Truck Growers Asked to Consider Selling Plan and Report Opinion

Officials of the Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce are planning to engage a man to act as agent for truckers and farmers in the selling of fruit, berries, vegetables and other truck crops pro-

duced in this vicinity. Clyde Sims, President of the local C of C, points out that no one has yet been engaged to serve in this capacity and neither will anyone be hired until farmers have had ample opportunity to consider the plan and offer their opinion of it.

Roughly, the plan is this: to place some man on the job here two days each week to accept products from the farmers and endeavor to sell them on a commission basis to truckers, all of whom would be notified of the marketing days in Cross Plains. Sims points out that farmers would bring in their items for sale and that the agent and Chamber of Commerce would do everything in their power to ob-

tain buyers, however, if no buyers were obtained the producers would be expected to return for their products and no fee would be charged.

Shed space or a building would probably be provided by the Chamber of Commerce and farmers would pay no commission whatsoever unless a sale were made. It is pointed out, that the chamber would endeavor to secure the services of some man in whom the producers have confidence and would be willing to represent them in making sales.

Farmers are asked to consider




