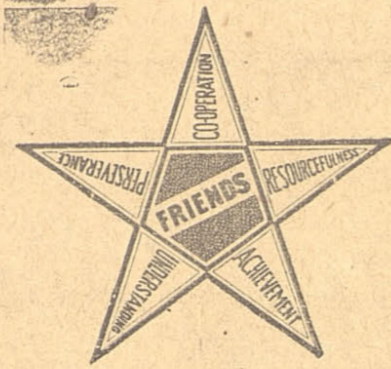

DUBLIN VOTES FOR BIG PAVING PROGRAM

Last week the citizens of Dublin voted on bond issues for street paving, assuring the city of two miles of paved streets in the residential section. The issue carried by a majority of 3 to 1. That indicates that Dublin expects to keep pace with the march of progress in West Texas—and she's "paving the way" for a greater Dublin.

That may cause Cross Plains people to wonder why our prosperous little city can't afford a few blocks of paved streets—at least a few.

BARN WHERE BOOTH STABLED HIS HORSE WILL SOON BE SOLD

Washington, D. C., Oct. 4.—Property where John Wilkes Booth, assassin of Abraham Lincoln, kept his horse to flee from the capital after killing the President, will be sold by the War Department at auction on November 4. The lot, consisting of 600 square feet in the rear of 913 E. street, Northwest, and the building, originally, a stable, have a tragic history.

Booth rented it in January, 1865, because of its location on the alley in the rear of Ford's Theatre, where he killed President Lincoln. The leasing of the building was part of the conspiracy. Booth employed a carpenter to change the stable to embrace two stalls and provide the door with a lock. Another carpenter, having access to the theatre, was hired to provide a door to the passage leading to the Presidents box.

Procuring a horse on the evening of April 14, 1865, Booth concealed it in the stable, and after shooting the President, made his escape through the passageway, mounted the horse and fled the city, only to be captured subsequently.

A Hog and a Bale of Cotton

Rufus Cox, farmer of the Okra community, came to town Saturday bringing in the same wagon a hog and a bale of cotton. The hog was sold for \$50.00 and on the bale of cotton he was offered \$60.00. Mr. Cox states that at an outside figure it did not cost him more than \$15.00 to raise and market the hog, netting a clear profit of \$35.00.

To grow, pick, gin and market the bale of cotton it cost at least \$40.00 if not more. The cotton was grown on land worth \$60 per acre and it took ten acres to make the bale. It is easy to figure which pays the greatest returns. —Rising Star Record.

He was Bowden Freeman, a member of the Cross Plains fire department, and was married at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon to Miss Helen Hayes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Hayes, who, for the past two years, was a teacher in the Cross Plains school.

Everybody in Coleman Monday morning was wondering what the Cross Plains Fire Department was doing in the city. It leaked out later in the day. The boys composing the fire department of Cross Plains learned of the plans of their comrade. They boarded the big fire truck and followed him to Coleman. When they arrived they made arrangements with a city official for a hose and the use of a fire plug. Soon after the ceremony at the Hayes home the fire department in the big truck drove up. The groom was loaded on bareheaded. A torrent of rain was falling. He was driven all over Coleman and the water the boys thought would come from the city mains came from the skies. After a good drenching Freeman was carried to Coulsons drug store, elevated on a chair, and given a drink. They all then returned to the Hayes home to enjoy ice cream and cake. Mr. and Mrs. Freeman later left for Brownwood for a few days visit before returning to Cross Plains to make their future home.

CITY FINDS ABUNDANCE OF WATER

Realizing that the city must develop more water for sewer system and general purposes, the city officials have been making tests the past two weeks, and an abundance of water has been found. On the Charley Smith place just northeast of town, a test well has been completed, which is estimated (after lengthy tests) will produce 100,000 gallons of water daily. And further north on E. I. Vestal's place a test well is estimated to be a 50,000 gallon producer.

The water in the Smith well is much softer than the present supply for the city, it is stated, and so is the water in the Vestal well.

Arrangements are now being worked out in detail to bring this water into the city, and when this work has been completed, it is believed that the city's water supply will have been solved for years to come.

FIRE BOYS DEMONSTRATE EFFICIENCY

Last Saturday evening a tool house in the Prairie camp on McDonough lease south of town caught fire and was threatening other buildings and property in the camp—but the Fire Department was called out and they demonstrated their efficiency by promptly subduing the flames. The Prairie Oil Co. has valuable properties on this lease and they might have sustained heavy loss, so the fire department comes in for credit again.

