Local Man Bests California, Idaho In "Spud" Raising

Further proof of the versatility of soil throughout the Cross Plains trade territory and the possibilities for scientific farming were evidenced this week when R. G. Jones, who lives one mile North of Cottonwood sold 2,190 pounds of new pot atces to a local produce concern

The potatoes which were com-parable—if not a better grade than "Idaho and California num ber one select", were grown on one ninth of an acre at the Jones place. The local produce buyer paid \$2.10 per hendred for spuds. Aside from the 2,190 pounds

which Mr. Jones sold as mark-etable potatoes, the small tract also produced 200 pounds of seed potatoes, for which he has a ready market.

The handsome yield for only a ninth of an acre was made from 100 pounds of seed pot-atoes, and Mr. Jones contends, clearly evidences that spuds could be profitably grown here

for commercial market. To receive the very best resuits, Mr. Jones fertilizes his soil early each Fall.

Several of the potatoes—all are splendid specimen—are on display at the Review office.
