Local farm problems were discussed by farm boys of the Cross Plains trade territory in a meeting at the high school building Wednesday night for the purpose of deciding room farm problems to be taken up in a part-time class being held by V. A. Underwood, teacher of vocational agricature in the Cross Plains high school.






