## Retirement Brings WTU New District Managers

# County Helps Local Ambulance Service

Cross Plains Mayor O. B. Edmondson and local Ambulance Committee representatives Jim Greener and Sharon Watson, appeared before Callahan County Commissioners Court with a request for financial assistance

in the operation of the Cross Plains Emergency Medical Service Ambulance.

It was reported that by unanimous vote of the commissioners, M. D. Ellis, Lowell Johnson, F. P. (Jiggs) Shackelford and E.

F. (Franzel) Odom, the ambulance budget was accepted in its entirety and they agreed to stand behind the ambulance service for the city and area.

Mayor Edmondson explained that the action taken by the Callahan County Commissioners Court and the Cross Plains City Council in establishing the Emergency Medical Service ambulance is another step for the future development and growth of Cross Plains to provide the citizens with better service.

The ambulance service is operated 24 hours daily through the police department at the number 725-6666 or 725-6114.

The ambulance itself was given to the City of Cross Plains by Higginbotham Bros. & Co. organization more than a year ago. Only requirement was that it be used to provide emergency ambulance service to the community.

The vehicle, and its equipment which was also donated by Higginbothams, recently passed inspection guidelines of state agencies.

Greener, local Chief of Police, is the ambulance service coordinator, and Mrs. Shirley Emmons is the assistant. Other members of the committee include Mrs. Watson, W. G. (Wimpy) McCoy and Mike McClure.

A meeting was held Monday night of those persons in this area who are interested in taking a 40 hour Emergency Care Attendant course to be taught in Cross Plains.

Greener announced that the course, which will be taught by an instructor from Ranger Junior College, will begin with registration on Monday, May 15. Assisting in the school, open to all who wish to take the course and will help in the ambulance service, will be Gordon Craig who is with the Texas Department of Public Health.

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## Local Elderly May Get Help On Winter's Bills

Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., headquartered in Coleman, has received a grant from the Community Services Administration to be used to assist the elderly poor people in an eight county area who were unable to pay all of their bills last winter because of their very limited income, and because of the high cost of utilities.

Those eligible to apply for assistance must be 60 years of age, or older, must meet poverty guidelines, and must show a need for assistance.

Those who qualify may receive some help on paying such back bills as groceries, utilities, doctor bills, dental bills, drug bills, emergency repairs on houses, overdue rent, and temporary shelter. In some cases, AFDC recipients, or other poor people, who meet poverty guidelines

might qualify for help.

In Callahan County, those heads of households who think that they may be eligible should contact Mrs. Maxine Dimitri at the Multi-Purpose Center immediately at 8th & Beech in Cross Plains. Her phone number is 725-7698.

Persons making applications must bring Social Security number, proof of income, and a copy of bills to attach to the application.

It was emphasized that no application can be taken after Friday, April 28, at 5 p.m.

If additional information is needed, persons may call Mrs. Dimitri at the Multi-Purpose Center.

It was pointed out that funds are limited, and applications will be screened. Those deemed most need will be certified for assistance, it was stated.

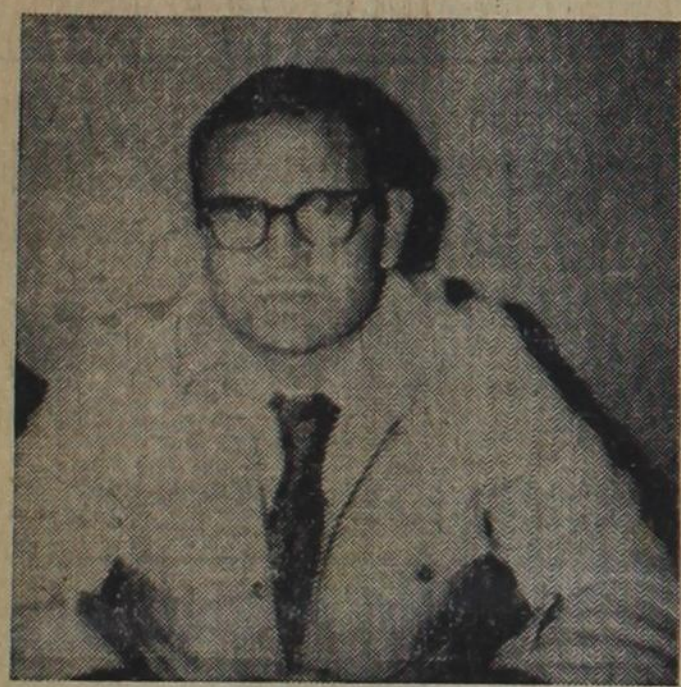

JESUS SAID, "REMEMBER ME"

Please read: Lk. 22:14-20 and 1 Cor. 11:23-30.

We do not want to be forgotten. We erect marble monuments at the graves of our loved ones. And how mistaken we are when we stamp on them, "Gone, but not forgotten!" That is true only for a while. Eventually even that marble slab will go back to the dust. Like David, we sometimes fear that we will be forgotten. He said, "I am forgotten, as a dead man" Ps. 31:12. Jesus, both human and divine, wanted to be remembered and instituted that memorial supper to help us to remember him.

Man wants to be remembered, but how much more important it is that he remember God and His Son! And God helps man to remember. He gave the Jews and annual feast in which they remembered his mercies as they left Egypt, Ex. 12. When Jesus came he fulfilled that law and became our Passover, 1 Cor. 5:7. It was altogether fitting that as he observed that Jewish Passover for the last time (and the last time it was ever scripturally kept) that he gave to his apostles (and to us) a new memorial — a weekly feast which enables man to remember Jesus forever. By command, "do this in memory of me", Lk. 22:19; and by divine example, "And upon the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread . . ." Acts 20:7, we are taught that this new memorial is a weekly feast.
