**Spikes for Belts, Ladies Ties, Fancy Notions, Etc.**

The legislature unmercifully killed Shaw's maximum freight bill. The love developed for the small towns by the members was as wonderful as it was pathetic. The members who opposed the bill were so fearful of losing the commission that they were afraid to permit the roads to make a lower rate than the commission rate. If any more absurd reason was ever given for voting against a bill we have never heard of it. The railroads have things grabbed and of course do not want any change, and the legislature seems disposed to let them have their way.

Representative Southwick of New York has been urged to introduce a bill in the House the next session proposing to grant a medal of honor to every man who served three years or more in the Civil War and who has not applied for a pension. The suggestion that such a resolution be passed by Congress originated with a Chicago man who recently visited the pension office and found to his astonishment that nearly every one who served in his company was either getting a pension or had applied for one. Having personal knowledge of the many groups on which many of these claim were made, the gentleman, who knew Mr. Southwick, suggested the idea of the medals.—Ex.

The Dallas News is authority for the statement that the public debt has increased more than one hundred and fifty millions since McKinley was elected. Pittsburg, Pa., had a \$350,000 fire. Liverpool Cotton exchange will be closed April 5, 6 and 7.

The courthouse at Fayette, Miss. burned. The loss is about \$15,000.

A great seal catch has been made at Labrador. The seal was first arrived at St. John with 25,000 on board.

In a recent fight at Oney precinct, Morgan county, Kentucky, ten men were wounded, three of them fatally.

The authorities at Cape Town here approve the new invention of a Maxim gun mounted on a motor car for immediate service.

Mayor Van Wyck of New York has called Carnegie's statue in front of the thanks of Greater New York for his offer to erect library buildings.

At Greenboro, Ala., his native city, Capt. R. F. Hobson was presented by citizens with an elegant silver service with designs of the sinking of the Merimac.

A young man at Perth, Ind., shot his sweetheart and then turned the revolver upon himself. He is dead, but the young lady will live. She had discarded him.

Madisonville, the county seat of Hopkins county, Kentucky, suffered a loss of \$125,000 to \$150,000. The insurance is \$120,000. Two tobacco factories burned.

The contractors at work in connection with the canal deepened the lower than a million dollars for failure to complete the work in the time specified.

It was said at the war department that no investigation has been started as to the extent of military secrets known to foreign attaches stationed in Washington.

Three hundred arrests were made in one day at St. Petersburg. The minister of Justice was fired and recently the life of another minister has been attempted.

President James K. Patterson of Kentucky College has announced that in his will he has set aside \$50,000 for a library as a memorial to his deceased son.

George Cadbury, the chocolate manufacturer, has presented to the city of Birmingham, Eng., an estate of 461 acres valued at £130,000, which he has offered to build houses for the working classes.

The flagship Keokauk of the North Atlantic squadron has been ordered to the New York navy yard to have the 12-inch gun which was damaged off Florida coast replaced by a new one.

United States Minister Dudley at Lima, Peru, cabled the state department that the government of Peru had offered to settle for 2000 souls the Pikes claim, and he was immediately instructed to accept the offer.

It has been announced that the turf congress has closed the season by the purchase of Douglas Park Louisville, the mile trotting track situated a few miles from Churchill Downs, and it will be operated against the latter this spring.

Marcus Stein, assignee for James Shirley has brought suit against Wm. C. Greene of the Greene Consolidated Copper company, a West Virginia corporation, for recovery of \$1,000,000, being the commission claimed by Shirley for the sale of 100,000 shares of stock.

William Maxwell, of wireless telegraphy fame, has arrived in America. His trip to this country is in connection with establishing stations along the coast to communicate with sailing steamers, and also with outgoing steamers.

Secretary Hay had a long conference with Senator Morgan regarding the usual canal matters and the advisability of reopening negotiations for a treaty with Great Britain on the subject.

Municipal council of Venice offers a prize of 200,000 lire to any Italian or foreign navigator who may discover the lost coast from Mozambique to the Norwegian sailor who disappeared from the exploring party of the Duke of Abruzzi during an Arctic expedition.

