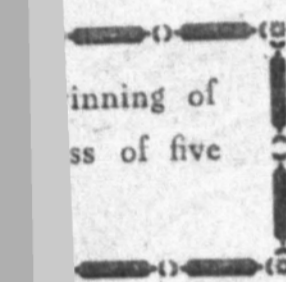

Local Business Man Expects to Put  
In Plant That Will Cost  
About \$7,000

Joe Shackelford, who last year  
made an effort to interest our  
people in a potato curing plant,  
states that he will put up one  
himself this summer that will  
take care of the crop for the  
whole country. He is planning  
one with a twenty thousand  
bushel capacity that will cost  
\$7,000. Mr. Shackelford inspec-  
ted one at Longview recently, and  
brought home a potato that had  
been cured in it; a perfect po-  
tato, and likely better in quality  
than a fresh one.

### CYCLONE HITS NEAR BAIRD

Five Freight Cars Blown from Track  
Two Residences Destroyed  
No One Injured

A young cyclone passed thru  
the country just this side of  
Baird, last Sunday afternoon at  
about 3 o'clock, doing consider-  
able damage. Five cars about  
the center of a moving freight  
train, coming in contact with the  
cyclone at the first bridge east of  
Baird, were blown off the track,  
four rolling down the long em-  
bankment about fifty feet, and  
were badly demolished; the  
other merely being turned over  
by the side of the track. The  
only thing left on the track  
where the cars were was one  
pair of trucks. A vacant rent  
house belonging to Dr. Grigg's  
father two miles this side of  
Baird was literally torn to pieces  
and blown across the fence. The  
home of Cliff McManus east of  
town was turned around. Also  
a cow is reported to have been  
lodged in a tree and one calf  
taken out of the pen. C. S. Gee  
who visited some of the wrecks  
refuses to vouch for the cow  
stories.

### Brother Killed In Birmingham

D. I. Hill left Monday for Bir-  
mingham, Alabama, in response to  
a message stating that his brother  
Sam, had been killed in a street  
car accident. The latter formerly  
lived here and has many friends  
who regret the sad accident.

### Three New Rigs Arrive.

Walter Martin of Denver has se-  
cured acreage from Vandarsal and  
Ship eight miles northwest of Cole-  
man and will begin drilling at once.  
The Martin rig arrived Wednesday  
and will be erected on the George  
Jones tract about eight miles north-  
west.

The rig of the Noble Oil Company  
represented here by Fred Karris of  
San Diego, California, arrived early  
in the week and was being moved  
out Wednesday to the Dibrell lands,  
ten miles east. The initial well of  
the Noble Company will be drilled  
on the Hamilton Kegan 498, and  
near the center of the Regan Sur-  
vey.

The rig of the Empire Company,  
together with a car load of casing,  
is being unloaded this week. The  
Empire Company will begin drilling  
at once on the Neff tract, location hav-  
ing been made on the northwest cor-  
ner of the tract.

### Notes of the Field

It is authoritatively stated that the  
Tittle Oil Company and the Prairie Oil  
and Gas Co. have each entered into  
development contracts in the county,  
the details of which may soon be given  
to the public.

The Bailey well near Grosvenor is  
said to be at a depth of approximat-  
ely 1500 feet and that 10-inch casing  
is being placed.

The Mitchells will make their first  
shipment of five car loads of oil next  
Monday. The oil will be consigned  
to the Magnolia refinery, Fort Worth.  
The Mitchells have a 1200-barrel  
storage on the Magnolia premises  
which has been filled and is being piped  
to their 1600 barrel tank on the  
siding in Coleman, from which the  
oil is loaded by gravity into cars.

Mitchell No. 2 will be drilled 660  
feet north of No. 1; gas from No. 1  
will be used in drilling and also  
for cooking at the Mitchell camps.

A complete water system is being  
completed by the Mitchells for drill-  
ing out their Gray lease. A concrete  
dam has been placed across Pecan  
Bayou and a 60,000-gallon reservoir  
has been erected on a hill which will  
apply water by gravity to any part  
of the lease.—Democrat Voice.

### BOND SALE

The Liberty Bond rally that was to  
be held on Saturday afternoon and  
then again on Monday afternoon was  
not held because outside speakers  
could not be present. A goodly num-  
ber of men ask about the rally both  
days. According to the Review's  
opinion, the rally should have been  
held by local people inasmuch as  
others were not able to be present  
and so many expected it and are  
waiting for a good chance to buy  
bonds. The rally will be held next  
Saturday afternoon if the speakers  
arrive. Everybody knows his duty  
and will not need much prodding to  
do it.

A few of the local citizens went  
out to Dressy on Monday night and  
secured \$1200. Rev. C. R. Kidd was  
the principal speaker, and he goes in  
to the work whole soully, and is more  
over quite an eloquent talker.

