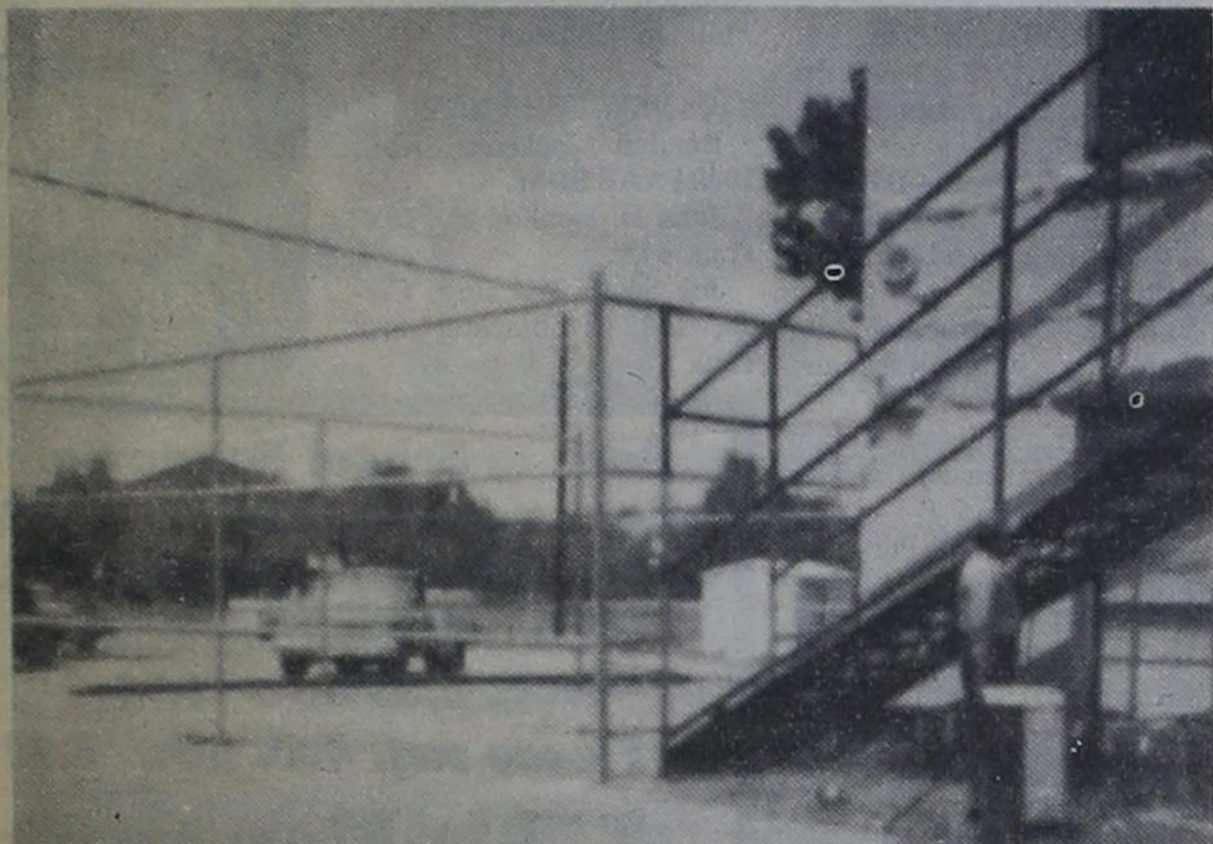

Centennial Planned For Baird School Celebration

On Sept. 4, 1982, Baird EX-es and teachers will honor their school with a Centennial Celebration in conjunction with Homecoming.

The first school was built in 1882 in the NE part of Baird. Lymon Gould was one of the first teachers. This building burned Jan. 8, 1884 when a fire swept the town. In 1886 a new 2 story school was built in the SW part of town. Some of those teachers were C.E. Smith, Media Douglas, Kate Richardson. In 1908 the school burned down again and classes were held in churches. In 1910-11 a red brick school was built by a Mr. Bowlus with R.D. Green being the very first Supt. of Baird Schools. During this period Baird became an independent school district. In December of 1928 students moved into their first separate high school located west of the red brick school which then became the elementary school. 1950-51 the present grammar school was completed. In 1957 the present high school was completed.

The first school board members were elected in Aug. 1885. They were S.L. Robertson, L.O. Oliver, John Rice.

The present Supt. of B.H.S. is Mr. Bill

Gunn having held that post for 11 years. The 4 years before that he served as Principal. Mr. Gunn will open the EX Students Homecoming Meeting by welcoming back the exes when they gather on their Homecoming Day.

Council Approves Gas Rate Increase At Tuesdays Meeting

City Council met Tuesday with Delton Ake, representative for Lone Star Gas, to discuss the proposed gas rate increase. Mr. Akes provided the council with a packet that contained the records of gas used in Baird since 1979. The last rate increase was filed with the city Nov. 24, 1980 and approved by the council Jan. 5, 1981.

