Expect Moderate Vote For Election Tuesday

Texans will go to the polls in general election Tuesday, Nov. 7, to select representatives for governmental posts ranging from United States Senator to precinct officials.

Polls will be open in Cross Plains and Callahan County from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Voting will be done at the City Hall in Cross Plains. Judge will be Mrs. W. F. (Katie) Kilgore.

A moderate turnout is expected, although a tax relief measure is to be voted on as one of nine constitutional amendments.

Spirited campaigns have been waged the past several weeks between Democratic and Republican nominees for U. S. Senator, Robert (Bob) Krueger and John Tower respectively; Charles Stenholm (D) and Bill Fisher (R) for U. S. Representative; Democrat John Hill and Republican Bill Clements for Texas Governor, and Mark White (D) and Jim Baker (R) for Texas Attorney General.

There is one race in Callahan County that pits Democratic nominee Dora Hounshell against declared write-in candidate Glenda Ivy for County Treasurer. Mrs. Ivy was loser to Mrs. Hounshell in Democratic runoff election last June by 55 votes.

Family Known Here Hurt In Gas Blast

Mr. and Mrs. Coye Burton and two children of Pearland were burned in the gas pipeline explosion which took six lives in an explosion at a trailer park near Houston early October 24.

Mrs. Burton is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Audy Moore of Cross Plains.

The four persons with local ties all suffered burns, but none were believed to be serious, in the blast and fire which severely damaged the Brookside Village trailer park about 3 a.m. Tuesday of last week. The two children, David, age 8, and Cynthia, age 6, both were hospitalized, and David was believed to be most seriously burned. He is expected to be released the middle of this week.

Mr. and Mrs. Moore reported that their daughter, Betty, said they did not lose their home, in fact only two windows were blown out, but the family was burned trying to escape the blaze. The explosion occurred about 100 yards behind their home. The Burton family reported that they believe that a thick stand of trees between their home and the blast area saved their home from more extensive damage.

Area United Fund Drive Surpasses \$4,000 Goal

Cross Plains Area United Fund has surpassed its budgeted goal of \$4,000.

It is the latest in a long list of United Fund drives to achieve or surpass the amount sought. The campaign this year was seeking \$700 more than the previous few years, up from \$3,300.

A check with the Citizens State Bank at mid-afternoon Monday where officials there are keeping tabs on the drive, showed \$4,127.42 had been credited to the United Fund account since the drive began with a door-to-door canvas on October 6.

Three weeks later, on Friday,

Oct. 27, a \$25 check from the Paul McCowen Family put the drive over the top at \$4,005.29. The goal was pushed near the goal by a generous \$200 donation from J. R. Beadel Co. of

Brownwood a couple of days earlier. The McCowen Family now lives in Abilene, but gave the gift locally in appreciation of the help received several months ago when their home

burned and all possessions were lost.

Dale Bishop, area UF president, and drive co-chairpersons, Mrs. Raymond DeBusk and Mrs. Frank Ferrell, expressed sincere appreciation to each one who helped make the successful drive. "We thank each one who gave, especially those 60 volunteers who worked so long and hard to achieve the goal," Mrs. DeBusk stated.

After the goal had been reached on Friday, two more donations from the Pioneer community, totaling \$122.13 were received on Monday.

Bishop stated that if anyone still wishes to have a part in the drive, and has not yet had an opportunity to give, they may do so at Citizens State Bank or may call him, Mrs. DeBusk or Mrs. Ferrell.

Disbursements of the Area United Fund have been approved as follows: West Texas Rehabilitation Center \$1,300, M. D. Anderson Hospital Tumor Institute \$700, American Red Cross \$200, Salvation Army \$200, Texas Mental Health Association \$100, Southwestern Diabetic Foundation \$200, Christmas cheer program \$300, local and transient relief \$600 and unallocated funds \$400.

It is noted that the Cross Plains Area United Fund is the only sanctioned charitable drive conducted locally.