### ADEQUATE WATER SUPPLY

M. S. Moore, who has the contract  
for digging the city wells, reports  
fine progress in the work and an  
abundance of water in all wells thus  
far. Well No. 1 was dug 23 1/2 feet  
deep, and No. 2 29 feet, both on the  
city lot where the first well was put  
down in 1911. The first one stands  
10 1/4 feet in water and the second 11  
feet. All wells are 4 feet in circum-  
ference. The third well has been  
started and was down 20 feet Mon-  
day, standing 2 1/2 feet in water. The  
first two wells will furnish, accord-  
ing to Mr. Moore about 7,000 gallons  
of water daily. In all five wells will  
be dug, and that would give the city  
all the water it will need for ordinary  
purposes. The pipes will be laid  
from the well to the stand pipe in  
the near future, when the city will be  
again served with water. On with

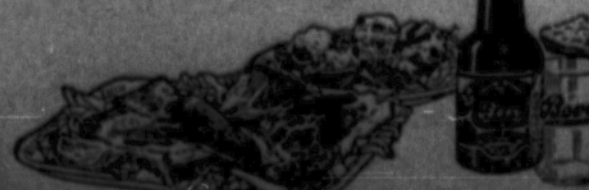

### VISITS SAN ANTONIO

I with others left Burkett at 4:20 in the morning in an automobile, ate breakfast at Brady, then journeyed on my way, following the southwestern Trail Highway from Brady to Mason and from Mason to Fredericksburg, there ate dinner then journeyed on my way. The next stop was Boerne. They were holding a city election there that day and sahoons were all closed, so I went on to San Antonio, arriving there at about 8:30 that afternoon, went out to Camp Travis to see my brother, Earl and Lawrence Brown also my other boy friends that are stationed there namely, Bent Harris, Avi Boyle, Webb Harvey Duffrey Emond Margan Porter, Rocco Parver and Leon Johnson are home boys from Burkett, Gee, when I arrive at the Camp the boys were glad to see me, and I was equally as glad to see them well, after a bit Earl and Lawrence had me to go with them back over to their barracks and endeavored to show me through the barracks and by that time it was night. Then Earl and I went to town and saw sights to numerous to mention, Earl was only allowed to stay out till eleven o'clock that night, so I went back to the army camp with him and spent the night. At 5:50 o'clock next morning new time, the bugle blew and the boys had to get up and dress in fifteen minutes and march and train fifteen minutes before breakfast and it was not daylight either so I watched them go through with this first act, then at breakfast with the boys and they had plenty to eat, believe me, potatoes, beef, post toasts, oat meal, butter, lemon pie and jelly, cake, coffee to drink. After we got through eating breakfast, Earl and Lawrence had to go to drilling, so I went back to town and saw the sights of the city the balance of the day. Then I went back to Camp Travis, and spent the night with the boys again, and next morning I enjoyed another good meal with them. After spending two night with the boys in the Camp I must say that army life is more pleasant than I expected to find it, everything is just as nice and clean as can be, and when they get sick they have the best of care and treatment at the hospital, good nurses and good doctors to treat them.

So after eating breakfast with the boys the second morning I departed and started on my homeward march, it took me about an hour to get started on the right road out of San Antonio. I ran along nicely for about seventy miles out of San Antonio, there I came to a great railroad tunnel three hundred yards of course I stepped out and went down to the tunnel for it was the first one I had ever seen. I walked clean through the tunnel and when I got about half way through it was dark as night I thought of everything above me including God and the Holy Angels, about two thirds of the way through this tunnel was a fine spring of water I lay down on the railroad track and hung my head off and took a good drink of water out of that spring. 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### BRITISH REPULSE ALL GERMAN ATTACKS

THOUSANDS OF ENEMY DEAD COVER GROUND IN FRONT OF ALLIED LINE.

### FRENCH CALLED ON TO HELP

More Than 110 Enemy Divisions Have Been Thrown into the Battle Since March 21.

London.—The entire line in Belgium and France was holding firm Sunday. Nowhere had the Germans been able, notwithstanding the great numbers of men hurled against it, especially that portion in Flanders where the British are holding forth, to gain an inch of ground. Field Marshal Haig's order that no more ground be ceded is rigidly being complied with, as is attested by the thousands of German dead now lying before the British positions southwest of Ypres, where it is the ambition of the high German command to break through and envelope Field Marshal Haig's forces and gain an open highway toward the English channel.

Northwest of St. Mihiel the American troops have been compelled to withstand a series of persistent assaults, surpassed in intensity only by those delivered against the British in Flanders. And the honors at the end rested with the Americans, who met the foe at every style of fighting offered and decisively defeated him.

London.—Field Marshal Haig's report from headquarters in France Thursday night says:

"Strong pressure has been maintained by the enemy all day south and southwest of Baillieul. Constant attacks in great force were made in this area and are continuing.

"Our troops have been pushed back slowly in continuous fighting to positions in the neighborhood of the Baillieul railroad, where they are heavily engaged with the enemy.

"More than 110 German divisions so far have been engaged since the morning of March 21, and more than 40 of them have been thrown into the battle two or three times

London.—German forces launched heavy attacks Thursday afternoon against the French in the Hangard-En-Santerre sector, east of Amiens. The fighting continued throughout the day. Several attacks ended in failure, but finally fresh German troops penetrated Hangard, although the western section of the village was regained by the French, according to the war office announcement. American and French troops, fighting together, repelled a German attack in the Apremont forest.
