"The horse-mint-or horse-weedis a favorite plant for flea hoppers, and all of these should be removed from fields before the insects has sufficient time to hatch. These weeds are nothing more than incubators for flea-hoppers and should be cleared from all fields and road right-of-ways", Mr. Bramblett declared.

To prove the point that fleahoppers prefer the horse-mint to another plant, including cotton, the Sweetwater etomologist exhibited one of the weeds, which was liter-

ally covered with the 'hoppers. Cotton prospects are reported to be unusually good throughout the entire Cross Plains trade territory.
