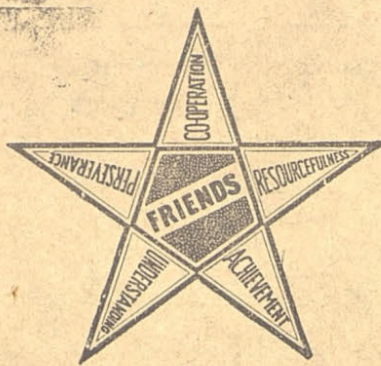

### P. T. A. ORGANIZED WITH 50 MEMBER

### WORK ADVANCING ON SEWER SYSTEM

The Municipal Engineering Co. of Dallas, is progressing nicely on the new sewer system here. Two ditch digging machines are busy, and a large crew of men are busy laying lines and filling ditches. It is predicted that approximately 250 connections will be made by the time the system is completed, and others will connect later.

We pick up our exchanges each week, and read where small towns are paving streets, putting in water or sewer systems, building new schools. Most all of this progress shows to be in towns in West Texas territory. West Texas is building—and it is doing it right, while many of the eastern cities are losing out and drifting into the background. The spirit of West Texas will win.

J. K. Hughes Franke No. 1, missed townsite pay, but plan to drill for deeper pay.

Brown & Co. Long No. 4, drilling at 925.

Cranfill-Reynolds on Henderson No. 4, drilling at 1350, on 5 1300, No. 3 spudding. They also completed their Henderson No. 8—a shallow well for 10 barrels.

E. R. Wilson on Lamar No. 2 drilling at 1100.

There is much activity shown in the Cross Cut section, but we have been unable to get report on operations there this week. We have failed to get report on several of the close in wells, too. We will make special effort next week to get a better report.

### REFRESHING DRINKS

Mint is so refreshing in flavor and so attractive when used as a garnish that even the word reminds us of delicious drinks. The famous mint juleps of the South were usually made with liquor, but one may serve a drink of fruit juices with nothing but pleasure in the consequences.

**Mint Cup.**—Express the juice from five lemons, add the leaves from a dozen stalks of mint, one and one-half cupfuls of sugar and one-half cupful of water, cover and let stand thirty minutes. Just before serving pour into a pitcher over a large piece of ice and add three bottles of chilled ginger ale. Put a sprig of mint in the top of each glass or a bunch in the top of the pitcher for garnish.

**Pineapple Lemonade.**—Make a sirup by boiling one cupful of sugar and two cupfuls of water ten minutes, add the juice of three lemons and a can of grated pineapple; cool, strain and add four cupfuls of ice water.

**Ever Ready Lemonade.**—Add a cupful of sugar to two cupfuls of water and boil together twelve minutes; add a third of a cupful of lemon juice, cool and turn into a jar. Keep in the ice chest and serve with a few slices of fresh lemon for a garnish.

**Chocolate Milk Shake.**—Melt four squares of unsweetened chocolate, add one and three-fourths cupfuls of sugar and a pinch of salt; pour on gradually, stirring constantly, one and one-half cupfuls of boiling water. Boil five minutes. Cool and put into a jar, keep on ice. For chocolate milk shake add two and a half tablespoonfuls of the sirup, one egg and two-thirds of a cupful of milk, with two tablespoonfuls of chopped ice.

**Iced Egg Nog.**—This drink is not only refreshing but nourishing. Beat one egg for each glass, add a pinch of salt, a little sugar and a few drops of any desired flavoring. Beat well until the egg has absorbed the sugar. To make it especially good separate the egg and white and stir in the white lightly, add lemon juice if desired with a grating of lemon rind, and sufficient milk to fill the glass. Use iced water when the lemon juice is used.

A delightful drink which may always be at hand for an emergency is grape juice, with ginger ale. The combination is good and the zest of the ginger ale makes a most refreshing drink.

**Some Choice Recipes.**

For variety try this recipe; it is as pleasing to the palate as it sounds:

**Stuffed Pork Chops.**—Have pork chops cut one and one-half inches thick, split each chop to the bone and stuff with bread crumbs seasoned well with melted

butter and eggs and onion, pepper and salt. Roll in cracker crumbs and beat an egg and fry in deep fat until brown on both sides. Now place in a baking pan and cover with the following: One small can of tomatoes, one small onion chopped, one tablespoonful of butter, a teaspoonful of sugar and one of salt. Fasten together with a toothpick before frying and bake until thoroughly well done.