Members of the New York Cotton exchange have addressed to the board of managers a petition asking that the exchange be closed on Good Friday, April 5 and 6. Good Friday is held today both in Liverpool and in New Orleans.

George Hunt, attorney general of the state of Illinois from 1884 to 1892 and a veteran of the Civil war, died at his home in Riverside. Mr. Hunt secured the continuation of the Chicago Hay-market rioters in the United States supreme court.

Relative to the Manchurian Treaty is Given Out.

AMERICA'S ATTITUDE AS GIVEN.

Principle of the Open-Door Policy Will be Most Emphatically Maintained by Our Government.

Washington, March 27.—The crisis in the Chinese question, brought about through the expiration of the period allowed for the signature by China of the Manchurian agreement, was the principal topic before the cabinet Tuesday. The conviction obtained that the United States has done all that it could to prevent the consummation of this arrangement and to make clear to the public the complete disapproval which is entertained by the United States government in respect to all secret treaty-making, it was deemed proper to give out for publication the following memorandum:

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# BLOW AT BIRMINGHAM.

Revised List Shows Death of States and \$200,000 Property Damage.

Birmingham, Ala., March 27.—Under the harmonious working of the state militia and local police force much order has come out of Monday's chaos incident to the fatal storm which swept portions of this city. A careful revision of the death list places the total number of dead in Birmingham and vicinity at sixteen.

Thirty-five persons were more or less seriously hurt, but the number is being augmented by the addition of many names of persons who were slightly bruised or scalded in their marvellous escape from death.

Sarah Brown, a negro, died from Mrs. R. H. Thompson and Mrs. W. J. Dickinson, who are at St. Vincent's hospital, are in a precarious condition.

In the ruins a body, much disfigured was found and it was discovered to be that of L. Chaumaille, a German, who was in the store making a purchase when the cyclone struck.

Tuesday's beautiful weather was seriously marred by a heavy shower of rain and a strong easterly wind.

The added feature of Tuesday was the funerals, that of Mrs. Robert Jones and that of Miss Alice Jones.

The storm struck the city in the extreme southwestern corner and plowed its way eastward, leaving a row of 150 feet wide through the entire southern section, extending from Green Springs on the west to Avondale on the east, and continued its course until its fury was spent in the mountains beyond Irondale, a small town six miles east of the city.

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# AWFUL ALABAMA

Birmingham and Immediate Section Have Been

TORN BY A TERRIFIC TORNADO.

It is Estimated that at Least Twenty-Five Victims is the Result of the Wrath of the Wind.

Birmingham, Ala., March 27.—Shortly before 10 o'clock Monday morning a fearful tornado swept over the southern section of this city, traveling in an easterly direction. The number of killed is estimated at twenty-five, but only five of them are white.

The destruction of property is placed at \$250,000. Eighteen bodies had been recovered up to dark Monday, and scores of injured have been removed to the hospitals.

A house occupied by Fred Schrier and a frame building a few blocks north, occupied by L. H. Stewart, were badly damaged. Almost a clean sweep was made of the district lying between Eighteenth and Twentieth streets and Avenues H and I, two blocks. Here the scene is one of complete demolition. The frame cottages were reduced to battered piles of debris, everywhere the roofs were blown off, and fallen telephone poles and their tangled wires made a mass of destruction.

Continuing in a easterly direction the storm swept everything in its path of seventy-five yards with its path passing beyond the city limits and struck the Lake View hill about Thirty-fourth street. There were no houses of any description in its path after it had passed the city limits, and consequently there was no damage until it reached Avondale.

At Pagett's Hill, just south of Avondale, a number of persons were killed and many houses and other property badly damaged. The residence of Mr. Miller Harbin was blown down and Mr. Harbin, his wife, child and father-in-law were instantly injured. Henry Shealy and Mrs. J. J. Heiden were also hurt, and a number of other persons suffered slight bruises. Twelve cottages were demolished and trees, outbuildings and fences in the path were leveled.

