The Burkett water supply has been a very serious issue here the past several months. The rain we got a few weeks ago helped, but the amount gained has been used up. Members of our Burkett Water Supply Board have worked hard, including Jack Strickland, Bill Davee, Ebb Jennings, L. E. Mountain, D. A. Boyle, Ed Rasbury, J. L. Golson, W. V. Adams, Leonard Long and C. H. Barnett, however, two of them along with the others have resigned for personal reasons but they, along with the others, have done everything to keep the water flowing through the lines. They have completed two shallow wells along the Bayou bank that has been supplying water for the past several weeks, but they are weakening. These men are now having a deep large hole dredged, out with a drag line and sinking a large plume in the water-laden gravel and a pump will be connected with it that they have hopes will furnish water for some time, that is, as long as the gravel contains water. In the meantime the water board directors have asked everyone to conserve what water we have by using it for household use only. They urge everyone to comply with this request strictly until they lift the ban.

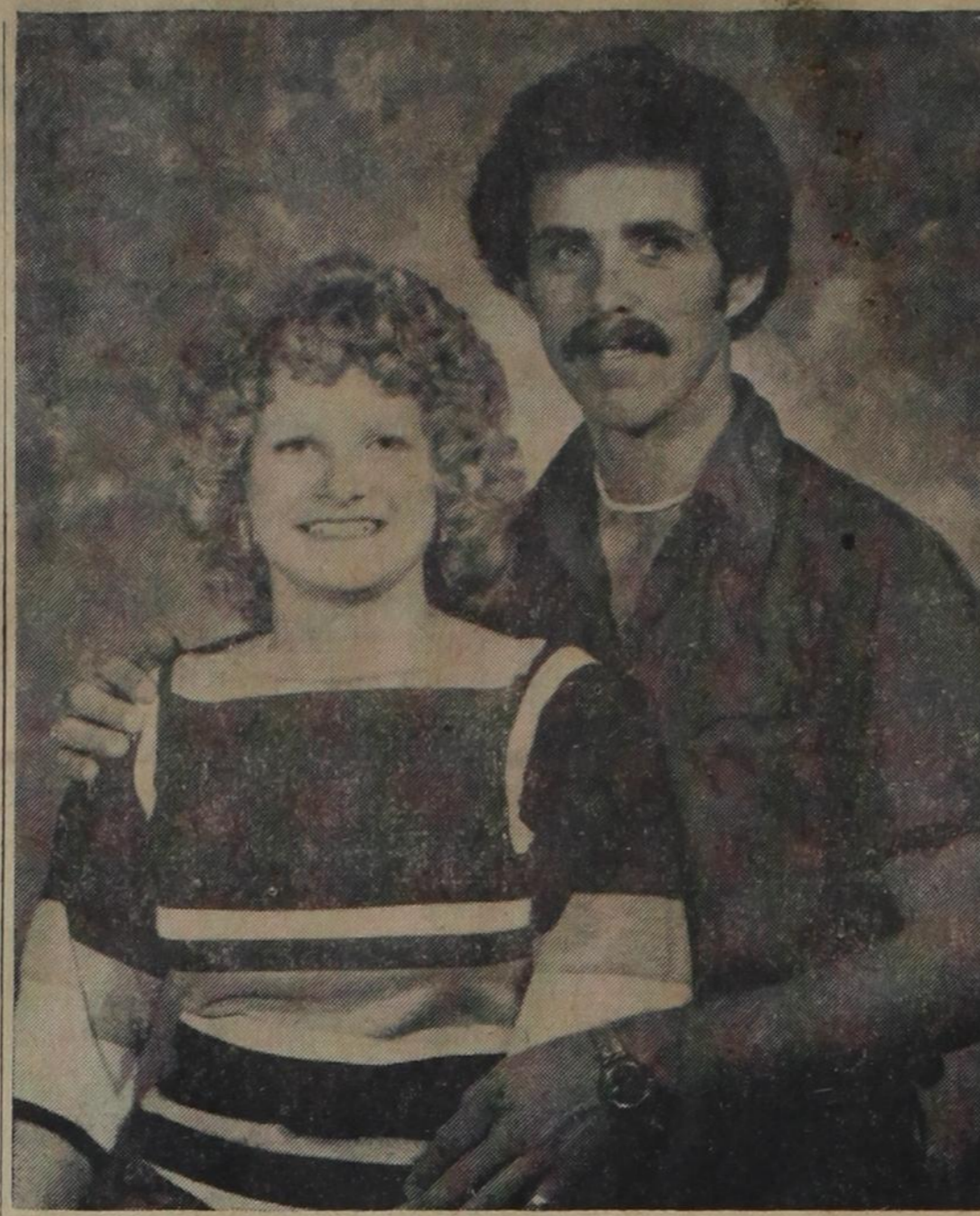

LOCAL AND COTTONWOOD OIL TRYS TERMED DUSTERS

Two oil projects, a wildcat north of Cross Plains and a regular field test at Cottonwood have been abandoned as dry holes.

No. 1 Jim Barr, drilled by MDH Oil — Gas Co., two miles northwest of Cross Plains spotted 2,467 feet from the south and 1,876 feet from the east lines of Walter Converse Survey 333. It was a wildcat venture and was drilled to 4,100 feet.

Local Males Said 34 Tons Overweight; Now Taller

What Callahan County residents weigh, on average, and what they should weigh for proper health, are two different things, it appears.

While the problem is a general one, it is particularly evident in the male segment of the population. Men are considerably heavier now than in former years. Much of their extra poundage has been accumulated in the last decade or two.

To meet the "desirable weight" standards recommended by medical authorities and insurance companies, the local male population over age 18 would have to shed some 68,000 pounds (around 4 tons.)

As for the women, they have been gaining, too. But not to the same extent. They have made more of an effort to stay slim.

Fashion has a great deal to do with it. When style dictates a slender look, they proceed to diet and reduce.

By the same token, local people have been getting taller, year by year. The average Callahan County man has added 7/10ths of an inch to his height since 1960, the figures indicate. He is now slightly over 5 feet 9 inches tall, without shoes.

Local women have also been growing. They now top 5 feet 3 1/2 inches, which is about half an inch more than before. Assumed is that the general national rate applies locally.

The findings are based upon a new sample survey conducted

by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare Survey.

A comparison of the two studies shows that the average man over age 18 has put on more than six pounds during that period and now weighs 172 pounds.

Applied locally, it means that area men in that age group are 18,000 pounds heavier than they would have been in 1960.

As for the women, despite their greater concern with weight, they now average 143 pounds, which is three pounds more than in 1960.

For Callahan County's female population over age 18, the overall increase amounts to 10,000 pounds.

What to do about it? The experts say that the best way to cut down is to step up physical activity and to make a permanent change in eating habits.

1. Put in the address

2. Put in the phone number
Many readers will call you but will not find it convenient to come to your home or business.
3. Avoid use of blind boxes
Avoid them if possible. They are difficult to answer and people prefer to deal directly.
4. Put in the price, by all means
Surveys show that many people will not answer an ad unless the price is given.
5. Keep the readers from guessing
On important details it is better to include them if they are relevant to a sale.
6. Be available
If you advertise your phone and address, be sure you are not absent when the ad appears so as to accommodate the reader.