**Olive Salad.**—Take one cupful of stoned olives, two cupfuls of celery chopped fine, four hard-cooked eggs diced fine. Mix with a cupful of mayonnaise and serve on lettuce.

**Raisin Fudge Cake.**—Cream together one and one-half cupfuls of brown sugar and one-half cupful of butter, add two egg yolks, one cupful of chopped raisins, four ounces of melted chocolate, one-half cupful each of hot water and sour milk, two and one-half cupfuls of flour, one teaspoonful of soda, one-half teaspoonful of cinnamon and one-fourth teaspoonful of cloves. Bake in sheet pan in moderate oven. Cover with boiled frosting, using the two egg whites and two cupfuls of sugar, adding water to moisten and boil to a thread, pouring over the beaten egg white. Sprinkle a half cupful of blanched almonds over the top of the cake.

**Vegetable Curry.**—Mix one cupful each of cooked carrots, potatoes, turnips and peas together. Pour over them one cupful of white sauce, one tablespoonful of lemon juice, one-fourth teaspoonful of curry powder, all cooked in the white sauce. On a large platter heap seasoned mashed potato, with plenty of butter dotted over it, make a border and brown in the oven. Pour the vegetable curry into the border and sprinkle the whole with finely minced parsley. Serve very hot.

Cored apples cooked and filled with a mixture of chopped nuts, raisins and marmalade, then covered with a meringue and browned in the oven, is another attractive way of serving apples.

"Others never send their works here. They send them to books or to papers or to museums."

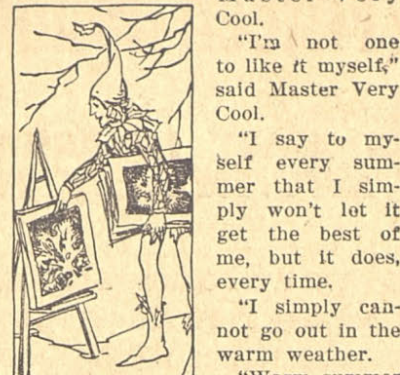
"But not Jack Frost. My work that I do in the outside world goes when winter comes along, or rather, when the late autumn comes along."