Onward the cyclone swept, and at Avondale again repeated its work of destruction. Houses and fences were leveled to the ground, and up to this writing several bodies have been recovered. A number of injured were reported and great property loss was entailed.

Reesmer, Pratt City, Enslie, North Birmingham and other suburban towns were visited by the storm, and in each of these places much destruction was wrought, but no loss of life is reported. Many houses were demolished at Pratt City, including a number of churches. In Enslie there was much damage and destruction, and at Cleveland Mrs. George Nant was struck by lightning and will probably die.

A terrific rain storm followed the wind and greatly retarded the work of relief.

Major Drinan and many of the city officials were soon on the scene, and a relief station was established at the corner of Avenue I and Twenty-fourth street. The private secretaries of the many and the chief of police are keeping a record of the work of the injured and suffering. Men with axes and spades were put to work in rescuing those caught beneath the rafters and timbers of the ruined buildings, and firemen in rescuing what property or effects they could. Every house and vehicle in town was engaged by persons anxious to see the scene, and every fireman's van or wagon was in use, moving mattresses and the remains of household objects to new quarters. The storm moved to the various workable establishments, while every available ambulance in the city was pressed into service in removing the dead to the hospital.

At Chambers, six miles from Rome, Ga., the gale blew down J. A. Roumaville's home and wrecked the cotton mill and three barns belonging to Roumaville, in the process of which stock were killed. Much damage has been done to fruit trees. The rivers are rising rapidly. Thousands of feet of lumber of the best quality are washed away, and large forces of hands are at work moving it to places of safety.

Ex-President Harrison's estate is valued at three hundred and eighty thousand dollars. Most of his wealth was accumulated since he retired from the presidency.

The output of the Lucas oil well at Beaumont is said by actual measurement to be seventy thousand barrels per day, which makes it by long odds, the greatest oil well in the world.

The Galveston News was 59 years old Monday March 25th. The Galveston Dallas News have kept pace with the rapid development of Texas, and today rank among the best papers in the United States, and are second to none in the south. Perhaps no papers in our state or the south have been more bitterly denounced in times past than the Galveston and Dallas News, but when people want the news of the day the wide world over they buy a News, no matter how much they dislike the paper. This is strange but it is true. Most Texans are proud of the News, even if they do not all agree with them politically. They are great papers and go right ahead whether their competitors or enemies like it or not.

Harvard has a total enrollment of 4,289 students for the current year.

The un-speakable Turk does not show any disposition to pay Uncle Sam that hundred thousand he owes him.

There are more than one hundred and fifty different kinds of snakes in North America, not counting the different varieties that occasionally get into the old torper's boots.

The negro again shows a disposition to emigrate to the Northern states. From a political stand point it would be wise for the South to encourage emigration of the colored man and brother Northerner.

Representative Dillard of Bowie county has resigned his seat in the legislature. The reason given is that the railroad and other corporation lobbyists are running the legislature. Being so long on the ground he ought to know, but possibly he may be mistaken or prejudiced.

It is charged that Senator Jones intends to hold on to the chairmanship of the Democratic party. Mr. Bryan also shows no disposition to return from the leadership of his party, but on the contrary shows from his actions that he is willing to accept a third nomination. Some men never know when they have had enough and Jones and Bryan seem to belong to this class.

Gorman appears to be coming to the front again in Maryland and it is more than likely that he will return to the senate two years from now. As an organizer Gorman has no superior in the United States and if he returns to the senate the democratic party is bound to feel the effect of his skillful manipulations, though it is a fact that a great many democrats look upon him as a slick schemer more than anything else.

The republicans believe that the democratic party is so badly demoralized that they are actually talking of nominating McKinley for a third term while some want to nominate old Hanna. The republicans seem to think that they can elect anybody so long as the democrats continue to nominate Bryan, and judging by the past they are correct. Neither McKinley for a third term or old Hanna for any term would be thought of if the republicans believed the democrats could unite on some other candidate than Bryan.

