

Local School Enrollment Up; Pupil Count At 396 Tuesday

Enrollment figures at Cross Plains Schools were up some Tuesday, first day of the second week of classes in the district.

Tuesday's total enrollment figure stood at 396.

That is an actual increase of 10 students over first-day count. It reflects a rise of 13 students, because somewhere in the initial day's shuffle three students were overlooked, two in elementary grades and one in high school.

Principal Ray Womack reported a total of 281 students in elementary grades, kindergarten through eighth grade, on Tuesday, and Ray Freeman, high school principal stated that 115 students were enrolled in classes in the top four grades.

First day last week high school count was listed at 111 pupils, but should have been 112. A net gain of three scholastics is shown in the high school.

A count of 272 pupils was reported in elementary grades first day of school, but the number should have been 274. Tuesday figures showed that 281 students were attending classes in the kindergarten through eighth grade. It is an actual increase of seven students.

It was hoped by both principals that additional enrollment gains will be made in coming weeks. It was learned, however that several young students will be moving on Thursday. The Eddie Albrecht family plans to move to Rockport.

The 115 student count in high school puts Cross Plains in the Class B classification bracket according to University Inter-scholastic League brackets. It was opened by local officials that it would be about two years

A "great team effort" brought the Cross Plains Buffaloes a 2-1 win in a scrimmage session with the Brownwood Juniors last Thursday. The session, which involved the varsity unit only, was held at old Lion Stadium at Brownwood.

Athletic Director Chuck Eoff stated that there was a great deal of improvement in offensive execution and tremendous improvement and progress made on both offense and defense by individuals, after the scrimmage. That statement was made in comparing it to the scrimmage at Albany a week earlier.

"Buffaloes have taken a great deal of pride in working together as a team this year," Eoff stated. "It was a real good scrimmage and workout," he continued.

Cross Plains tallied twice in the controlled game-type scrimmage. Junior back Robby Bailey scampered 65 yards for a touchdown. The other tally came on a 12-yard pass from junior quarterback Duane Hutchins to senior end Allen Phillips. It was pointed out that another senior back, Randy Dillard, was probably the Buffs' leading rusher.

It was emphasized that all the backs, who did creditable jobs, gave credit to some fine line blocking.

"We had better all-around execution by the offense," Eoff stated again. He continued that the defense "came to play" and with the exception of one temporary breakdown contained Brownwood. "They gave a little," the coach stated, "but they never did break."

He added that it was great team effort and a great scrimmage. "The attitude is superb this year, and seniors are providing good leadership," he emphasized.

City To Retain 1% Utilities Sales Tax

City of Cross Plains will retain the one per cent city sales tax on residential natural gas and electric bills.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock stated this week that the earliest possible date under the new law for residential consumers of gas and electricity to not pay the tax will be October 1.

A release from the office of

the Comptroller of Public Accounts stated that the Texas Legislature passed a law during its recent special session repealing the four per cent state tax on residential utility bills effective October 1.

The press release went on, "That law also automatically repeals the one per cent city tax on residential utilities Oc-

tober 1, 1979, unless the city government votes to continue the tax."

City official sources said that it was voted by the City Council to retain the one per cent city sales tax after due consideration. It was opined that the one per cent tax per residential customer amounted to only pennies in most instances, but combined monthly and yearly added up to a sizeable amount of revenue. That money would have to be made up if the one per cent residential utility tax were repealed here. A city official stated, "We felt it would be better to retain the one per cent residential utility tax, which is of some help in financing city operations, rather than raising ad valorem taxes."

Cross Plains residents will get some relief effective October 1, 1978, when the four per cent state sales tax is lifted from bills of residential gas and electrical consumers.

Monday's Showers Bring Sprinkles To Downpours

Rain showers, appearing more like springtime clouds with lightning, wind and rain than late summer clouds, roamed through the Cross Plains area yesterday afternoon for the third consecutive Monday.

As in the past two weeks, rainfall was spotted and varied greatly in small distances.

Proving the latter point a gauge in the north part of Cross Plains showed just .10 of an inch. About midway of the city, at the J. T. Foster place, .30 of an inch was reported, and B. C. McCowen, who lives on the

southern edge of town said he measured .50 of an inch of rain.

Throughout the Cross Plains area, moisture totals ranged from sprinkles to three inches.

Heaviest report of rain was from Roger Watson at his lease about four miles north of Burkett. A gauge there showed three inches. Limbs were also broken from many trees there, indicating considerable wind in the area.

Cross Cut also received heavy rains in the late afternoon cloud. L. E. Newton received 2.25 inches, it was reported to the Review, and O. B. Byrd gauged 1.50 inches. Byrd stated that there was some wind with the cloud, but that he had no damage.

Mrs. N. V. Gibbs reported .70 of an inch of rain at her place, but also stated that in the northern part of the community precipitation was markedly lighter.

W. H. (Nig) Neeb, who lives about midway between here and Rowden, reported a heavy down pour which measured 1.90 inches. He also said there was wind with the rain, but it caused no damage at his place.

