## CITIZENS START MOVEMENT TO BUILD SANITARIUM

Dr. I. M. Howard and other local physicians who are alive to needs of a small sanitarium in Cross Plains, has started a move for that purpose which will doubtless be successful. It will be a great addition to the town and long needed convenience for the people of this part of the country. The distance to any of the more important hospitals practically deprives us from their benefits in many emergency cases.

Dr. Howard's plan is to get a skilled surgeon interested in the matter, locate here and preside as head of the institution, and to that end, has circulated a petition endorsing the movement and which was signed by practically every man in the town and community to whom it was presented.

The petition sets forth: "We, the undersigned citizens of Cross Plains, feeling that the growth of the town and the thickly populated country surrounding it, will justify the location of a small hospital here, the distance to any such institution, and the facilities being

such that it is often almost impossible to get a patient to a suitable place to get the needed help for such cases; Therefore, realizing the need of such an institution, we will encourage and endorse any surgeon of proven ability who will move into our town and locate a small hospital and practice his profession, assuring any man of character and ability our hearty co-operation."

A similar petition is being circulated in Burkett and the other inland towns which comprise a part of this trades territory.

## CALLAHAN GIVEN FIRST PLACE WEST TEXAS FAIR

Stillman Evans, staff correspondent of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, gives that paper an extensive report on the Callahan county agricultural exhibit, and especially the Jones family exhibit, at the West Texas Fair, which was held at Abilene last week. The Jones family live at Cottonwood.

In his report the correspondent states that the Callahan county exhibit was very comprehensive. A profusion of agricultural products are shown by Callahan County and they were so convincing that the judges had but little trouble in giving it first place among the half dozen county exhibits in the building. The manufacturing community of Callahan County was represented in a mattress, made at Clyde out of Callahan County cotton. Callahan County is more than an agricultural and a manufacturing county, however, as is shown by a derrick, representing the petroleum interests of that county. Under the derrick is a jar filled with high-grade petroleum from a well in the Putnam field.

## ANOTHER NEW WELL TO OFFSET WEBB NO. 1.

Another new well will drill as an offset to the Webb producer. This is one of the new locations that had been decided upon for some time, but the drilling contract was not let until the first of this week, when Stone & McMurry, drilling contractors, signed up for the drilling. Preparations for starting this well will begin at once.

The derrick and drilling equipment is all in readiness to spud in the well on the W. F. Harlow farm, a short distance south of town.

The new well a few hundred yards north-east of the Gooch well, for which the steel derrick was erected some time ago, have placed the drilling equipment and are ready to spud in.

The water pipe line from the McDonald lake at Cross Plains was completed to the well on the Teston farm the first of this week and they have resumed drilling, after being shut down two days on account of water supply.

its first session at Abilene. The Jones are real and genuine farmers and Mr. Jones—the initials are—R. J.—is well known all over this portion of West Texas because of practical knowledge, Mrs. Jones, who, if you judge by the exhibits of canned goods, and of products of her kitchen, is there, too, when it comes to practical knowledge and for more than twenty years they have been making more money on their 107 acre farm near Cottonwood, in Callahan county, than most farmers do off farms thrice, or twenty times as large.

Farmer Jones never has lost faith in West Texas but once, and he admits that very reluctantly, once he quit West Texas. He went to California. It did not take him long, he said, to decide, however, that there was nothing in California for him, so he came back to the little 107-acre farm in Callahan county and ever since then he has been making a good living on it.

The Jones' farm exhibit in the agricultural building of the West Texas Fair occupies more space than some of the county exhibits. There is not a repetition in it. Nor are there many things in it that is not majored in the judging of farm exhibits. Jones has 126 different exhibits.

Aside from his individual exhibits, which has attracted a whole lot of

attention at the fair, Jones has been a big contributor to the exhibit of Callahan county. Callahan had the biggest county exhibit at the West Texas Fair, and it took first prize. The exhibit occupied the entire front end of the agricultural hall.