## T. E. Powell Has it for Less.

The President has sent warship to Morocco to collect an indemnity due citizens of the United States. If successful the vessel should be sent to Constantinople and call down the Sultan of that rotten empire.

Senors Sanguly and Cisneros over whom the people of this country shed such copious tears before the Spanish war, are the most bitter foes of this country in the Cuban convention. Such a thing as gratitude appears wholly unknown to the average Cuban anyway, so the action of these two ingrates is not surprising.

Just as THE SPAN deflected the anti-free pass bill was defeated; yet some members of the legislature said Hogg's amendment was a reflection upon every state officer past, present and future. The next legislature will just as promptly set down on a free pass bill as this and past legislatures have done. The people should pay members of the legislature a decent salary and then force them to pass an anti-free pass bill.

Appropriations by Congress to aid state fairs is becoming a national scandal. Philadelphia, Chicago and New Orleans in the past drew millions of dollars from the national treasury to aid their fairs. Now comes Buffalo and gets a million dollars for her alleged Pan-American fair. St. Louis did better and gets five millions to boost her celebration of the centennial of the Louisiana Purchase. Both fairs are gotten up for the special benefit of the cities in which they are located, and it is the rankest kind of a fraud to appropriate money for any such purpose. Fairs are good things, but towns that want them should bear the expense of their own shows. Granting aid by the national or state governments for such purposes is wrong in principle, and the people should put a stop to it by defeating every member of congress who heretofore advocates such foolish expenditure of public money.

It there was anything lacking to show up the fraud upon the tax payers of this country in appropriating money for public shows, the appointment by the president of a lot of old fossils to be members of the St. Louis Fair Commission at a salary of five thousand dollars per annum each, is sufficient. These men have absolutely nothing to do, yet they draw forty-five thousand dollars annually for three years. Every appointment made of the nine commissioners so far, has been some ex-congressman who in the course of current events has fallen on one of the broad ways. They have been sucking the public teat so long that they cannot make a living otherwise. The whole blamed business, appropriations, and appointments, is a fraud, and should not be tolerated by the people.

The defeat of the Rivers and Harbors bill may yet prove a blessing in disguise. The appropriations for harbors and water ways has grown to be almost as great a scandal as the pensions. The national government should take charge of the harbors of the country, because few states are able to bear the cost of maintaining them; but that the government should bear the expense of cleaning out the thousand of small bays, creeks and rivulets, lakes and frog ponds in the vain effort to make some of them navigable is outrageous. Sunast Cox, the brilliant New York congressman, once remarked about a similar bill that some of these little creeks that on some option could not be found a place for mill sites and none of them furnished water to run a mill by a damn sight. No doubt most of the liens in the dead bill were meretricious, but there is no manner of doubt that millions of dollars were asked for the improvement of interior water ways that would not float a canoe twenty-four hours after a rain. In other words, there was "Fork" in this barrel. No particular virtue, however, is ascribed to the republicans for killing the bill, because they permitted looting just as bad or worse in other directions.

It is said none of the delegation to congress desire the state reapportioned as it will change all existing districts. The legislature should pay no attention to such objections, but go ahead and reapportion the state regardless of the present districts or congressmen. They are all very estimable gentlemen, but there are lots of congressional timber in Texas just as good or better than our congressmen. For one, THE SPAN would like to see a general shaking up of districts. If two or more of the present congressmen happen to get into the same district no one will be hurt except the members. While most of the congressmen stand well with their constituents there are others, and the state would not be ruined if an entire new delegation were sent to congress.

The pop and the silver republican parties have completely disappeared from congress. In the next congress only two parties, democrat and republican will be represented. Old Tuck-an-ail Stewart, and Jones of Nevada have retired from the republican fold. Senator Tyler has joined the democrats, but senators from Montana are democrats. Patterson of Colorado is classed as a democrat, so as a party the populist party will not be known in the next congress, neither will the silver republicans.