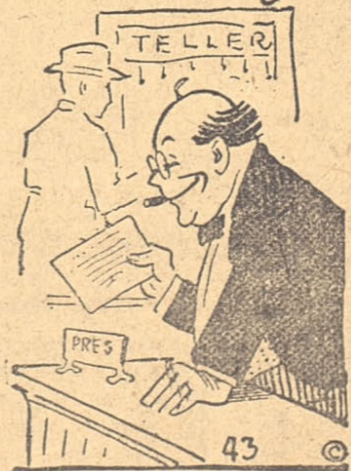
The thieves entered through the rear door, breaking the glass out of door and unlocking door from inside. Most of the loss sustained was in clothing department. Officers are working on the case.

"I wish it might have," I said bitterly, thinking of Charles' lonely grave on a mist-draped hillside in the Scotch highlands.

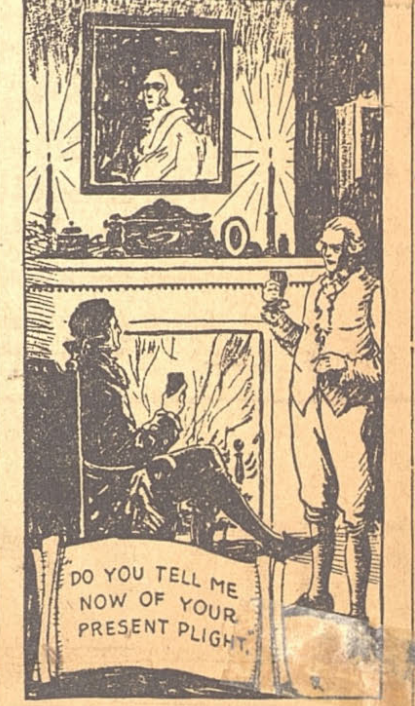

Timber, Sound, Though Buried for Centuries

Furniture made from oak used by the Romans more than 1,800 years ago in the construction of an embankment for the Thames is shortly to be added to the historic treasures of the Mansion house, says the London Mail.

The timber, discovered during excavations behind King William street, E. C., is in good condition, although it has been buried for centuries.

It is in the possession of Mr. Thomas J. Edwards, a member of the London and Middlesex archaeological society, who, with other experts, is satisfied that the find is part of the

first embankment built by the Romans.

A member of the society said the timbered embankment is 83 feet north of the Roman wall, probably built 200 years later.

Whole trunks of trees, piled one above the others, six deep and locked by cross-timbers, were found in such good condition that they can still be used for almost any purpose.

Lesson for October 17

MOSES HONORED IN HIS DEATH

LESSON TEXT—Deut. 34:1-12.
GOLDEN TEXT—Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Moses Sees the Promised Land.
JUNIOR TOPIC—The Death of Moses.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Lessons from the Life of Moses.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—What the World Owes Moses.

I. Moses Views the Promised Land From Mount Pisgah (vv. 1-4).

At the Lord's bidding Moses ascended the mountain from which he got a view of the promised land. He obeyed, though he knew that he was to die there (Deut. 32:50). He greatly desired to go into the land (Deut. 3:25), but graciously submitted to the will of the Lord. Though he was not permitted to enter the land, God gave him a view in its fullest dimensions of the land which was to be the inheritance of the people which he had delivered and led for forty years. The reason given by the Lord for refusing an entrance into the land was Moses' failure to sanctify the Lord at Meribah (Deut. 32:51, cf. Num. 20: 1-13). This was too glaring a sin for the Lord to pass over, though Moses had served Him faithfully for many years.

II. The Death and Burial of Moses (vv. 5-9).

1. His death (v. 5).
Though he died in the vigor of manhood, his work was done. He did not die before his time. God put him into the world for a purpose, and as soon as that work was done He called him home. Though Moses was a great man he was not exempt from death.

2. The burial of Moses (v. 6).
God buried him. Most likely this service was performed by the angels. Likely this is the time and circumstance when the devil contended with Michael, the archangel, over the body of Moses (Jude 9).

3. The time of mourning for Moses (v. 8).
They mourned for thirty days. It is not wrong to lay away earthly friends even with tears, but as Christians we should not mourn as those who have no hope. Indeed, it is much better to express our appreciation and love for our friends by showing the proper courtesy and respect while they are alive, than to mourn over them when they are dead.

