Two elections are to be held here within the next four days. The first is to elect two school trustees and the other is to name two city councilmen. The school vote will be held in the Anderson Chevrolet Company building and the city balloting will be at the city office Tuesday.

Trustee election comes Saturday and that of city aldermen Tuesday. No issues have presented themselves and very light votes are anticipated in each balloting.

The rain which began falling in the early hours of Friday morning netted nine tenths of an inch, greatly benefiting grain crops, which were beginning to suffer appreciably. All vegetation was revived by the precipitation and enough moisture was placed in the ground to sprout recently planted crops.

In addition to Friday's rain, showers were received Monday and Wednesday. In Cross Plains the precipitation Monday measured only two one hundredths of an inch. Wednesday's shower was even lighter in the city limits, however, South of town a hard downpour gale received across about a two mile strip.

Mr. and Mrs. Rutledge and another occupant of the car were killed instantly, however, the two children were blown into a narrow ditch, half filled with water. Home Making Hints

By CLARA BROWN.
 Cured meat may be kept from becoming rancid, and drying out during the spring and summer months by the use of refined cottonseed oil. Meat stored in refined oil stays in the best condition for warm weather consumption as the oil retards mold growth 100%, it reduces evaporation and shrinkage. It eliminates fly and skipper contamination 100%; the meat will not become more salty and will not absorb flavor from the oil.
 Peanut oil may be used for several years. There is no special secret in the use of the oil says Mrs. W. A. Young of the Enterprise home demonstration club, she has used this method for a number of years. She slices the meat and packs it into any container that will hold oil, a large earthen jar is best and covers the meat with the refined oil. The containers are covered for sanitary purposes. With average packing about three gallons of oil is used to cover 100 lbs. of meat.

WASHINGTON NEWS

FROM CONGRESSMAN CLYDE L. GARRETT
CIVIL SERVICE:
 The giving of a Civil Service examination to my mind means just what the intent of the law happens to be. It is based on merit and the qualifications which person shows for that particular place. No letter of endorsement or recommendation is needed until the Commission calls for one. No one has a chance for appointment until they have made the eligible list and nothing can be done by any one but the applicant to make the right grade for an appointment. A review can be secured on any paper on request but it is seldom that a material change is made in the results. Civil Service aims at merit only and when they get through with an examination and investigation they usually know all that is to be known about an applicant.

CONGRESS AT WORK:

Most of the Congress' time last week was spent in clearing up the so-called supply bills so that action could be taken on the more pressing national problems. There are now three supply bills that have become law, six have been approved by the House and five by the Senate. There are a half dozen more to be taken up by both Houses.

SOCIAL SECURITY:

The House Ways and Means Committee voted unanimously to defer any action on the inclusion of farm labor, domestic help, and employees of religious, charitable and non-profit institutions in the Social Security System. It had been recommended by the Social Security Board that these workers be put into the system, but because the proposals raised problems which could not be solved before the end of the present session, the committee would not approve.

SALE OF WARSHIPS AND ARMS:

A resolution introduced jointly by Senator Pittman of Nevada and Rep. Bloom of New York has commanded much attention. Senator Pittman, chairman of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations is author of this resolution which would permit the President to sell warships and arms of United States manufacture at his discretion. It would also permit him to give the secrets concerning their manufacture and operation to Latin American countries in an effort to sustain continental solidarity.

SPRING RISE FOR FARM PRODUCTS:

The Bureau of Agricultural Economics looks for moderate improvement in the domestic demand for farm products this spring and summer. A slight change for the better in the outlook for foreign demand is also noted. Farm products prices in domestic markets declined about 4 per cent during the past winter, but recently have been holding relatively steady. The demand outlook for farm products depends largely upon industrial activity in this country.

NAVY GIFTS:

Men of the Uncle Sam's Navy, now returning from fleet maneuvers in the Caribbean, are said to have stowed aboard their battleships, destroyers, submarines and bombing planes a \$3,472,26 assortment of cocktail napkins, finger towels, baby bibs, and baskets, according to reports from the Virgin Islands Handicraft Co. operatives.

AVIATION AND WORKS PROGRESS:

The Works Progress Administration advanced civil and military aviation during the three and one-half years ended December 31 with construction of 154 new airports, extensions or improvements to 494 others and the placing of hundreds of navigation aids. WPA expenditures for aviation facilities in 1933 totaled \$35,409,894 as the program extended to 33 additional airport sites and the individual projects were completed at the rate of approximately one a day. With the beginning of 1933, 37,986 men were at work on 164 sites providing additional facilities essential to the rapidly expanding aviation industry and the Government's airplane fleets.
