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America's Gas Tax Pennies Could Sink United States Nav y

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Statisticians of the American Petroleum Institute sharpened their pencils and proceeded to calculate how American automobile drivers could sink the U.S. Navy.

Here's how:

Hold up all taxes—gasoline, licenses, etc.—for a year and pay the lump sum in pennies. Dis tribute the pennies equally on the decks of all our battleships and down they'd go.

The calculating process:

"One cent weighs 48 grains and there are 146 cents in an avoirdupois pound. The average motorist pays \$52 annually in automotive taxes, chiefs in pennies of the gasoline he uses.

"A total of 540,000 tons of pennies would be required annually to pay the automotive tax bill on the 30,000,000 motor vehicles in the nation. Since the total displacement of all American battleships afloat is only 474,500 tons, motorists' tax pennies placed in the ships would sink them to the bottom.
