Governor Bill Clements, in his official proclamation, urged the people of Texas to "give special recognition to the constructive and responsible roles of agricultural cooperatives in the economic progress of our State."

"Texas has more than 440 cooperatives operating and serving over 133,000 members", according to Bruno Schroeder, Executive Vice-President of the Texas Federation of Cooperatives. "These

cooperatives are doing business volume of almost two billion dollars annually", he said.

Cooperatives in Texas range from farmer-owned gins, elevators and compresses to marketing, supply and credit organizations. Health, housing, insurance electric, telephone and other service cooperatives are becoming more and more important to all Texas citizens.

"Cooperative Month", said Schroeder, "is a good way to remind the people of Texas just how important cooperatives are to our well-being."

City Council Denies Claim Submitted By Waldrop

The Baird City Council met Monday night, September 22nd, at 7:00 P.M. in the City Hall.

The council's first order of business was to act on the claim submitted to the council by Royce Waldrop. The council denied the claim based on advice from the city attorney and a 1978 U.S. Supreme Court decision stating that Utility Co.'s may terminate service for non-payment of just bills and that notification by mail constituted due process.

In 1976, Baird was surveyed by HUD and found to be a flood hazard in some areas. Since this was the decision, the council adopted a flood plain management plan to enable those people living in flood hazard areas to qualify for subsidized flood insurance. This plan also removes sanctions which would have prevented loan guarantees by the VA and FHA for houses in the flood hazard area.

The next item on the agenda was the

presentation of the budget, by the mayor, along with a brief explanation of the major items for council consideration. A public hearing on the proposed budget will be held Monday the 29th at 7:00 P.M. at the City Hall.

The council also held an executive session to discuss the proposed restructuring of city personnel. After a lengthy discussion the meeting was reopened to the public and the council adopted the proposed plan for 1980-81, without change. The new plan will eliminate 8 city positions and establish three new foreman positions, one each for sanitation, water and sewer, and streets, each being under the chain of command to the city secretary. The new plan will provide for approximately a 10% increase in pay for all employees.

The next scheduled meeting of the city council will be September 29th at 7:00 P.M. in the City Hall, at which time the council will act on the proposed adoption of the new budget.

Home Repair Loans Available In Callahan County

Callahan County Farmers Home Administration supervisor Jack Phillips stated today that rural home owners whose houses need fixing to make them safe and sanitary may be eligible for a repair loan from Farmers Home Administration at 1 per cent interest rate.

Income is the key to the type of assistance for which a person may be eligible.

Loan funds may be used for paying the cost of repairs and improvements, including, but not limited to: Repairing roofs, installing screens, storm windows, and doors, insulation, and needed heating systems including wood stoves. Providing sanitary water and or waste disposal systems. Providing other similar repairs or improvements.

Loan funds may not be used to improve the appearance of a dwelling or make facilities in the dwelling more convenient

unless such changes are directly associated with removing hazards to health or safety.

Low income families may borrow up to a maximum of \$7500. Loans are repayable within 10 to 20 years depending on the amount borrowed and the repayment ability of the family.

Families living in a home on a farm, in the open country, or in towns of up to 10,000 population may qualify if they cannot secure credit from regular commercial lenders.

To obtain more information, residents of Callahan County should contact the Farmers Home Administration office located in the Courthouse on 2nd and 4th Wednesdays of each month, from 9 til 12 noon or the office in Eastland, Monday thru Friday.

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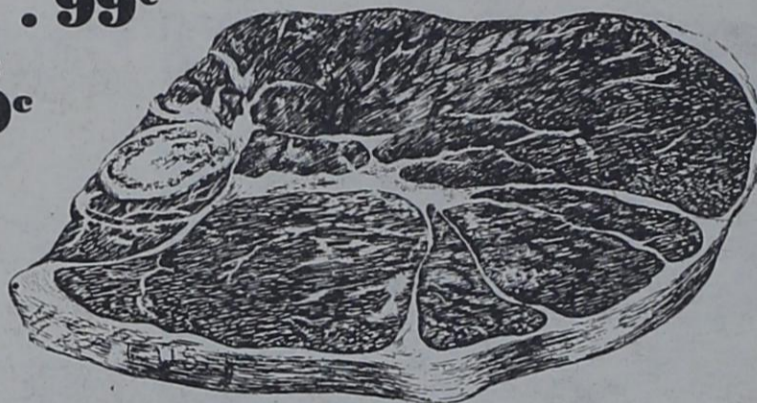

1933 where they lived until 1967 when they moved to Eula.