United Methodist Church To Build New Sanctuary

The First United Methodist Church of Cross Plains, voted at the Church Conference Sunday evening, to build a new sanctuary and educational building on the corner of Highway 206 and George Scott Street.

The well attended conference was presided over by Dr. Jack Riley, Superintendent of the Brownwood District. It is estimated that the new building will cost \$240,000.

The church's pastor, Bill Reed, stated that there is much work to be done, but that the new building should be completed within a year.

Church building now being utilized, located at East 8th and Avenue D, was built in 1925. No plans have yet been made concerning disposal of that building, said Rev. Reed.

More details concerning the building will be printed in coming weeks, advises the pastor.

Mrs. Higgins Given 20 Years In Prison

A 42nd District Court jury at Baird assessed Brenda Sue Higgins of Clyde a 20-year prison term Friday after convicting her of murder in the death of her 5-year-old daughter, Trena.

The trial took almost two weeks from initial proceedings which began on Monday, Oct. 16, to punishment assessment on October 27. It was possibly the longest trial ever held in Callahan County.

Upon being convicted on the beating death of Trena, who died Oct. 21, 1977, and being handed the 20-year sentence, probation was denied. The eight women, four man jury deliberated an hour and 10 minutes setting punishment, coming in at 10:03 p.m. Friday.

Judge Don Lane, who presided, set formal sentencing for Thursday, Nov. 16, at 9 a.m.

The jury deliberated two hours and 45 minutes before finding Mrs. Higgins guilty of the fourth count of a seven-count indictment.

Attorneys for the defense, Ed Paynter and Bill Thomas of Abilene, said the verdict will be appealed.

Prosecution was handled by District Attorney Lynn Ingalsbee.

Judge Lane noted that Mrs. Higgins may remain out of jail on a \$5,000 bond until formal sentencing.

Bufs Drop 32-6 Verdict To Early; Ranger Next

A rapid squad of Early Longhorns stamped past a crippled herd of Cross Plains Buffaloes 32-6 in Buffalo Stadium Friday night in a District 10-A contest.

The contest was Early's fourth conference win, and it was Cross Plains's fourth consecutive loop loss.

Although not large, the Horns were fast, and used the speed to score in every quarter and compile an advantage in statistics. The Longhorns got 19 first downs to 11 for Cross Plains, and had 330 yards total offense, 285 rushing, to 217 for Bisons, 165 on the ground.

It took the visitors nearly all the first quarter before scoring. Horn Taylor Duffer capped an 80-yard, 10-play drive on a 13-yard run with 24 seconds left in the first quarter. With 7:20 left in the first half Quarterback Gregg Eoff hit paydirt on a two-yard plunge upping the count to 12-0 One and two-point conversion tries failed after the tallies respectively.

On last play of the first half Longhorn Jeff Ledsome rambled 70 yards for another six points. Eoff lofted an aerial to Mike

Ledsome for the two bonus points and a 20-0 edge.

Buffaloes quickly scored after intermission as Halfback Randy Dillard sprinted 55 yards for a touchdown after breaking a tackle. A two-point conversion run attempt by Dillard was stopped short. But with less than two minutes gone in second half Buffs cut the deficit to 20-6.

Duffer climaxed another long, sustained march for Early, by going the final yard with 2:46 left in the third canto. Incomplete conversion pass left the tally at 26-6. Longhorn Wes Johnson zipped 57 yards with 8:10 left in the game for the final tally. Lorenzo Rivera's kick was wide leaving the tally 32-6.

Bisons mounted another threat later in the game, but an intercepted pass at the Early 9 thwarted that thrust.

An already crippled Herd was hurt more when Robby Bailey suffered a fractured leg. He joins starter Glynn Nickerson, who is in an Abilene hospital where he underwent surgery on a leg Tuesday of last week, as out for the season.