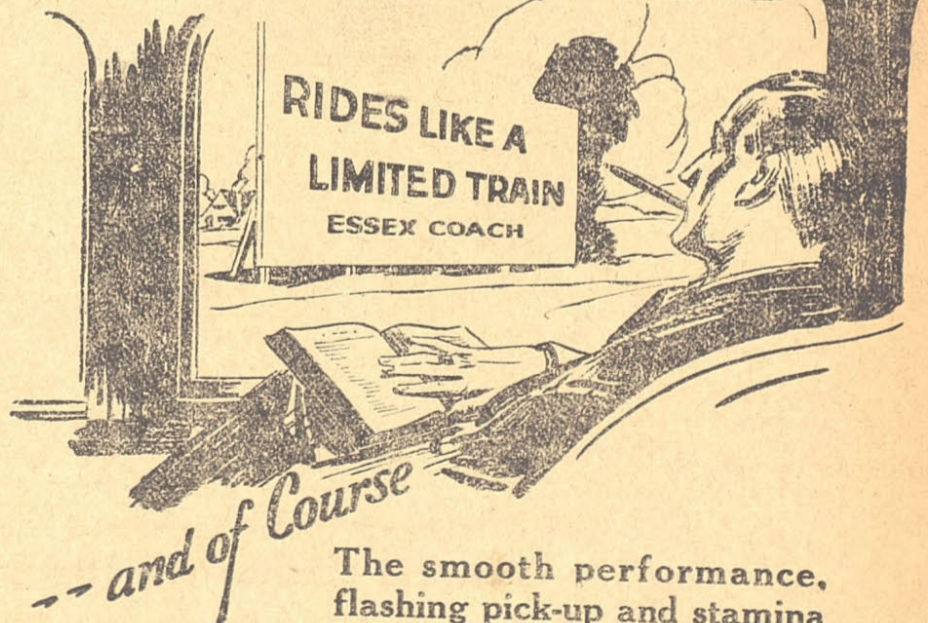

### TWO MEN PICKED BALE OF COTTON IN A DAY

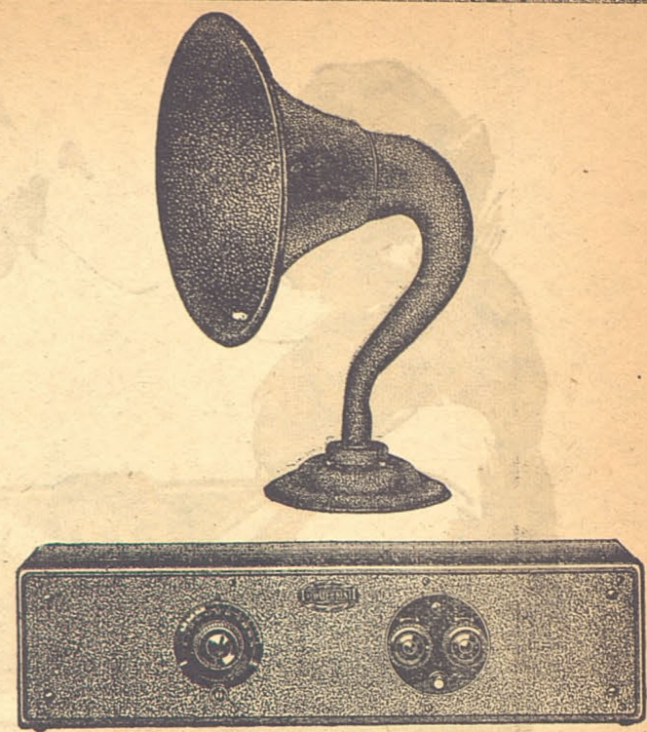

### Lesson for September 19

(Temperance Lesson.)

#### OBEEDIENCE TO LAW

LESSON TEXT—Leviticus 26:1-46.  
GOLDEN TEXT—Do not drink wine nor strong drink, thou, nor thy sons with thee.  
PRIMARY TOPIC—Daniel Chooses the Right.  
JUNIOR TOPIC—The Self-Control of Daniel.  
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Why Obey the Law.  
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Enforcing the Law.

I. Some Fundamental Laws Stated (vv. 1, 2).  
1. God alone to be worshiped (v. 1).  
God is a jealous God, therefore He cannot tolerate a rival. There must be no idolatry. God is to have full place in our lives or no place at all.  
2. The Sabbath must be observed (v. 2).

The one who has enthroned God in his heart will reverence His Sabbath. The Sabbath was ordained that man might better cherish God in his heart.  
3. Reverence for God's sanctuary (v. 2).

The believer needs to frequent the sanctuary of God in order to have his soul refreshed. Respect for God's holy day and the frequency of the sanctuary are inseparably united in those who fear and reverence God.

#### II. Blessings for Obedience to God's Laws (vv. 3-13).

1. Fruitful seasons (vv. 3-5).  
Temporal well-being is secured through obedience to God's government. Godliness is profitable unto all having the promise of the life that now is and that which is to come.

2. Internal security (vv. 6-8).  
In addition to the fullness of temporal blessings, God assured them that for obedience to His Word He would grant peace and safety. No robbers were to invade the land to disturb their tranquillity by day or night. No wild beasts would be allowed to devour them.

3. Numerical increase (vv. 9, 10).  
Their number would be multiplied according to God's covenant to Abraham and the produce of the land increased to support them.

4. God's abiding presence (vv. 11-13).  
The greatest of all God's blessings is His abiding presence. Happy is that nation and people in whose presence God chooses to dwell.

#### III. Calamities for Disobedience (vv. 14-39).

1. Judgments in general (vv. 14-17).  
For disobedience and rejection of God's laws, general calamities would be permitted to come upon them. They include:

(1) Physical diseases. Their health would be taken away and they were to be afflicted with diseases.  
(2) Bereavement. Physical disease would take away kindred and friends, thereby causing sorrow of heart, and mourning.  
(3) Famine. God would withhold the rain, therefore food supply would be lacking.  
(4) Conquest. They would be slain before their enemies.  
(5) Oppression and dispersion. God would allow the enemy to overcome and oppress them and ultimately take them out of their own land and scatter them.

2. The specific judgments (vv. 18-19).  
Merces rejected and warnings unheeded must be followed by more severe strokes of wrath. Four series of warnings are pointed out by Kellogg, each conditioned on the supposition that they did not repent as the result of the preceding experiences. Each series is prefaced by the formula, "I will punish you seven times more for your sins" (vv. 18, 21, 24, 28). The thought is that each new display of impotence on Israel's part shall be marked by increasing severity.