The new proposed rate increase will be to cover the increasing C.G.R. cost, (city gate rate). The 7.3% increase will increase the average consumers bill \$3.18 plus a \$5.00 service charge.

Akes explained the advantage of a flat rate, to the council, compared to a seasonal rate increase.

The rate increase was approved by the council.

Charles Bates appeared before the council requesting the city to run the city sewer line up to his property line, hoping to deviate some expense. The council denied the request. The city's charge for connecting to the sewer line is only

\$10.00 and they felt that with only charging such a small amount to connect, the consumer could afford the extend to the line from his property.

A.V. Curtis, unable to attend the meeting, had Mayor Payne request to council the possibility of his borrowing the city's ditch digger. Because of the expense of repairs, this was also denied.

Dam repairs to be done were approved and awarded to a private individual at cost to the city being \$4,000.

Mayor Payne proposed to the council the idea of a sewer rate increase for the city. At the current rate, the system cannot be maintained. A rate increase of \$1.50 per month will be discussed at the council's next meeting in two weeks.

The present system is plagued with problems, and without the revenue to make repairs and update equipment, these problems will become increasingly worse.

The next scheduled council meeting will be at 7 p.m. on September 13.

Williams Awaiting Arraignment After Grand Jury Indictment

Bobby N. Williams awaits in Callahan County jail for an arraignment after the grand jury indicted him on 2 counts of murder and 1 count of attempted murder.

Williams shot and killed his common-law wife, Linda King, and her nine year old daughter, Micky King, last Wednesday in their home in Dudley. Michael Haynit, nephew of the slain woman, was also critically wounded and is recovering after surgery at Hendrick Medical Center. Haynie, although wounded, ran to neighbors and reported the shooting.

Mrs. King's and her daughter's bod-

ies were transported to Kosse, Texas where they were buried Thursday.

Medical records were subpoenaed from Williams' physician, Dr. Lawrence Gayao, where it was confirmed that Williams had been diagnosed as having pancreatic cancer in April, but had never returned for a follow up visit or picked up his medication that had been prescribed.

Texas has had at least 49 violent deaths in the month of August and all in multiple slayings.

Lone Star Files Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas Co. Manager, Delton Ake, today filed application for a rate increase which would raise the average residential customer's monthly bill in Baird about \$2.30 in the winter and .30¢ in the summer.

Based on Lone Star's rate application, a residential customer who uses an average of eight thousand cubic feet of gas a month paid \$34.10 for gas service in the winter. Under the requested rate, that same customer would pay \$36.40.

Commercial gas customers' rates would also increase under the requested rate schedule.

"Our customers are accustomed to dependable natural gas service," says Ake. "This rate increase is necessary to continue a high performance level and for other necessary expenses, such as main-

taining and improving the local pipeline distribution system, which are vital to dependable service."

Lone Star's last rate increase in Baird became effective January, 1981.

"Since that time, every business, including Lone Star, has experienced increased operating expenses," says Ake. "And, of course, unlike other businesses that can raise their prices as expenses go up, we must apply to the city council for a rate increase. No one likes raising prices, but any business must earn enough money to meet operating expenses and still achieve a reasonable profit. Even though our expenses have gone up, Lone Star still has one of the lowest average operating costs per customer when compared to any of the other major gas utilities in Texas.

CPR Class Held For Teachers At Baird Schools

In-Service workdays have begun for teachers at Baird Schools. This enables teachers to prepare for the coming school year which will begin August 26.

On the first two days of school, August 26 & 27, classes will dismiss at 2:30 p.m. Regular time for dismissal will resume on Monday, August 30, as students will be released at 3:30 p.m. There will be no classes held on Monday, September 6, in recognition of Labor Day.

High School teachers took part in a CPR class held at the Band Hall on Tuesday, August 24. Junior High teachers will take part on Wednesday, August 25.

Kathy Moore, head volleyball coach at ACU was instructor for the course.

CPR, Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation, is basically learning how to prevent sudden death. Basic CPR is a simple procedure, as simple as A-B-C, Airway, Breathing and Circulation.

Statistics have shown that around 60% of all heart attack related deaths could have been prevented by CPR.

Teachers learned such things as Infant & child care, signals for heart attack, and how to care for a choking victim.

They each practiced CPR 2 to 3 times on the CPR dummy, "Annie".

Cpr may be helpful in these situations: Heart attack, suffocation, electrical shock, drowning, overdose, stroke, smoke inhalation, sensitivity reactions and poisoning.

Here are some basic steps in administering Cpr:

1. Establish victim's condition (ask)
2. Call help
3. Position victim
4. Open air way
5. Breathing

Place victim flat on his/her back on a hard surface.

A healthy heart is almost vital, take special care of it; one way is to follow the following 6 steps.