III. The Successor of Moses (v. 9).
Joshua, who had been the minister of Moses during all the years of the wilderness journey, now became the military leader of the Israelites. That Joshua was a fit man as a leader of the Israelites is seen.

1. By the fact that he was full of the spirit of wisdom.
While the Lord is not dependent upon human wisdom, He does select as His representatives men whom He has endowed with the proper wisdom.

2. He was divinely ordained for the work at the hand of Moses, "for Moses had laid his hands upon him."
This he had done at the command of God (Num. 27:18-21).

3. The people owned him as their leader. "The children of Israel hearkened unto him, and did as the Lord commanded Moses."
In order for successful leadership a ruler must have the individual affection and allegiance of the people.

IV. Encomium Upon Moses (vv. 10-12).
In this eulogy Moses is given a place at the head of the Old Testament prophets. With the exception of the Greater Prophet (Deut. 18:15-18), of whom Moses was a type, he stands as the greatest prophet of Israel.

1. He was great because of his intimacy with God (v. 10), "whom the Lord knew face to face."
2. He was great in that he gave to the world a code of laws unequalled in the world's history.
3. He was great as a general in that he liberated the Israelitish nation from the oppression of the greatest nation of the earth.
4. He was great because he led two or three million Israelites through the desert for forty years.
5. He was great because he gave to us in the book of Deuteronomy three orations which, according to the judgment of competent critics, stand at the head of the world's literature.

Assuming that the present standard of living is retained, together with the present national prejudices and egotisms, Str George considers it doubtful whether the population will ever reach the 5,000,000,000 limit. If man better co-ordinates his effort so as to involve less expense in nonproductive effort, then possibly the advance of science may enable the 7,000,000,000 limit to be reached.

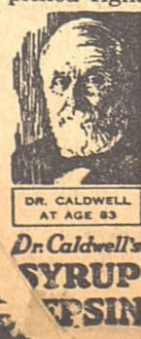

SOME years ago, when bands of earnest decorators went up and down our land preaching the gospel of simplicity in hanging pictures, most of us listened. We replaced little herds of passe-partouts that speckled the walls with one or two finer, larger pictures, and gave thanks to the artists for their very good advice.

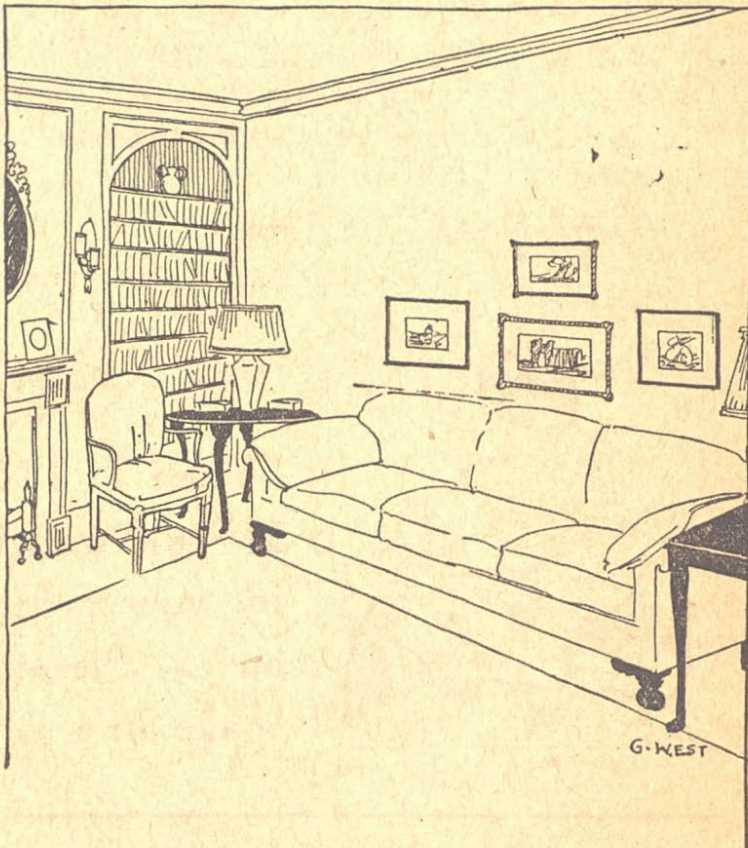
In one bold swoop they taught us the law of selection which underlies all true artistic achievement. We learned to choose single pictures whose subjects and colorings enhanced the furnishing scheme of a whole room. We saw the compelling attraction of the unit as contrasted with a scattering effect.