**THE TEXAS PRESS AND THE LEGISLATURE.**

**Who do and who do not want a Libel law.—Some professed Friends of the Press Touched up.**

**Why Some Classes Will Oppose any Law That Will Benefit the Press.**

There is a deal of truth in the following from Editor Bailey of the Houston Herald: "The alleged libel law newspapers of Texas are indulging in a lot of fuss at present as is usual with them when the Texas legislature is in session, about what they call a libel law. The trouble with the alleged leading Texas newspapers is that the people who run them are too ignorant to know what constitutes libel and they are too parsimonious to hire those who have enough intelligence to keep them out of libel suits. The only amendment the libel law needs is to compel the party filing suit to file in the county where the newspaper is published. That is all that is needed. What these alleged leading Texas papers really want is a law that will protect them in spite of their ignorance."—Austin Tribune.

Some of the alleged leading newspapers, the Galveston Daily News, the Austin Statesman and the Waco Times Herald, had been "touched up" by the press. There is a storm coming and they may entirely defeat any libel law. The Commercial wires these of the danger road on which they are traveling so fast. For four years the writer has been urging the passage of a libel law as a representative of the Texas Press Association, and the ridiculous, absurd, preposterous and ignorant statement of certain newspapers in Texas have defeated legislation.—Georgetown Commercial.

Personally this Star is not interested in a civil libel law, because, like most of the country weeklies in Texas it has no property over and above legal expenses and the shyster lawyer and his damage hunters, but the above clipping and comment sounds to us mighty like they were pronounced by any, or spite at the large dailies.

As we have always understood it the responsible press is professed for a law defining libel, claiming that there was no law on the subject, and that judges trying libel suits were left to conjecture what was and what was not libel. The so-called "leading papers" alluded to have never asked any legislature to pass a law relieving them of responsibility, but only asked a law defining what was libel. The Commercial conveys a warning and a threat that certain papers will defend any libel law if they do not care for it. What dangerous road are they traveling that threatens libel legislation? Possibly some of these papers do not deal out a sufficient amount of tarts to members of the legislature, and some times they even dare to criticize certain members who imagine that they ought to be above criticism. That some of the daily press in times past have indulged in harsh and unmerited criticisms of the legislature, we know to be a fact, but a member of the Texas legislature ought to be a broad minded man, liberal enough to do justice to the press without being piqued by what he feels is at times an unjust criticism of the legislature of which he happens to be a member. But for the press, many who put on such high-falootin' ways when they get to the legislature, would never have been heard of.

The truth of the business there is a class of one-horse lawyers in Texas who have persistently fought any and all legislation in Texas for years who do not want any libel law but want the old common law to rule that has been so oppressive to many of them in the past. Whenever a libel law is proposed in the legislature some of these class of lawyers are heard denouncing the press in handsome tones. They assume a lofty virtue that makes the devil laugh and angels weep. "The blame to blazon the character of innocent women the press wants, and not liberty," says the righteous old lawyer. We have heard such arguments in the legislative halls in Texas and do not doubt the editor of the Commercial has heard the same old story repeated again this year.

Candidates will express their sympathy for the press during the campaign and when it turns the cold shoulder to the press as soon as they are sworn in. The press is more responsible than any one else for putting cases upon the legislature that have not got sense enough to found

send into a rat hole. The press lies like old Satan about the many lofty qualities and statesmanship certain candidates possess in order to get the people to nominate and elect them, and when the press asks these same men to pass a libel law, or any law that would even remotely benefit the press, no matter how much more the public might be benefited by such laws, these same candidates turn against the press and abuse the fraternity, like pickpockets.

Certain lawyers and land sharks managed to reveal the law requiring notices of sale of lands to be published in some newspaper in the county. In the debate on that bill the press was attacked by certain members bitterly. All manner of notices requiring publication was denounced, among them administration notices and others. "Why," said one enthusiastic champion of liberty and the suppression of the press, "they tell us that the press of Texas demands this. The press is forever denouncing something, they want the earth. They want the privilege of robbing the living but go farther and ask permission to rob the dead." The above is the substance if not the actual language of one gentleman's remarks. It is some consolation to know, however that this same man though a most estimable gentleman, who was from some cause unduly prejudiced against the press, had to retire to private life. A few years after his being offered himself as a candidate for an important state office, but the press of Texas almost completely ignored him, and the result was that his candidacy collapsed in a few weeks. He had cast his bread upon the waters and it returned to him in kind. The press did not oppose or rather ignore him because of his opposition to the bill in question, but because of his uncalled for, venomous and outrageous attacks upon the press as a body.

