## Farmers Advised To Sign For Set-Aside

"Even those Callahan County farmers who may still be undecided about planting a set-aside crop in 1978 should sign up in the set-aside program," Oran Bains of Cross Plains, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee said.

Bains said: "There's no penalty if set-aside participants decide not to plant a program crop, such as barley, wheat, corn, or grain sorghum. But, by signing up there is an assurance of program benefits for farmers who decide to plant set-aside crops."

The sign-up period ends on May 1. The program calls for taking out of production one acre for every ten (10 per cent) planted to barley, corn or grain sorghum and two acres (20 per cent) for every ten planted to wheat for grain.

Farmers who participate will be eligible for price support loans, target price and disaster payments. To receive more detailed information and to sign up, farmers should come to the county ASCS office in Baird.

Applicants for ASCS programs will be given equal consideration without regard to race, color, sex, creed or national origin.

# School, City Elections Set At City Hall On Saturday

Cross Plains Independent School District and City of Cross Plains voters will go to the polls Saturday, April 1, to name three school board members and select a mayor and two city councilmen.

Both elections will be held in the City Hall, and polls in both instances will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Mrs. Bill (Katy) Kilgore will serve as judge for the city balloting, and Alton E. Hornsby will be the judge for the school voting.

Both reminded voters that the new registration cards will be required, and those wishing to cast ballots Saturday are urged to have them ready to present the clerks. The new cards are tan or yellow in color.

Eight candidates are seeking three places on the school board. Three persons are asking election to a one-year term to fill the unexpired term of Dr. Carl J. Sohns, who resigned in February after serving 17 years. In the order names will appear on the ballot they are Charles H. Payne, Thomas S. Ames and Merlin Franke.

Five aspirants are asking a pair of three-year tenures. Terms of Don Harris and Dwayne Wilson are expiring. They won one-year unexpired terms last year. The order in which names of those candidates will appear on the ballot are Dwayne Wilson, Robert Dale Watson, Don Harris, Benny R. Glover and Reggy Stover. Watson, Glover and Stover are seeking initial terms.

There are no contests in the city balloting. Mayor O. B. Edmondson is unopposed in asking a first full two-year term after winning a one-year unexpired term in 1977.

Seeking the two aldermen seats are W. G. (Wimpy) McCoy and James R. Le May. McCoy is the incumbent, having been appointed a few months ago to finish the term of Alvin Hutchins who resigned upon moving out of the city limits. Le May is asking a first two-year term. T. T. (Nick) Nichols, other incumbent did not choose to run again.

Voters in Commissioner Precinct 4 in Callahan County may also vote in the Callahan County School Trustee election. Sterling

Odom of Rowden is the only candidate on the ballot. Also running for re-election is L. G. Wallick, Precinct 1, of the Eula area.

Holdover members of the county board are Maurice Atwood of Oplin, Precinct 2, president of the board; Ben L. Russell, Jr. of Baird Precinct 3, and James Brisce of Clyde, county at-large.

## Clyde Naval Officer On Pacific Duty

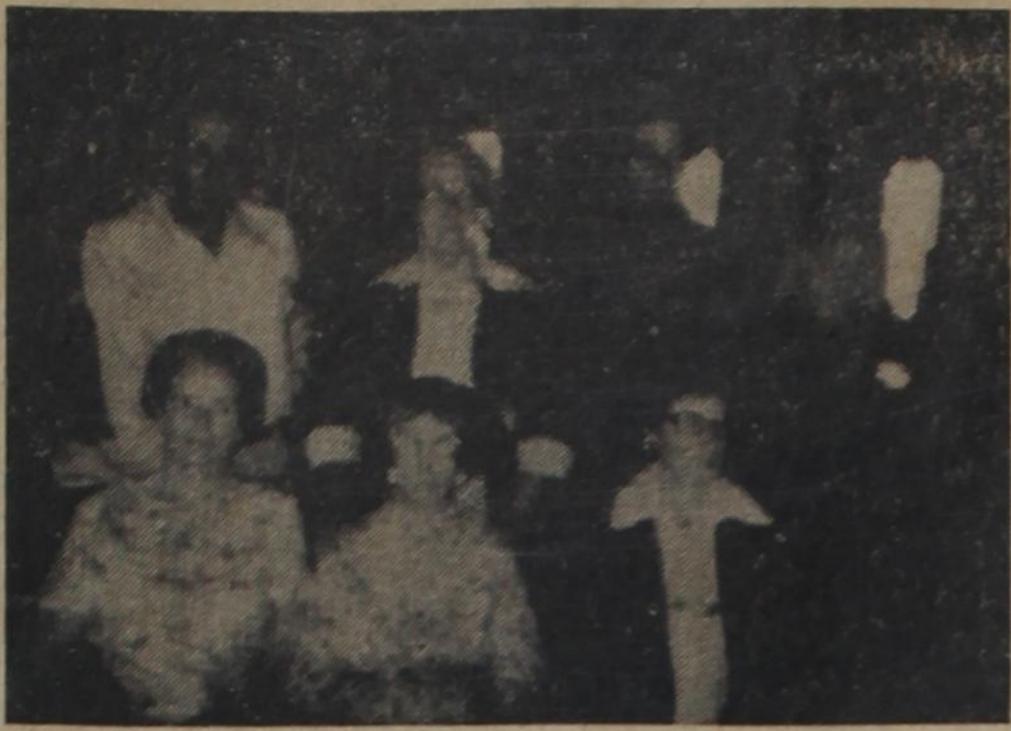

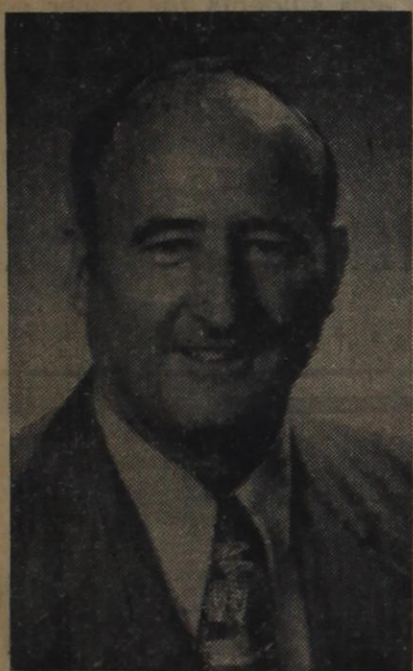
