Other candidates whose names appeared on the ballot were Melvin Barton of Dimmitt; Charles Heck, Jr. of Nazareth; and Martin Gossett, Jr. of Dumas. There were 61 write-in candidates recorded on the ballots.

The total number voting was only 1,065 even though 28,000 ballots with post paid return envelopes were mailed to farmers with extra ballots placed at each county agent's office.

Grain Sorghum Harvest Problems

The annual problem of "when to cut" is again facing grain sorghum producers, with an added twist this year. Grain is coming into elevators with higher - than - normal moisture content.

The late rains and subnormal temperatures have delayed drying of the grain, which is constantly threatened with wind loss during the fall months, according to Marvin Sartin, Extension area economist at Lubbock.

Producers must decide whether to go ahead and accept the reduced price that goes with early harvest or to wait for the grain to field dry and take a chance on yield loss.

Ray Anthis, chief inspector for the Lubbock Grain Exchange, says the recent rains caused sucker heads to emerge on the plants, which increases the moisture level of the entire crop.

"As of last week, the number carloads moved through

Lubbock was only about ten per cent of the amount moved by the same date last year," Anthis says. He explained that harvest usually peaks the last half of October, but will probably come much later this year.

A possibility that presents problems to both the producer and the elevator manager is the chance of an early frost. The young suckers would be frozen and dried out, Anthis explains, but the endosperm will remain white. A test at the elevator

will show the load of grain to be low enough in moisture, but damage will still occur. Anthis says the white endosperm will eventually turn brown and show signs of heat damage without ever getting hot.

Elevators generally desire grain with 14 per cent moisture or lower, which is at the level commonly referred to as "storable moisture." Grain which is harvested at 20 per cent moisture will lose about seven per cent of its weight

to shrinkage by the time the elevator can dry it to 14 per cent, says John Seibert, grain marketing specialist at Texas A & M University.

Grain harvested at lower moisture levels loses much less weight to shrinkage. For instance, 18 - per - cent moisture grain will lose only 4.6 per cent of its weight when dried to 14 per cent moisture.

Another factor that Seibert points out is that there is much less carry - over in elevat-

ors than in past years. Ordinarily, an elevator can combine the new grain with older material that is very low in moisture, and help in the overall drying process. Reduced yields in recent years, plus the big increase in sorghum use, has resulted in very little carry-over, he says.

The obvious question is "why doesn't the producer just wait until the grain is field dried?" Here is where vital decisions must be made, Old Man Weather is the chief factor.

The dock on wet grain may seem like quite a large sum, but one day of damaging wind can easily offset the income gained by waiting to harvest.

Also, the producer must often schedule his harvest to match weight. Under the heavy financing that most crops are burdened with, it is easy to see why the producer harvests early.

There are alternatives to every question; and this is just another of the problems faced by High Plains and Panhandle producers, whether to harvest early or wait.

Congressman Lloyd Bentsen

WASHINGTON - Senator Lloyd Bentsen today joined in sponsoring the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act. The bill would expand the loan authorization of the Farmers' Home Administration and create a Rural Development Credit System in which both local banks and units of government, as well as state district planning and development agencies, would participate as member institutions.

"This legislation will give rural Americans the tools to begin a needed revitalizing process throughout the rural sections of our nation," Senator Bentsen stated, "and there is clearly a need for action when job opportunities and community facilities in rural America result in 70 percent of our people crowding into cities covering only 2 percent of our land."

By providing previously unavailable credit for projects having a rural development purpose, the bill's sponsors hope to provide needed capital to revitalize economically declining rural areas.

Incentives for industry to expand into rural regions and access to technical assistance are also provided.

"New industrial development and construction of community facilities will mean sustained, orderly growth for rural America," Bentsen commented.

He cited the bill's principle authors, Senators Hubert Humphrey and Herman Talmadge, for showing "great foresight in their planning."

"One local television announcer is always giving the weather report from a place called Muleshoe. I wonder how he manages to get it. I have great difficulty in finding how much rain fell during the day in Seguin. Thus far the only way I can find out is to take one of the Seguin weekly newspapers and get it a week late."

That Muleshoe report isn't a spoof. It's on the level. Some months back the local television weatherman was driving through Muleshoe and later spotted a rainfall report from Muleshoe and put it on the air. He did this several times, then skipped it, and then resumed it when people called in and demanded to know how the weather in Muleshoe in the Texas

Pantlandie was doing.
"They don't ever ask me about the weather in San Antonio any more," he said. "They just want to know what's the weather doing in Muleshoe."
You're right about Seguin though. It's a hard spot to get weather data from. Seguin seldom appears on the National Weather Service reports. Hot Line will see whether some kind of area report can be worked up like the Texas report, showing the high and low and rainfall for all of the area towns. No doubt many people would like to have this information on a daily basis. If you think the National Weather Service ought to supply such a daily service, write Hot Line. It will help.
Incidentally, the Muleshoe report comes daily from I.V. Paeler, who is head of Muleshoe's Southwestern Public Service Company. He phones in his reports at 8:30 a.m. each morning to the Lubbock Weather Service office. Lubbock puts it on the wire.
If we can get the San Antonio Weather Service to cooperate then San Antonians will be able to get such daily reports from places like Seguin, New Brandfels, San Marcos, Hondo, Pleasanton, Devine, and other area towns you want to hear about.

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

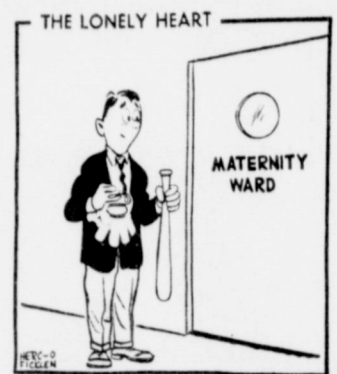

It was pointed out at the three day training session that in order for farmers to reach high crop yields, we are going to have to look at more than just the N, P, and K in the soil. Other plant food elements are a definite factor in crop production. According to the local CFS Crop Advisor, Robert Moss, we must first get a complete soil analysis to determine what plant food elements to apply to reach these high yields.

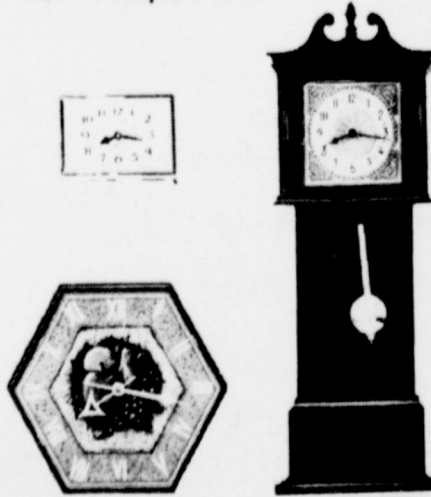