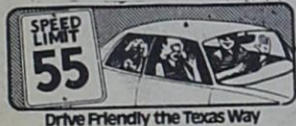

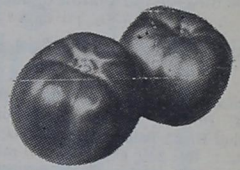

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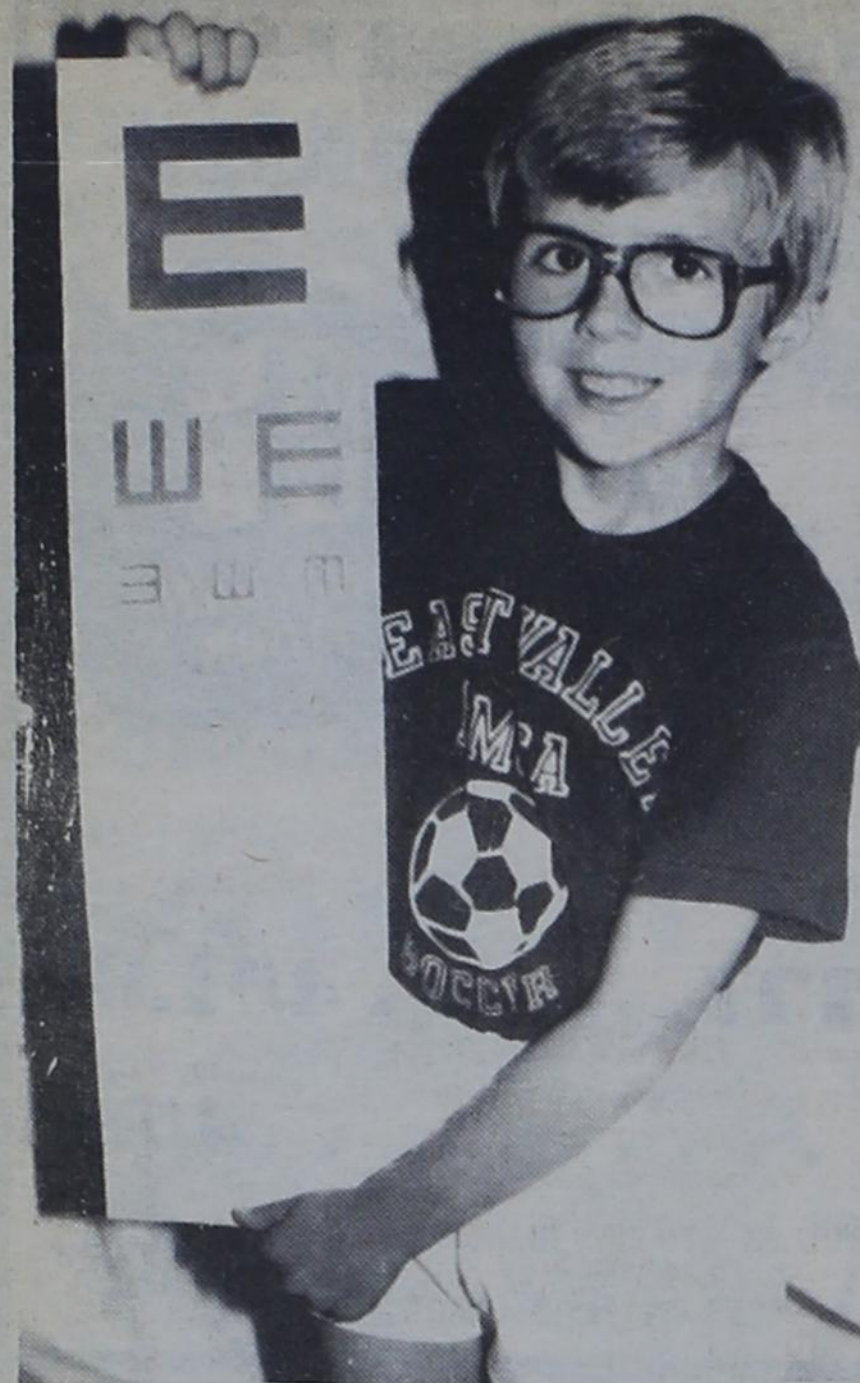

Baird Truck Suffers Engine

Trouble During Fire

Members of the Hamby, Baird and Clyde volunteer fire departments worked nearly 7 hours Friday afternoon fighting a range fire four miles north of Interstate 20 near FM 604.

The fire, which began at approximately 5 p.m., burned more than 800 acres of ranchland between Hamby and Clyde. Clyde Fire Chief Don Haley, who was slightly injured when a fire truck struck his left leg, said more than 2,500 gallons of water were used to extinguish the blaze.

Haley said the truck

hit him as he was walking to another vehicle. "I started around him (the truck) and he stopped; then I started again and he stopped then started again," he jokingly as he sat on the tailgate of a pickup with an ice pack on his leg.

Haley said 11 trucks and two rescue units responded to the blaze. A Baird truck had to be towed from the scene after it experienced engine trouble.

Baird Destroys Hawley Bearcats By Score Of 72-8

The statistics tell the whole story as the Bears rolled up 464 yds. of total offense while holding Hawley to 63 yds. rushing on 46 carries and 54 yds. passing for 117 yds of offense.

