# FHA to Guarantee Emergency Livestock - Poultry Producer Loans

Financial assistance to livestock and poultry producers under the Emergency Livestock Credit Act will become available next week through a new loan guarantee authority of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), a rural credit service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Charles H. Henderson, FmHA County Supervisor, said agency will be prepared to implement the recently-enacted law by guaranteeing up to 80 percent of possible loss on loans made by legally organized lenders to livestock and poultry producers.

Under terms of the act, the loan guarantee will be in effect through July 25, 1975. It may be extended for 6 months beyond that date if the Secretary of Agriculture determines that it is needed to help the livestock industry obtain sufficient credit.

The law calls for loans to be made by banks or other legally organized lenders. Mr. Henderson said interested producers are urged to make applications to, and complete loan arrangements with lending institutions. The lender in turn will ask FmHA for a loan guarantee if one is required. The lender will process the application, close the loan and service it.

The maximum loan to any single borrower that can be assisted by an FmHA guarantee is \$250,000. Loans will be payable in 1 to 3 years, although renewal for 3 years may be authorized. Interest rates are determined between borrower and lender.

Mr. Henderson said the agency is authorized to guarantee up to 80 percent loss a lender may incur on loans to bonafide farmers and ranchers who breed, raise, fatten or market beef and dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, chickens and turkeys. A majority of the borrower's income must come from the operation, and a majority portion of the borrowers time must be devoted to the livestock or poultry production.

In the case of a corporation or partnership, assistance can be extended only when the majority partners or stockholders are primarily engaged in the

livestock or poultry production. FmHA guarantee will be made only when the bonafide farmer or rancher cannot obtain financing without guarantee. Loans may not be used to expand operations.

Mr. Henderson said the county FmHA office serving the area where the borrower's livestock or poultry operations are conducted will handle requests from lenders for guarantee, or supply information on the loan guarantee program.

# Cystic Fibrosis Breath of Life Campaign Needs Volunteers

CLYDE — There are six million reasons why the Breath of Life Campaign needs volunteers—six million boys and girls who have the inherited incurable disease cystic fibrosis or other lung diseases like chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, severe asthma, and a condition sometimes called "childhood emphysema."

"These children need our attention - they demand our concerted effort to do something about lung diseases," said Mrs. Mary Driggers, chairman of the Breath of Life Campaign for Clyde for the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation.

The National Foundation supports over 100 Centers across the country, six of which are located in Texas. At these clinics children suffering lung diseases are diagnosed and treated. It also supports continuous research, seeking a cure or more effective control for cystic fibrosis and the development of new techniques to make possible a practical test to determine carriers of the C/F gene.

Money contributed through

the Breath of Life Campaign over the years has made possible research and care which has significantly increased the life expectancy of C/F children. Although cystic fibrosis is still incurable, these children are living into the teen years and increasing numbers are reaching young adulthood. This research has also brought tremendous advantages in the treatment of other chronic respiratory illnesses. Today, many of these diseases can be cured, and all respond favorably to treatment.

"Obviously, we are tremendously encouraged by the progress to date," said Mrs. Driggers, "but so much more needs to be done. Anyone willing to devote a little time can work in a number of Breath of Life Campaign activities. The rewards are great, for you will be truly making possible the breath of life for those who cannot take breathing for granted."

# Parents Urged to "Safety Proof" Youngsters as Schools Begin

It's that time of the year again when parents should attempt to "Safety Proof" their youngsters, many of whom entered school for the first time.

Whether walking, riding in a bus or car, or bicycling to school, plans should be made to insure the safety of every child, reminds the Texas State Department of Health.

Darting across streets without looking, crossing at mid-block from between parked cars, and doing bicycle tricks in traffic are just a few of the pitfalls to be avoided.

If you have a child who might be bicycling this year, here are a few simple rules you might make him more familiar with:

A skillful rider always has his bike under control. He never drives too fast and he never rides too far. He always has both hands free to steer. The cyclist must develop skill in balancing and pedaling to avoid swerving into traffic, hitting a fixed object, running off the sidewalk or highway. Parents have the responsibilities to be certain their child can cope with traffic before permitting him to ride on the street.

Cyclist must ride on the right side of the street with the flow of traffic - not on the left side facing traffic. Hand signals

should be used by the cyclists, and are commonly understood by all. Cyclists should avoid crowding between cars at stop signs, or between an automobile and the curb. Do not carry more passengers than a bike is designed for. Two on a bike increases stopping distances greatly.

