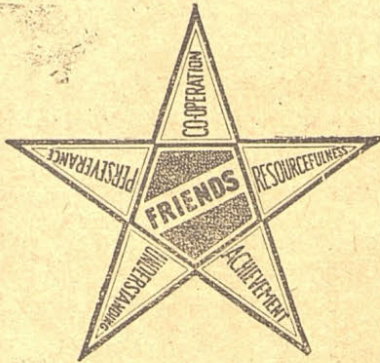

The Gwinnup field, 15 miles southwest, comes into the limelight again with two big producers. Gwinnup, et al, completed their No. 5 for an initial production of 1000 barrels, and the Independent Oil Co. finished their No. 1 on Maples-Gardner lease for 800 barrels. The Kirby Oil Co. also completed Dibrell No. 1 for 150 barrels, extending field 1/4 mile west. Other wells are drilling in that section.

In the Cross Cut section the Pandem Oil Co. completed their Westerman No. 1 for 100 barrels. J. K. Hughes brought in his Arledge No. 8 for 100 barrels.

F. W. Stone & Co. finished Gunn No. 7 for about 50 barrels. Cosden missed pay on his Wasterman No. 8. Prairie Oil & Gas Co. spudded their Pickett No. 1.

Further south the Midwest Exploration Co. completed Suttles No. 1 for nice well. Cosden also finished his Williams No. 3 for a producer.

J. K. Hughes on Freeland lease 5 miles north, drilling at 650 feet. Halmack Oil Co. and Pennant Oil & Gas Co., on Robbins lease 2 miles south, running pipe at 1050 feet.

Mississippi Oil & Gas Co. and C. O. Moore are spudding Cutbirth No. 1. Eastland Oil Co., et al, on Harrell lease south of town, drilling at 1150 feet.

T. B. Slick, on the DeBusk tract southwest, drilling at 460 feet.

C. O. Moore on G. C. Ramsey farm near Burkett, spudding.

Nichols, et al, on Ed Long lease southwest, spudding.

North of town on the J. A. Barr farm Wilkison & Lightfoot are drilling at 2800 feet.

J. K. Hughes' Cutbirth No. 1, drilling at 1900 feet.

Daneiger Oil Co. on Minnock lease northwest, drilling at 930 feet.

C. O. Moore, rigging up standard rig on Huling farm northwest.

The Frarie Oil & Gas Co. and M. E. Wakefield are spudding their Lamar No. 1, south of town; rigging up Cunningham No. 1, and No. 2 is a maoine; fishing at 400 feet on McDonough No. 8; spudding No. 9, 10 and 11 are locations; Bond No. 1 and 2, locations; Dering on No. 2, location.

No report from other wells, but all sections continue to show increased activity.

SEWERAGE SYSTEM PROPOSED MAY START WORK SOON

The City Council in business session Friday night, met with Koch & Fowler of Dallas, who proposed to install a sewerage system here if granted a franchise and sufficient number of signers to justify putting in the system. The council granted a tentative or conditional franchise, and Koch & Fowler have been surveying, making estimates and preparing blue prints. When this work has been completed, the proposition will either be accepted or rejected, and if accepted, it is understood that actual work of installing the system will start in thirty days. The proposed charges for service will be \$2.50 for residence and \$4.00 for business houses, for one set of fixtures to be accommodated, with small extra charges for additional.

The city retains option of purchasing system at each five year period, on a price agreed upon or set by appraisers. The profits will also be regulated not to exceed ten per cent profit at the end of five years also. The above service charges will bear a ten per cent reduction with 200 connections; another ten per cent when 250 connections are made, and five per cent additional reduction when 300 are made.

The system is not assured yet, but definite action will be taken in few days, it is understood.

