DESIGNS MOTOR TO USE WATER

Using water instead of gasoline as "primary" fuel, a new type of motor has been developed by Harry L. Anderson, former railroad engi-

The motor can be used in airplanes, locomotives and other machines, the inventor claims.

Motive power for the motor is developed in twin boilers. Steam is generated by electric coils in the first boiler and then passes through the second one, where it is supercharged before transmission to the compound turbine engines located in the wings of the plane or over the driving wheels of the locomotive.

A wind fan, located at the front of the plane or engine, operates a dynamo to create the required electricity for the heating coils in the boiler. The wind fan is operated automatically by the force of the wind when the plane or locomotive is in motion. When not in motion, the heating coils are fed from a standard starting device.

Anderson describes his motor as "form of perpetual motion" and claims it is silent as well as eco-




