
More than 100,000 cars will be required for government purposes during the next three months. Transportation facilities will be taxed to capacity by commercial requirements during this period. Government business must have preference however, and effective conservation of equipment is therefore imperative. Additional facilities and equipment can not be had now. We must do the best we can with what we have.

Carriers and shippers alike have been wasteful in the use of cars. It is the patriotic duty, of both to economize. Wherever possible, light loading of cars, delays in loading or unloading, and kindred practices must be avoided as in violation of national welfare.