1. Have your blood pressure checked regularly
2. Don't smoke.
3. Eat foods low in saturated (animal) fats and cholesterol.
4. Maintain proper weight
5. Exercise regularly
6. Have regular medical check-ups.

Be good to yourself, learn the facts and stay healthy.

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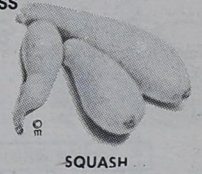
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Fate Of Gas System Rest With C-Plains Voters

An election September 11, called by the City Council of Cross Plains, will be the deciding fate for the city's gas system.

Bankruptcy proceedings filed by the Flame Gas Co., forced the city to take over the system, otherwise it would have been shut-off by a court order.

Outdated lines with cracks and leaks has plagued the system with problems. More than \$6,000 in revenues is lost each month in leaks, since the city

has resumed running of the system. An engineering firm has been hired by the city to determine the cost of putting in a new system.

Estimated cost for the new system is \$692,700, excluding the lines outside the city limits. Gas rates on a 30 year note would be \$8.50 per thousand cubic feet. A source of energy change, or keep up date the present system will be decided by the upcoming election.

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Trustee's Approve 1982-83 Budget For Clyde Schools

Action was deferred on establishing a tax rate for Clyde ISD, but a \$2.4 million operating budget was approved in Monday night's meeting of the Trustees of the Clyde Consolidated Independent School District.

This a \$500,000 increase

over the 1981-82 budget. The increase is a result of salary increases and changes in reporting requirements mandated by the Texas Education Agency.

Although the board deferred action on setting a tax rate, they indicated they would consider retaining last year's rate of 55 cents per \$100 assessed valuation, though it would require a tax rate hearing and would probably draw opposition.

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Clyde Kiwanian Elected Governor-Elect At McAllen Convention

Marvin W. Sapaugh, member of the Kiwanis Club of Clyde, was unanimously elected to the office of Governor-Elect of the Texas-Oklahoma District of Kiwanis International. The T-O District is one of the largest of the "30" Districts in the United States. Kiwanis International is comprised of clubs in over 75 countries around the world. The T-O District is comprised of over four hundred clubs and seven-tenths thousand members. In Kiwanis International there are more than "7800" clubs with over 300,000 members. The Convention was the 64th Annual Convention and attracted over "1,600" Kiwanis and wives. Sapaugh drew no opposition in his race for Governor-Elect and was elected unanimously. He will serve from Oct. 1, 1982 until Oct. 1, 1983. At the District convention to be held next August in Waco, Sapaugh will be unopposed for the office of Governor of the T-O District and will serve Oct. 1, 1983 to Oct. 1, 1984.

Sapaugh joined the Kiwanis Club of Abilene in 1967 and has maintained perfect attendance ever since. In 1972-73 he served as President of the Ki-

wanis Club of Coleman; in 1974-75, while a member of the Kiwanis Club of South Abilene, he served as the Division 35 Lt. Governor, and for outstanding service was named by Governor Andy Waters a Distinguished Lt. Governor building two new clubs in Division 35 at Clyde and Baird and being 100% in dues payment, reporting and contributions to the Tom Duncan Memorial of the Texas-Oklahoma Kiwanis Foundation, for all of the clubs in Division 35. Since that year he has

served every Governor of the T-O District in some District leadership capacity.

Sapaugh serves many other organizations in Clyde, Abilene, and across the State as well, and in addition is actively engaged in many church and other religious endeavors. A member of the First Baptist Church of Clyde, he serves as one of its three Trustees and is a past Chm. of the Deacons. In addition, he serves in many of Abilene's other organizations.

Sapaugh is the second

youngest Governor-Elect to serve the T-O District of Kiwanis International, being born in 1940 in Sulphur Springs, Tx. His wife Carol is President of Camaram Media Corp. and is a graduate of Abilene Christian University. They have one daughter, Amy, who is a senior at Clyde H.S. A son, Stephen, died at age 15 in a plane crash of the Island of St. Croix, V.I. while on a church mission trip in July, 1979.

Attending public schools in Sulphur Springs, Sny-

der and San Angelo, Sapaugh is a graduate of San Angelo High School. He attended San Angelo Jr. College, and graduated from Baylor University in 1964 with a B.A. in business. He attended Baylor U. School of Law and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. Interviewer of the Baptist Sunday School Board in Nashville, Tn. (1965-67), was Director of Personnel and Cashier at Hardin-Simmons U. (1967-68), and was a Registered Representative with Schneider, Bernet

& Hickman, Inc. (1971-81). Sapaugh has been ranching in the south part of Taylor and Callahan counties since 1968, raising Angus cattle. He also in VP & Treasurer of Camaram Media Corp. in Clyde.

Previously two other individuals from Division 35 clubs have served the Texas-Oklahoma District of Kiwanis International as Governor—Dr. Rex Kyker, Kiwanis Club of Key City-Abilene (1967) and Bailey Choate, Kiwanis Club of Sweetwater (1953).