Veterans Administration Discusses Overpayments

The U.S. Veterans Administration must contend daily with a large number of cases involving overpayment of VA disability or death benefits. According to I.G. Mobley, Service Officer for Callahan County, many of these overpayments can be prevented if someone will merely discuss the matter with the proper authorities before the Government checks are cashed or deposited.

When a veteran is receiving VA pension or compensation, his benefit payments are terminated effective the end of the month prior to his death. Thus, if he passes away on the 10th of the month, his VA benefits are terminated effective the last day of the month prior to death. If he leaves a legal widow, and she is found to be eligible for VA benefits under her own entitlement, the VA will, for the month in which the veteran died, pay her the amount which the veteran was due, or her own monthly amount, whichever is the greater. If the widow is not eligible, then no VA benefits are payable to her for that portion of the month in which the veteran was alive.

When the widow of a veteran is receiving death pension or compensation, and she remarries, her benefits are also terminated effective the last day of the month prior to her remarriage.

In some instances, VA benefits for certain beneficiaries may continue for

a period of time after a death, divorce or remarriage. Since the laws are different for various situations, the claimant or the next of kin should always contact the local Veterans Service Officer when an event takes place which could affect VA benefit payments. An early contact could prevent any overpayment, which results in a debt, which someone has to repay to the Federal government.

Chapter President, Joy Clark stated that all Committees will be posted on the bulletin board and he expects everyone to do their assignment for this year.

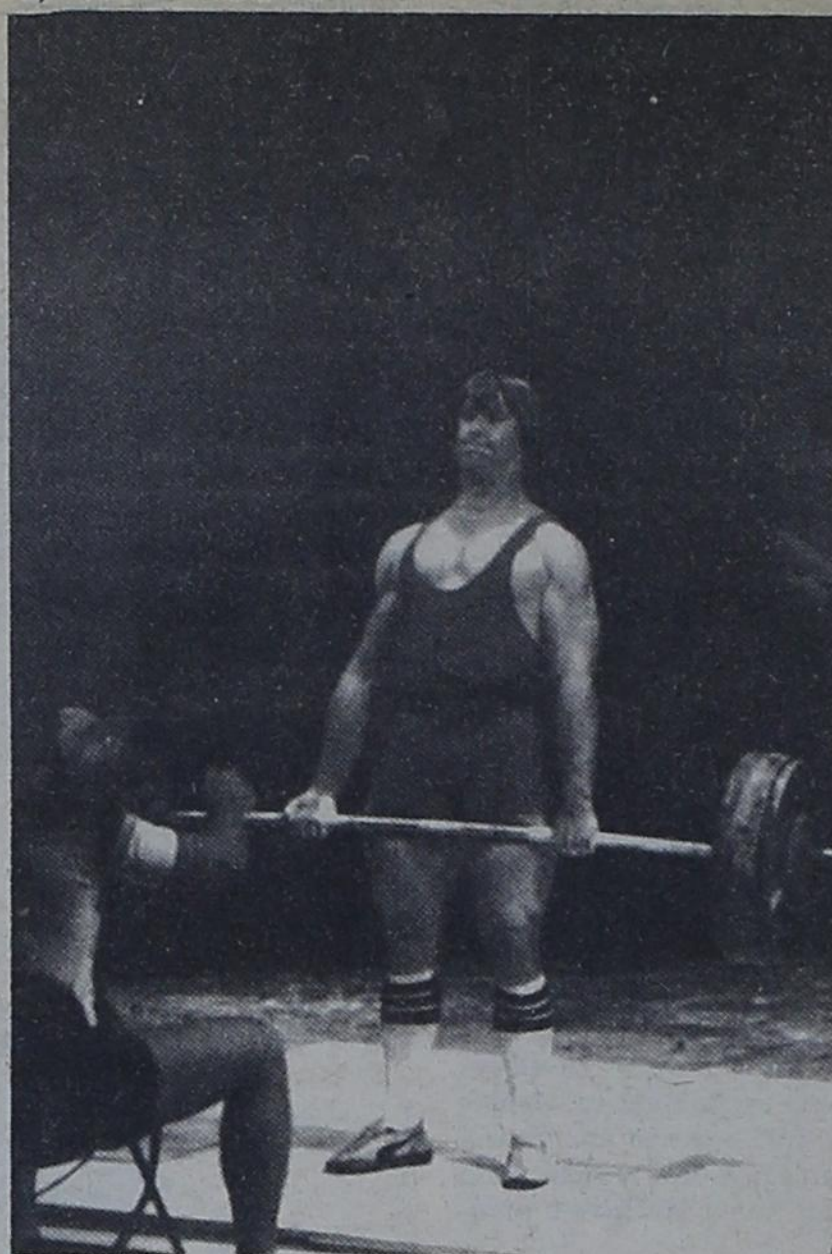
The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 p.m.