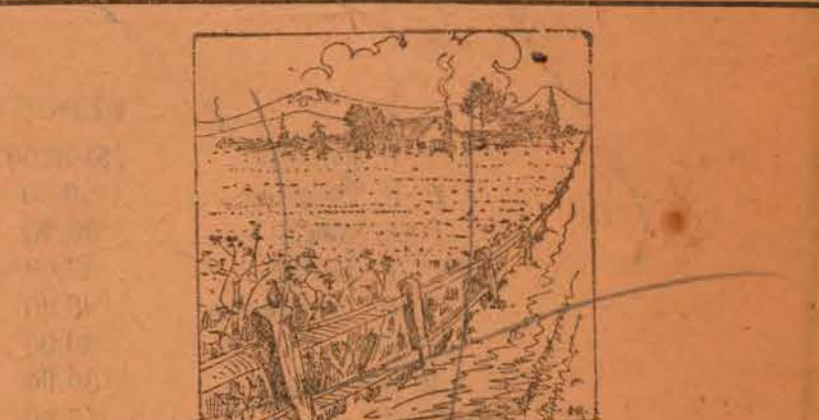

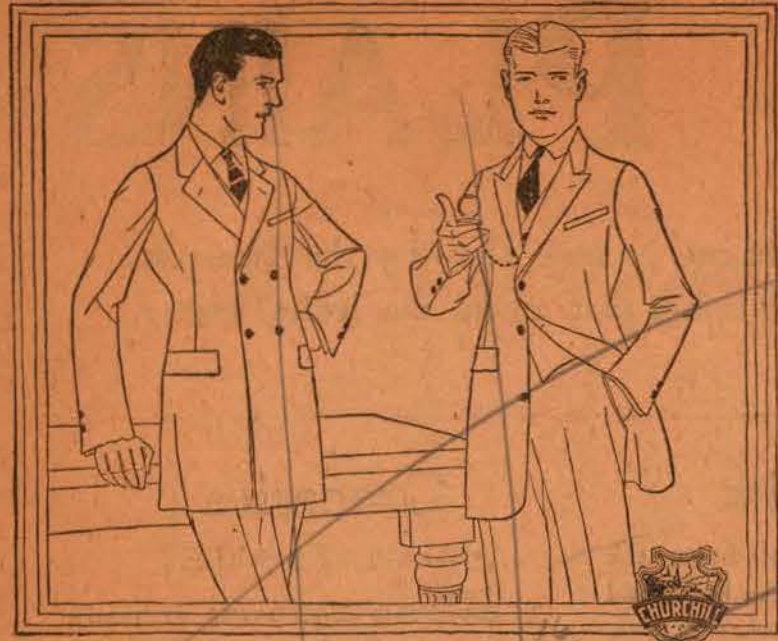

**SELLS 22 SHEEP AND  
 CLEARS SUM OF \$3.24**

L. P. Havne, living near Cleburne, possesses a bill of sale for 22 sheep at Fort Worth. The sheep weighed 1,720 pounds. They sold for \$25.80. After freight, truck hire, yard commission, selling commission, etc., had been paid he had left \$3.24, not enough with which to buy a pair of shoes. And yet, if you go into the average eating place in Fort Worth and order a two ounce mutton chop you are called upon to pay about 75 cents. Who is responsible for this never ending era of hold-up that is being directed against the farmer and producer. We are informed that the enormous apple crop of the northwest, the most essential food crop that could be supplied to any part of the country, will be compelled to rot in the hands of the producers on account of the extortionate freight rates which the railroad companies are permitted to charge. We are often reminded to reduce the cotton crop, or the nation will perish. In our opinion the greatest peril lies in the political crookedness by our legislative representatives, and may time speed the day when the people awaken to this fact, and try their hand at correcting a few things at the ballot box.

It is declared by the statisticians that seventy-five per cent of the men who are unemployed in the north and east are unskilled laborers, and that eighty per cent of the unskilled men are illiterate as well. The man who would cinch his job must prepare himself to do work that is just a little better than the average worker is doing. When time for reductions comes the knife strikes the unskilled, nonambitious, non-productive workers first. Just another reason for going to high school and college, young man.