Never hold onto a moving vehicle, and always ride single file. Trick riding is always dangerous. Drivers of hi-risers are especially cautioned against making the bike rear up and riding on the back wheels only, or jumping over obstacles.

If you, as parents, will just teach your children these rules of the road, maybe we will have really "Safety Proofed" our youngsters.

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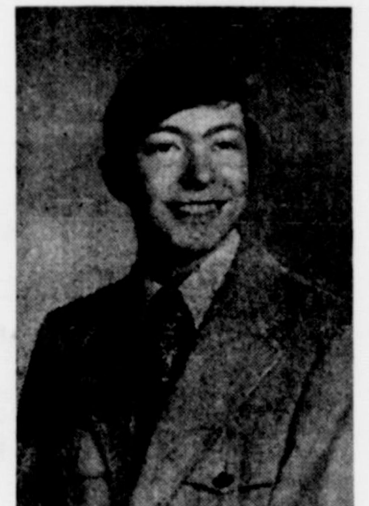

We live in a world today that is ever-learning but unable to grasp an answer for many of its questions. The Bible, the Word of the Lord, is a store of whose contents no man can afford to be ignorant. Many people ask the question, "HOW OLD IS PLANET EARTH?" They read where science tells them that certain rocks and fossils of prehistoric creatures are millions of years old. Then they ask, "doesn't the Bible tell us that the earth is only 6,000 years old?" The answer to that question is definitely "NO." According to the geneologies in the Bible we can be confident that "MAN" is approximately 6,000 years old.

THE BIBLE GOES BACK TO THE BEGINNING. If the beginning was ten Billions years ago, then that is how far the Bible record takes us. We find in Genesis 1:1 that God created a perfect world (God never created a world in chaos, He only creates perfection). It is interesting to note that science has never produced any substantial evidence to prove that man existed more than 6,000 years ago. So, what most people think of as the original creation was actually "THE RESTORATION" of the original creation.

We know life in creatures existed in the original creation (hence man's futile attempts to link our race by "evolution" to some of these ancient creatures).

Also note that God said to Adam in Gen. 1:28 the same thing he said to Noah when he got out of the ark (Gen. 9:1) which was "be fruitful and multiply and replenish the earth." How can something be "REPLENISHED" if it had not already been previously "PLENISHED" or created?

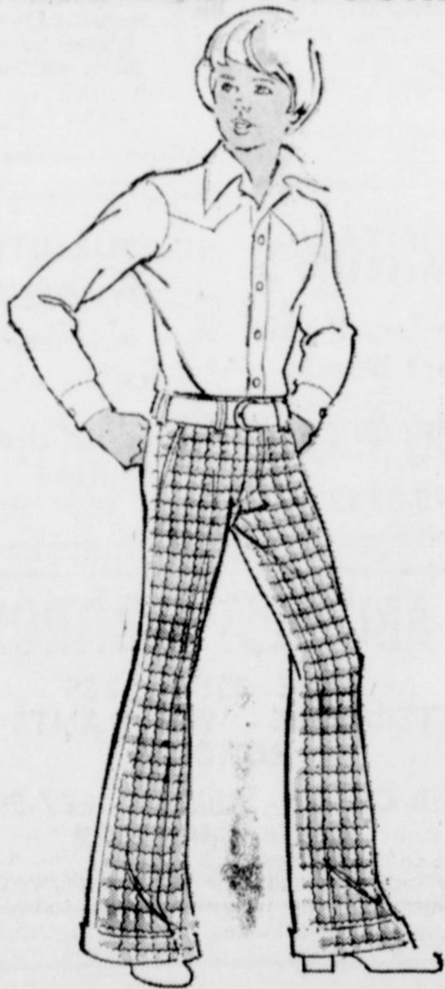

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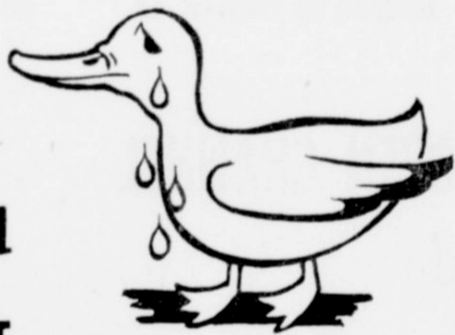