Now, with the old mistakes of indiscriminate and hodge-podge hang-

ing several in the same room; for groups need the influence of fine single pictures to stabilize them. We might liken them to casual friendships which, however necessary and refreshing, hardly take the place of those staunch, lifelong friends that build the foundation of things for us. Let us follow that hint in our use of them for the home.

Old maps can be as interesting as are real pictures, and today they are not only fascinating because of the story they tell, and beautiful by reason of their mellow old colors; but they are most fashionable, too.

Decorators will give you a long list of artistic reasons for their revival. First, their appropriateness to almost any scheme of furnishings: In early

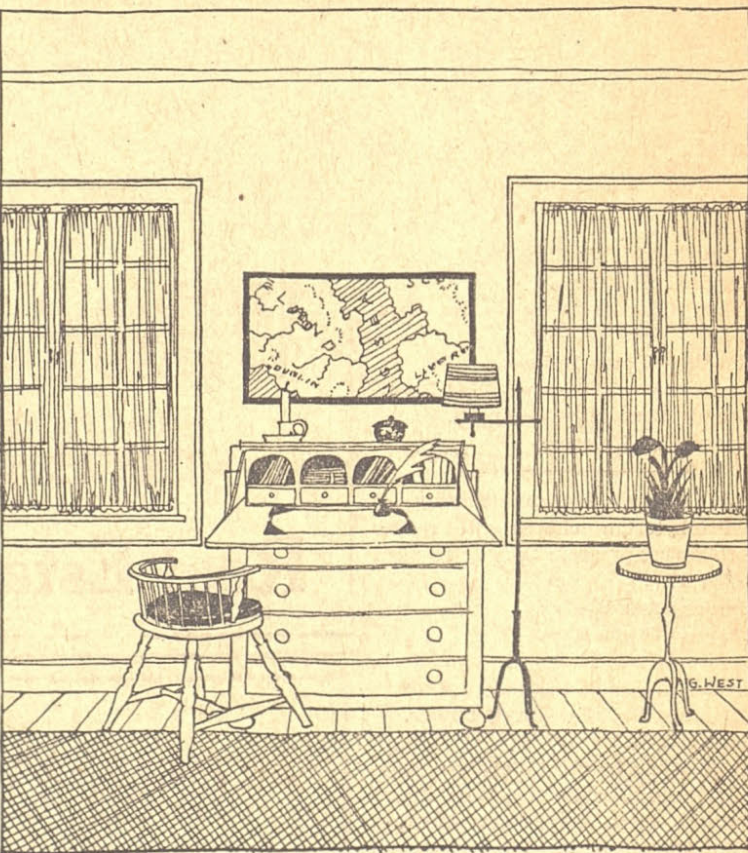
ing completely out-of-town, we are to be trusted with groups of pictures again. And it is welcome news to many of us who, in spite of the improvement brought by the reign of single pictures, still cherished a sneaking fondness for groups—felt there was a certain friendliness about them that the lone picture, however lovely, did not possess.

Properly hung, groups of pictures are delightful. Their modern arrangement most often takes the form of a unit of three or four pictures placed over a dominant piece of furniture such as the davenport, a console table or a heavy chest against the wall. The secretary is a fine anchor for groups placed on either side. The over-mantel space may have one large

A pictorial screen, with fine prints mounted on its panels, offers another good suggestion, and a mirror is the piece de resistance of many a satisfying group.

In building these modern groups great care is taken to have its members nicely related in period, coloring and general treatment, and to see they have harmonizing frames. In size and shape they should avoid too great a variety or too much sameness, on the other hand. And instead of being spread out, hold the pictures fairly close together to better develop the unit idea.

In the room illustrated, for a long time a single landscape had hung over the divan. This year there is this unit of four color engravings, and the landscape is transferred to a bright wall near the window and a great big easy chair. Both changes have given new life and refreshment to the room.

Regardless of their charm, it is well to guard against too many groups. One unit is usually more effective than

of the room. It will furnish a good stimulant for the imagination as well as a fine bit of atmosphere.

Getting away from this particular period, modern maps have made their appearance in many lovely homes. In any study or library such a map would be well placed, since the colorings are very beautiful, and thus welcome from the artistic standpoint, too. It is like an interesting picture for this and the generations to come.