Rain was also spotted in the Pioneer sector. W. O. (Doc) Rachels said he got just .10 of an inch, while to the east at the J. T. Beggs place .60 of an inch fell.

Most of the Cottonwood area and Atwell sectors got only a very light sprinkle from Monday's cloud. Alton Tatom of the Atwell Community reported he measured .40 of an inch of rain last Thursday. A light sprinkle fell in Cross Plains at that time.

Edwin Erwin said that the cloud chased him from the field where he was sowing grain in his field in the Sabanno Community, but not a drop of rain fell on his place.

The outlook for cash crops is bright, and pastures are growing rapidly. Late hay crops also look good, and most earthen stock tanks in the area are brimming.

Daily potential was 123 barrels of 40.3 gravity oil, plus six barrels of water.

Flow was through a 9-64-inch choke with packer set on the casing with 528 pounds tubing pressure.

The well is producing from perforations at 3,848-64 feet treated with 650 gallons of acid.

The pay was fractured with 10,000 gallons of gel and 10,000 pounds of sand.

Tax Relief Is Among 9 Proposed Changes

Lyndell Williams, head of the Texas Press Association, reports that Texans will be voting November 7—including the tax relief proposal advanced in special session last month to the general election ballot.

The amendments, in order include:

- The tax relief measures—broadened exemptions and special assessment of farm lands.
- Direction for state buyers to consider purchasing products from the handicapped where available.
- Authority for cities and counties to issue industrial development bonds.
- Provision for tax increment financing of urban renewal.
- Property tax exemptions for solar and wind-powered energy devices.
- An increase in civil case jurisdiction of justice of the peace courts from \$200 maximum controversies to those involving \$500, with the legislature empowered to increase the limit to \$1,000.
- Provision for adding more judges to the 14 three-judge state courts of civil appeals.
- Abolishing the State Building Commission and building fund.
- Permission for water districts to furnish fire-fighting services and issue bonds to finance them where voters approve by a two-thirds majority.

Campaigns already are shaping up on the tax relief measure. Gov. Dolph Briscoe is urging support. Texas United Labor Legislative Committee is opposing the amendment as of small benefit to small taxpayers.

New Brides Need To Change Records

New brides who change their names have many official records to change, says Lillian Chenoweth, family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Place of employment is one of the first places to start.

Employers need to know of a new status for pay check purposes and to avoid confusion with federal taxes.

When making name change on insurance policies, consider any change in beneficiaries at the same time.

To change social security records, call the nearest office of the agency and request a name-change form.

After completing and returning the form, a new card will be issued. The number will remain the same.

Another place to change the record is the driver's license office. They will issue a new license for a new name.

To update credit records, notify the local credit bureau of a name change.

Request that they maintain separate files for the bride and her husband in order to retain a credit identity for the bride.

Change all bank accounts—saving or checking—to the new legal name.

When forming a joint checking account, know that such an account is considered a part of the husband's credit record.

To keep a credit identity, open a separate checking account under the bride's first name plus her new last name.

A separate saving account is not essential to establishing a credit record because it cannot show reliability in paying debts.

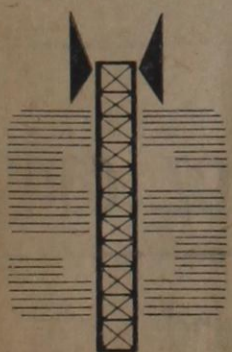

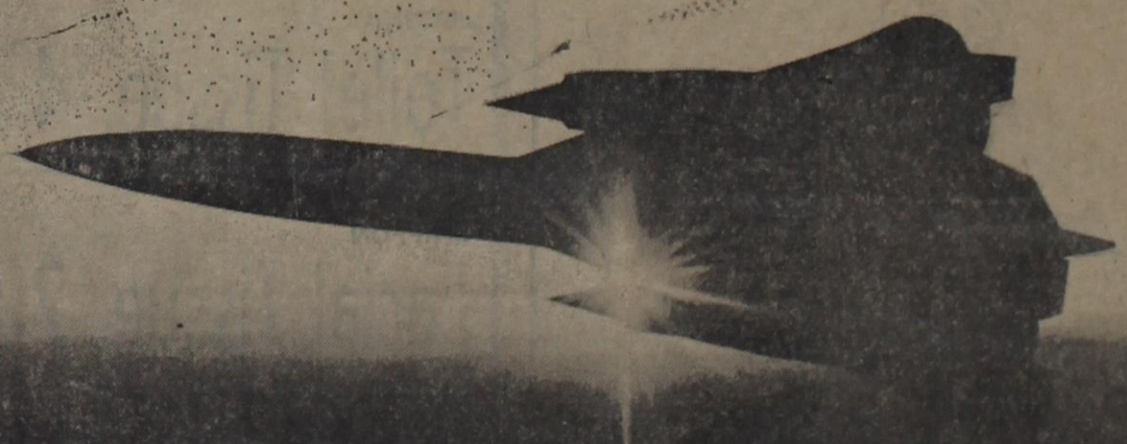