Under the law now, lands can be sold secretly and land sharks can rob both the dead and the living and no one will know it, but the unrighteous press was beat out of few dollars they had been making under the law and the shyster lawyer and land sharks are no doubt happy, because they were able to have the law repealed or so amended that it amounts to the same thing. Under the law it is possible to sell the largest and most valuable tract of land in the county without the owner being known to a dozen men. No chance for robbery here, so, no, but under the old law requiring land sales to be published, such a thing is a secure sale of land is impossible, consequently was very objectionable to certain class who faten on the misfortunes of others, and they had it repealed.

In this connection we do not wish to cast any reflection upon the legal fraternity as a whole, nor land agents as a class, because most of both are high-toned honorable business men who would not stoop to dishonesty for profit. Nor do we wish to make it appear that all newspaper men are angels, only lacking wings, far from it, because we know they are human, and some of them very much so, and in fact some of them break into the ranks of journalism for a brief time, who to use a trifling saying, are not fit to test institutions of a bear, but such of these are few, and they have no influence with the craft or any other class and none of that class ever asked for a libel law, but rather opposed it, because they might find an opportunity to fleece some craftman who possessed property upon which to confer taxes his land under the old order of things.

The people along the route of President McKinley's proposed trip to San Francisco seem to regard the whole business as a big snow, and every village within one hundred miles of the route traveled by the president is trying to arrange a date for him. It is already announced that the president will breakfast at Beaumont. Probably he will tarry long enough at Houston for a change of engine, and at Austin he will say howdy and goodbye in the same breath to his old friend Joe Sayers. The president is a very busy as well as a popular man.

Nolan offered amendments making changes to meet major objection to the bill, all of them tending to proveyer. The house voted to amend the bill.

Garner and Bullock offered amendments providing that the governor remove the three commissioners he appoints, but the two elective officers shall be removed the same as county officers, and for the filling of vacancies by the same rate, both of which were adopted.

The bill passed to engrossment—53 ayes, 25 noes.

May Not Adjourn on April 9.

Austin, Tex., March 25.—The resolution fixing the date of sine die adjournment on April 9, which has been adopted by both branches of the legislature, may not be binding, after all. There is an established precedent and high parliamentary authority for rescheduling such action after it had been enacted by motion to reconsider and lay on the table, etc.

The Twenty-second legislature adopted concurrent sine die adjournment resolutions and rescheduled them, three such resolutions being treated in this manner. The railroad commission bill was pending, and its passage was impeded by the sine die adjournment resolution. Hon. Thomas R. Reed, who was speaker of congress at that time, was wiper on the subject, and he replied that any concurrent resolution adopted by the legislature could be rescinded, and that only a majority vote was necessary.

Severe Storms.

The Lower House of the Legislature Reads Same to Engrossment

Austin, ex. March 25.—In house Saturday Legislature offered a motion according to Congressman Cooper the courtesies of house.

Ragan and Hill offered the following resolution:

"Whereas, It is charged in the public press that certain members of this house conspired with certain other persons for the purpose of preventing a quorum and forestalling action on the Galveston charter bill; and,

"Whereas, It is further charged by said press that said members of the house took refuge in a theater, thereby insinuating and causing the impression to go out over the state that the members aforesaid were derelict in the discharge of their duties and purposefully and knowingly absented themselves from the session of the house; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the charge aforesaid be denounced as groundless and an unwarranted attack upon the faithfulness and integrity of said members; that the absence of said members was occasioned by the understanding on their part that the house would adjourn and that no night session would be held."
