



Veterans Insurance

Editor's Note: This is the last of a series of four special articles prepared by Veterans Administration explaining the rights of newly-discharged veterans to Government life insurance.

PERMANENT PLAN GI POLICIES UNDER WAIVER OR SURREND-ERED FOR CASH VALUE

Recently - discharged veterans who were granted a waiver of only a part of their premiums on their permanent plans of Government life insurance while they were in active service must act immediately after their release or separation to keep this insurance in force under full premium-paying conditions.

If the veterans surrendered their permanent plans of Government life insurance for their cash value

on or after April 25, 1951, while they were in active service so as to take advantage of the free indemnity protection, they must act within 120 days of their release or separation to reinstate their policies or to apply for new permanent plan insurance.

As used in this article, permanent plans of Government life insurance mean any of the permanent plans issued under National Service Life Insurance or U. S. Government Life Insurance, such as ordinary life, 20-pay life, 30pay life, and the various endowment plans.

Under the Servicemen's Indemnity and Insurance Acts of 1951 that became law April 25, 1951, persons in active military service on and after that date could take any one of three courses with their permanent NSLI or USGLI poli-

They could: (1) continue to pay the full premium as in the past; (2) apply for waiver of a part of their premium, or (3) surrender their policies for the cash value and be covered by the free indemnity protection.

Those who elected to pay the full premium must continue to do so immediately after release or separation from active service if they wish to keep their policies in force thereafter.

Those who were granted a waiver of part of their permanent plan premium (under Section 622 of the NSLI Act) were instructed to pay the full premium while they were in active service and VA would refund the waived portion.

When these persons are released or separated from active service, they should continue to pay the full premiums, when due, directly to Veterans Administration, Washington 25, D. C. That portion of the waived premium which is paid under this arrangement will be reperiod that the waiver is in force.

Those who surrendered their permanent plan policies for cash may adopt one of two courses of action if they wish to replace or restore the surrendered permanent plan of insurance. In either of these two courses, the requirements for reinstatement or issuance of new insurance must be met within 120 days following release or separation from active service. The two courses of action are:

1. They may apply to Veterans Administration, Washington 25, D. C., in writing, without a physical examination, for the issuance of a new permanent policy on the same plan and not in excess of the amount of the policy surrendered for cash, and pay the required premium; or,

2. They may reinstate their surrendered permanent plan of insurance, without a physical examination, by paying the required reserve and the premium for the current month. Applications for reinstatement should be mailed to Veterans Administration, Washington 25. D. C.

For further information, veterans should contact their nearest VA office as soon after separation or release from service as possible.





I hope not, because I've changed my mind about the matter. I want to go there when I die. I want my son to go too. It may be forever too late for me to make up for the wrong I've done my son. I've written him. That's about all I can do for the present-except pray. For all I know, he may be spending his free moments in getting drunk with his buddies, trying to forget war for a little while, instead of spending them on his knees praying for the strength and courage and protection that only

God can give. But I pray that some one will take time to tell my son about Christ and that maybe he will remember some of the things his mother has told him and will be made afraid to face death without a Saviour. But I don't know-he's so young, and the young have little

I write him in the hope that some other father, who still has his boy by his side, will realize the duty he has to that boy before it's too late. Has a father any greater duty than to teach his son the way of salvation and to live the Christian life before him? I think not. If God will be good to me and give me back my son, I won't fail

Families of 3 Boys Drowned In Lake Texoma Offer Reward

EDITOR'S NOTE: Harold Reed, father of Robert Reed, who drowned in Lake Texoma and former resident of this city, has posted a reward for recovery of bodies according to the following story.

Denison, Jan. 11.—Families of three youths who drowned in Lake Texoma December 8, Friday offered a \$300 reward for the recovery of their bodies.

C. H. Reed of Odessa, father of 17-year-old Robert Reed, an Odessa high school football star, who was one of the victims, announced that the money had been deposited in the State National Bank here.

Bodies of Jerry Harrod, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. F. Harrod of Odessa, and Harry Kirklin, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Kirklin of Abilene, former Odessa residents, also had been sought unsuccessfully.

Reed said a \$100 reward would be paid to the discoverer of each body, after certification by Eddie Laird, park ranger for the Corps of Engineers here.

The Reed, Harrod and Kirklin youths and two friends, also Odessa high school students, came to Texoma to hunt ducks from a camp across the lake in Oklahoma. Their 14-foot aluminum boat capsized in high waves and one by ont four of the five chums lost their grip on the overturned craft and sank in the icy water.

The body of Shirley Thomas, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Thomas, was recovered on December 11, in a cove into which it had been driven by wind.

Robert Davenport, 18, adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Davenport of Odessa, survived the tragedy, after 30 hours of exposure in bitter cold. He was in the water for nine hours and spent 17 hours on a sandbar island, to which the boat had been blown.

All the boys had been heavily clothed and carried cartridges in their hunting coat. Davenport discarded his shoes and all his outer clothing.