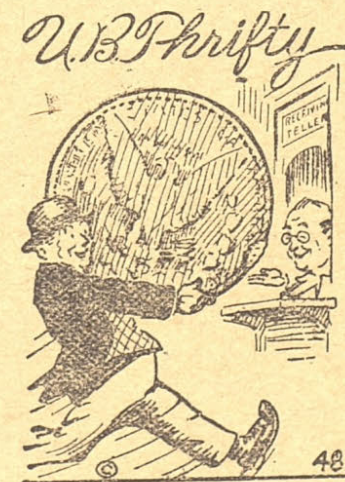

EVEN the oldest fashion reporter cannot recall a time when styles in shoes received so much attention and thought as this season's footwear is getting. For several years women have been growing more and more discriminating and exacting in the matter of shoes, and the element of style in footwear has mounted in importance until what is chic for the feet takes as much consideration and money as what is smart for the head.

For the street the eyes of fashion linger on oxfords and pumps—taking note of the tendency to light colors and becoming cut, for shoes as well as hats must be flattering. This year's oxford is cut a little lower than

The silver or gold kid slippers or sandals are displayed among evening shoes and also beautiful new modes combining metallic kid with metallic brocade.

For real sports wear it is necessary to own the proper shoes but the average woman will make out very well with a pair of white shoes in canvas, linen or kid which are classed as semi-sports shoes or with sandals

**Sunday School
'Lesson'**

Lesson for May 23

ISAAC AND HIS WELLS

LESSON TEXT—Genesis 26:12-25.
GOLDEN TEXT—A soft answer turneth away wrath, but grievous words stir up anger.—Prov. 15:1.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Isaac Refuses to Quarrel.
JUNIOR TOPIC—Isaac Refuses to Quarrel.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Isaac the Peacemaker.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—How to Deal With Aggressors.

Isaac was a child of the covenant and given in the time of the old age of Abraham and Sarah in fulfillment of God's promise (Gen. 15:1-5). His name means laughter, a reminder of the gladness of the heart of his mother when she learned that she was to have a son. As to character he was gentle, meek, meditative and peace loving. He was a remarkable contrast to his father Abraham. Two things may have affected him to his disadvantage.

1. The shadow of his illustrious father.

Sons of great and rich men commonly do not make much of life. The necessity of struggle is not forced upon them.

2. He was brought up as the only child of his mother.

The tendency in such a case would be to shield him from the necessity of self-effort so that he would be unable to meet life's stern realities. Every child should be compelled to think for itself and to fight its own battles. While not a mighty man by nature's gifts, through the blessings of God's grace he became the inheritor of the covenant promise. He was not only a meek man, but a man of prayer as well (Gen. 24:63; 25:21; 26:23-25).

1. Isaac in Gerar (vv. 12-17).

1. The Lord appeared unto him (vv. 1-4).

Because of famine in the land Isaac went into the country of the Philistines. This distress should have moved him to call upon the Lord (Jas. 5:13). It were better to suffer in the land than to go among the enemies of God's people. The Lord graciously appeared to him there and directed him not to go into Egypt, thus avoiding the error of his father.

2. His lapse (vv. 7-11).

He fell into the same temptation as Abraham many years before (Gen. 20:13). When one goes into the enemy's country he can expect to be tempted to do wrong.

3. His prosperity (vv. 12-17).

Isaac did not intend to make Gerar his permanent place of abode. He intended only to sojourn there. While there he sowed and reaped bountifully. This prosperity was no proof that God approved of his course.

II. Isaac's Enemies (vv. 18-22).

Isaac was not permitted long to enjoy this fruitful land. His prosperity incited the envy of the Philistines. Success in any calling in life will provoke envy. Ministers and Sunday school teachers sometimes become envious of each other. The Philistines ordered Isaac to leave them. Wherever envy has begun its deadly work there must be separation. They took as the method of getting rid of him the stopping up of the wells. Isaac did not contend with them but peaceably withdrew to another place where he proceeded again to dig the wells of his father. The Philistines again strove with him. He named this place Esek, which means contention, and again he removed from them. The second name he gave was Sitnah, which means enmity. This willingness to remove from the enemy shows his willingness to be imposed upon rather than to fight. The third time he dug wells there was no strife. The name given to this was Rehoboth, which means room. We should learn from his behavior that the way to have peace is to wear out our enemies with patience.

