### Rev. C. D. Wooten Returned To Local Pulpit

#### CONGREGATION AND FRIENDS OF CHURCH ELATED OVER NEWS

All Methodist Appointments In This Territory Told At Cisco Meeting Sunday

Members and friends of the First Methodist church in Cross Plains were elated Sunday afternoon to learn that Rev. C. D. Wooten had been returned to the pastorate of the local church for a third year. The annual conference of the Central Texas district which was held at Cisco closed with the reading of appointments Sunday afternoon. Other appointments concerning churches in the Cross Plains area were as follows: Rev. L. M. Lawhon was returned to the Burkett church for his third year. Rev. C. M. Buttrill was sent back to Rising Star for his second year. To the Cross Cut church goes Rev. Melvin Mathis, who replaces Rev. J. G. Walker. Pioneer gets Rev. L. L. Broughton. To the Cottonwood and Putnam charges goes Rev. Dayne Dunson, replacing Rev. Shyden who was transferred to Tehuacana in the Waco district. New district superintendent for the Cisco district is Rev. W. H. Cole, who comes from the First Methodist church at Georgetown, replacing Rev. Roy A. Langston, who held the district superintendency for four years. Rev. Langston was sent to the First Methodist church at Temple. The Rev. Mr. Cole is well known to Cross Plains Methodists having conducted a revival meeting here a number of years ago. Delegate to the annual convention from the Cross Plains church was J. A. Caton, well known business man and prominent Methodist layman. One special item revealed at the convention was the fact that the Central Texas conference has given to the nation's armed forces possibly as great a percent of chaplains as has any other in the United States. Present at the sessions in Cisco were six chaplains, all former pastors in the area.

#### CALLAHAN LAGS IN PURCHASE OF BONDS

Callahan counties dropped nearly \$6,000 below their quota of bond and stamp purchases during October, the Review was told yesterday by M. H. Perkins, chairman of the committee on sales in this county. The October quota for Callahan county was \$22,500. Total sales of defense bonds and stamps in the county amounted to \$16,925.50, or \$5,574.50 below the stipulated figure. "Now that farmers are selling their crops," said Mr. Perkins, "it is hoped that they will be able to get behind the bond buying movement and help Callahan county to make up the deficit incurred previously this year."

Registration November 19, 20, 21

Registration for gasoline rationing originally scheduled this week end has been postponed until the last three days of next week, November 19, 20 and 21, County Judge B. H. Freeland was advised in a telegram from Mark McGee in Fort Worth early Tuesday. McGee also advised Freeland that rationing of gasoline itself had been indefinitely postponed. The Associated Press reported just before the Review went to press that rationing would start December first. Owners of automobiles are also being reminded that they must turn in all tires besides four in use and one spare for each car no later than November 22. It is pointed out that owners of trailers may keep one tire for each rolling wheel.

### Short Film Blasts Rumors Spread For Benefit Of Enemy

Rumor mongers who are familiar with every detail of our country's weaknesses and our enemy's strength, but never seem to come upon information encouraging to the Allies, are severely denounced in a timely short subject, playing at the Liberty Theatre here Thursday, Friday and Saturday, entitled "Mr. Blabbermouth." John Nesbitt is the film's narrator. So that everyone may have a yardstick, a standard of values, to measure everything he hears, Nesbitt presents facts backed by motion picture proof. He compares the strength of the Allied Navy with that of the Axis. He depicts and tells of the superior productive capacity of the Allies as against the Axis. He explodes a favorite of rumor mongers—stories about powerful secret weapons invented by the Axis and calls attention to the fact that most modern military ordnance has been invented and developed by scientists who, in the overwhelming majority, despise Fascist ideology and are now hard at work to defeat the Axis.

### Gasoline Rationing Steps

1. Get application blank at some filling station.
2. Fill in the blanks properly.
3. Take properly filled-out blank, together with car license receipt to nearest school building.
4. Have only five tires for each passenger car and a tire for each rolling wheel on trailers.
5. If serial numbers are not legible, the tire should be identified by manufacturer's name.
6. The application MUST be signed by the registered owner of the car. If the registered owner is in the armed forces the custodian of the car must appear before the county rationing board.

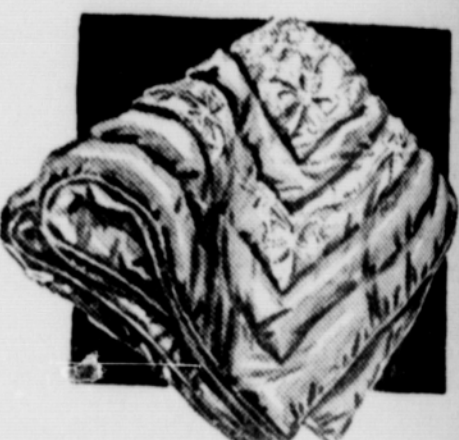
