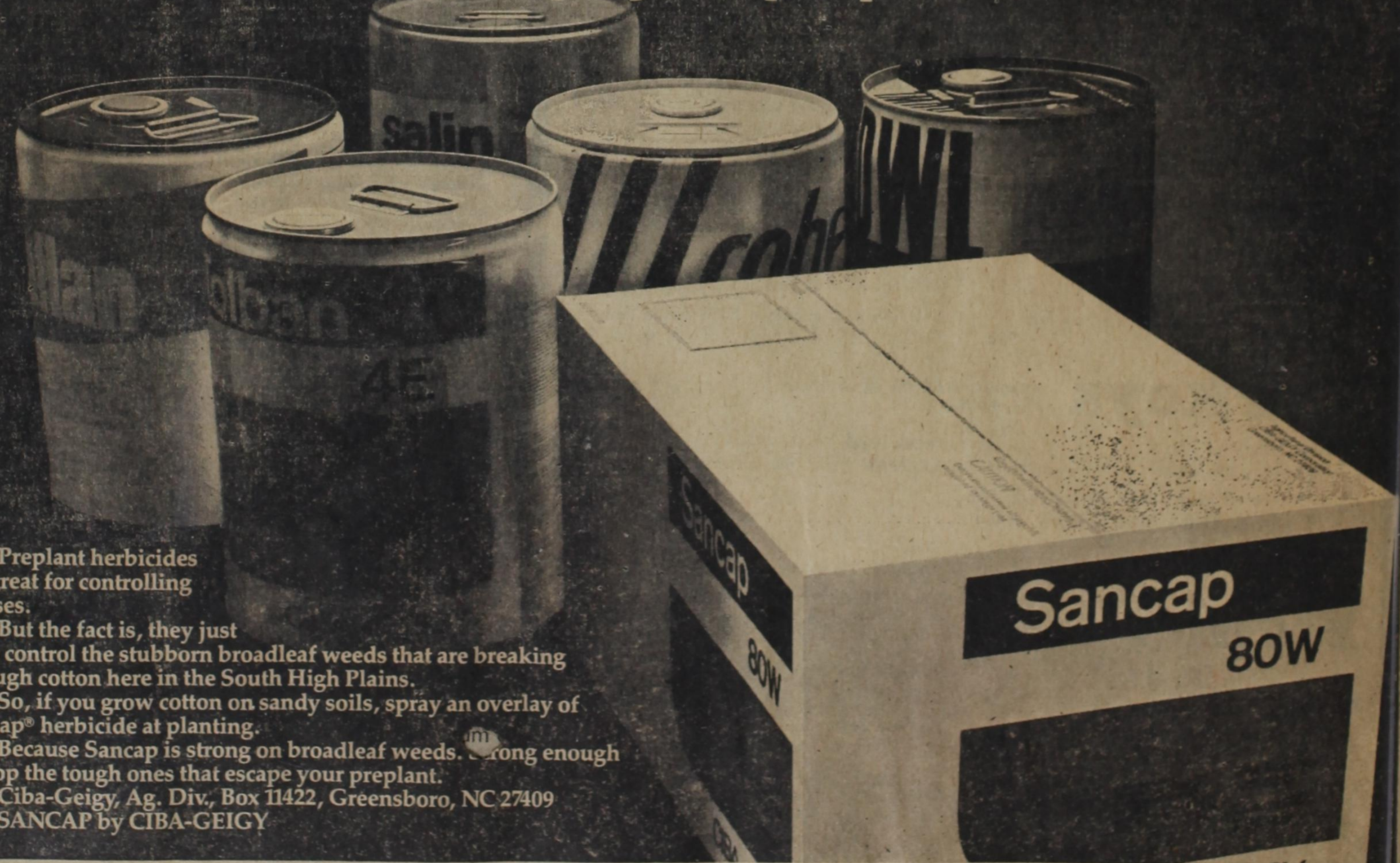