III. Isaac in Beersheba (vv. 23-33).

Immediately upon Isaac's going up from among the Philistines the Lord appeared to him. The Lord permits envy and strife in the world in order to get his children separated from them. Following this visitation by the Lord, Isaac built an altar and called upon His name. As soon as a meeting place with Jehovah was established he pitched his tent there. Following this his servants dug a well. No use going among the Philistines to get water.

After Isaac was established in Beersheba, Abimelech came desiring to make an alliance with him. He gained influence by peaceably withdrawing from them. Being thus convinced they desired to enter into covenant relationship with him. The way to gain influence with the world is to withdraw from it.

Noblest of All Victories

ing their enforcement. There are many archaic, obsolete and unnecessary laws on the statute books that might well be repealed.

Woman Suffrage

Declaring himself an original supporter of woman suffrage, he said that all civil and political rights should inure to women that are possessed by men. "I would further protect and exempt woman from obligations that would bring unnecessary burdens upon the mother of the race," he added.

Prohibition

"A lifelong prohibitionist, I am against any plan, program or scheme that undertakes to restore the liquor traffic. And I favor the stern enforcement of the prohibition laws of the state and nation. No greater curse ever beset the human race than its arch-enemy, liquor."

Flood Control, Water Conservation

He advocated the protection of the people and their products in the river valleys of Texas against periodical overflows, by a system of levees and dams. Through a constructive program of flood control and water conservation by which the public welfare would be protected, he said, capital could be induced to make the waterways of Texas a great asset.

The Farmer's Problem

Taking up the cudgel for the farmer, as he did in his previous campaign, the former lieutenant-governor asserted that upon the farmer's success depends the success of all others, yet that no class of people in the land have less economic independence and enjoyment of life than the farmer. As a remedy for his ills, cooperative marketing was suggested.

"There will be no cure for the farmer's problem so long as each individual farmer peddles his crop from door to door with a sample in his hands. There will be no cure so long as middlemen in skyscrapers in the cities tell the farmers of the country the price they must take for their product; so long as these selfsame middlemen speculate and gamble on the product of the greatest and most important business in the nation—farming. A first essential to the success of producers is that they must control the sale of and regulate their output.

"The middleman can be jarred loose from his strangle hold upon the farmers when the farmers themselves, by some process, control and market 50 to 60 per cent of their output. It seems that cooperative marketing institutions are a nucleus around which a proper, effective and efficient selling organization can be established.

"As governor of Texas, it shall be my purpose to cooperate in every reasonable way to assist the farmers in accomplishing this great need."

Labor

Next he discussed his views on labor, stating that "when I am elected governor of Texas, labor will find no friend more sympathetic, more sincere in that sympathy, more ready to promote its welfare with due regard to the rights of every other citizen of Texas than I."

"It was in labor's ranks I spent all the days of my minority," he recalled, "as well as many years of my majority. By the sweat of my brow, and in the rank and file of labor, I learned the lessons of life and earned its compensations. I experienced its financial difficulties far along in life, and no man has a more sympathetic understanding of its needs and necessities. Labor and capital have their controversies. Good government holds the scales of justice even and weighs out a square deal to each."

State's Rights

Of all political and legislative activities, the candidate said he viewed none of them with more alarm as a destroyer of state's rights than that class of legislation known as federal aid. Federal aid for post roads and public health might be justified, he granted, but in practically all other instances, aid offered by the federal government is "a financial sop that insidiously breaks down the rights of the state."

"To contribute enormous sums of taxes to the federal government for their re-distribution to the states, less enormous administration costs, is manifestly illogical and ridiculous. It is more dangerous to sound government principles. Laws already enacted
