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THOMAS WELL EXCITING

The Thomas well on the Dibrell ranch about seventeen miles southwest of Cross Plains in Coleman County has been attracting considerable attention by reason of its maneuvers. The well has been shut down at the top of the sand at 3100 feet several months and much money has been spent in the neighborhood for options on leases and land in fee. Last week the well was opened to let the bailer in when the oil went over the derrick. It was with difficulty shut down again. The well is said to be good for fifty barrels like it stands.

The Jim Ned Oil Company well on the Dibrell ranch, in same neighborhood with the Thomas well, is laying oil at 2730 feet with the tools in the hole.

The Morris & Sisk Peak No. 1, offset to the Cathey well one mile southeast of Putnam, came in on Saturday morning. The sand was encountered on Friday, and the well was shot on Sunday. It bridged for about 200 feet. It looks good for 25 to 50 barrels.

SEEKS INSURANCE AT AGE OF 131.

Lexington, Ky. Sept. 3.—"Uncle Johnny" Shell, probably the oldest man in the world, celebrated his 131st birthday today by sending for a life insurance agent. "You never can tell what'll happen sonny," he told the agent, "and I want to prepare for the worst."

The agent looked over his rate card and found that his card covered only the first 105 years of a man's life. The agent is now busy with his headquarters trying to learn if he can insure "Uncle Johnny."

Shell was first married at the age of 19 and lived with his first wife for more than ninety years. He lived seventy-five years in one house. He is the father of twenty-nine children, the oldest now living being more than 90 years years of age. Six years ago he married again at the age of 125. By his second wife he has one child, a boy age 5 years. He was at the advanced age of 74 during the Civil War. He was born near Knoxville, Tenn., twenty years after the battle of Bunker Hill, and was full grown when the war of 1812 began. He has seen the United States develop from a small nation to a world power.

He bears his age well. His mind is clear and his eyesight is far better than that of many men still in their youth.—X