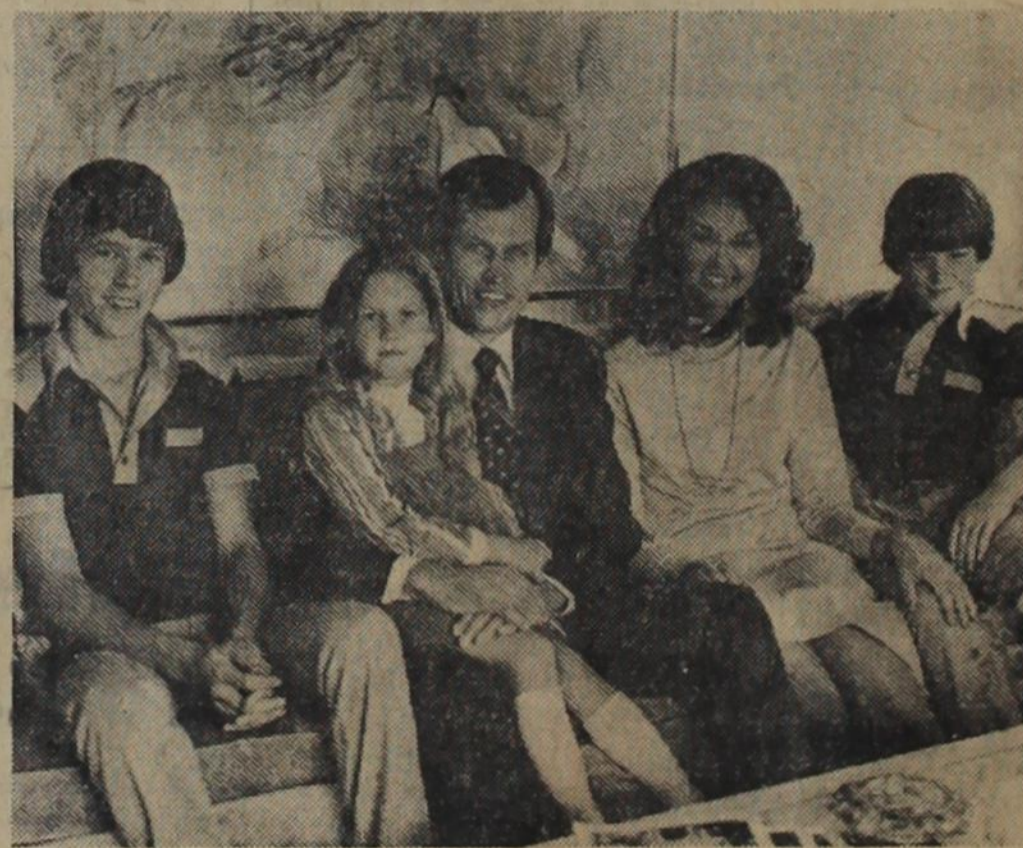

Conservation Help Is Now Available

Applications for assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program are now being received by the Soil Conservation Service, stated A. H. Ringhoffer, with the Baird Field Office.

The GPCP, administered by the SCS, aims at bringing about a more nearly permanent solution to problems resulting from drought and the cultivation of land unsuited for sustained crop production, Ringhoffer stated.

Under the program, the SCS through the local Central Colorado and Lower Clear Fork of the Brazos Soil and Water Conservation Districts help land owners and operators develop and follow a conservation plan. This plan enables the land users to make needed adjustments in land use and to install conservation measures on their land.

Technical assistance and cost sharing help the land users carry out conservation plans over a period of from 3 to 10 years. Cost sharing is limited to installing permanent conservation practices, Ringhoffer said, and money is obligated when the plan is developed and the contract signed.

Over 180 Great Plains contracts have been developed and carried out in Callahan County since 1960, Ringhoffer stated. Practices carried out by local land users include reseeded permanent grass on cropland or on depleted rangeland, grassed waterways and terrace systems or cropland, cross fences for better distribution of grazing along with wells, pipelines and water storage facilities for livestock water.

Land users desiring additional information as to what extent the conservation practices would apply to their farm or ranch can obtain it by contacting the local SCS office in Baird.