(1) The rains will be withheld (vv. 19, 20).  
(2) Their children and cattle will be destroyed by wild beasts (v. 22).  
(3) This to be followed by war, pestilence and famine (vv. 25, 26).  
(4) Increasing terror (vv. 29-32).  
If the previous judgments were not heeded then severer ones would follow so that in their distress they would eat the flesh of their sons and daughters and their seed should become waste and their land so desolate that even their enemies would be astonished at it.

5. Scattered among the Gentiles (v. 33).  
God would scatter them among the heathen and pursue them with a sword. How awfully this has been fulfilled in the history of that people

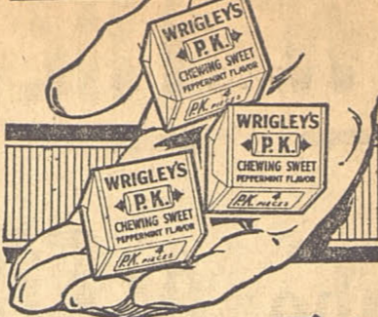

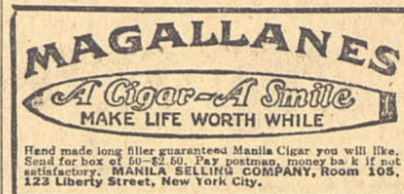

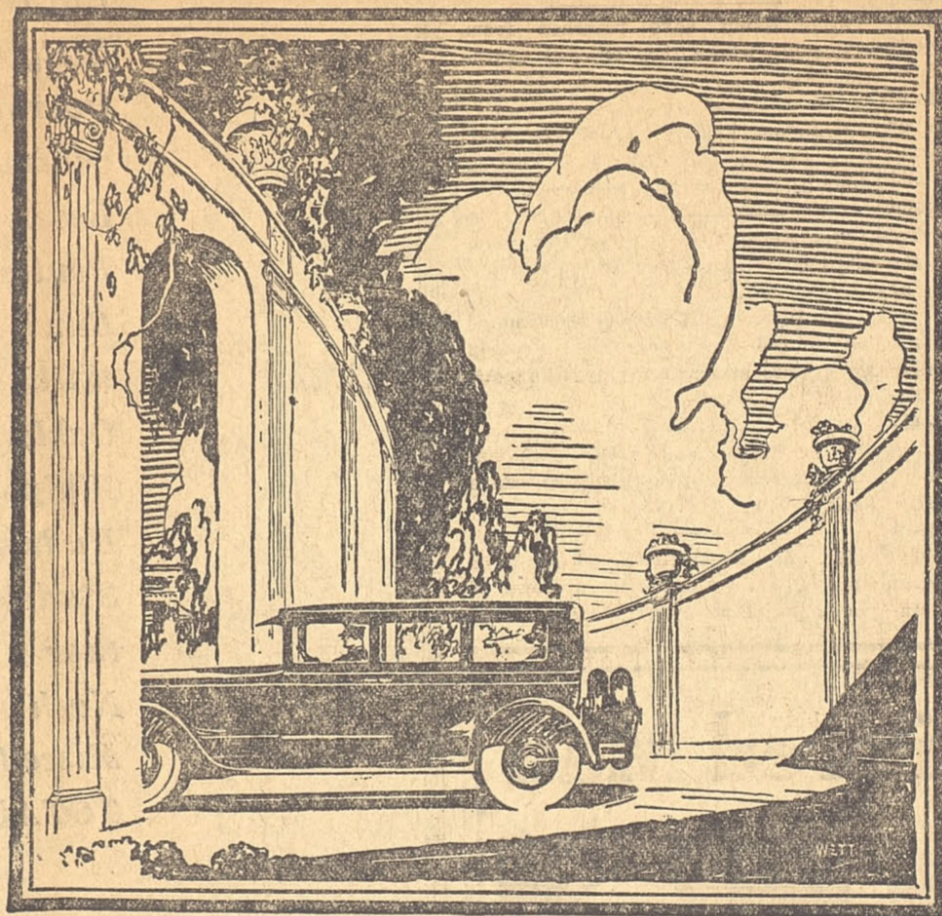
#### Big Speedway Planned

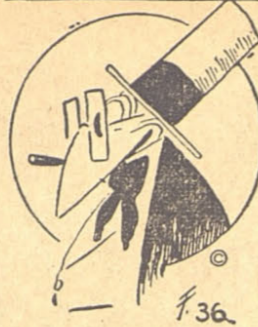
