HILBURN MAKING 600 BARRELS

The Hilburn discovery well seven miles northeast of Cross Plains is reliably reported to be making 600 barrels daily. The well is six inches in the sand at 3,055 feet, and since the six-inch casing was set on the sand it is doing much better. Storage tanks have been provided and the public is guarded away from the well. A number of locations are reported to be made near-by, and trading in close-in leases at high prices is active.

This well belongs about equally to Cross Plains and Rising Star as to location. It has opened a new territory to our east, and makes the whole country look good as an oil possibility. Look out for further developments.

Vestal north of town has finished underreaming and is again drilling at about 3,500 feet.

Albin east of town waiting on contract.

SEPARATE PASSENGER TRAIN ON CROSS PLAINS DIVISION

A regular passenger train service, separate from the local freight, will be inaugurated on the Cross Plains Division, commencing Sunday, Feb. 15th. The train will be operated from Cross Plains to De Leon and its scheduled time will be a great convenience to the people at this end of the route.

Attention is called to the announcement and changed schedule appearing in an advertisement by the United States Railroad Administration published elsewhere in this paper. The train will leave Cross Plains at 7:30 A. M., and is scheduled to arrive at 5:15 P. M. A local freight train will be operated as usual, but it will not carry passengers.

PARTICULARS OF NITRO EXPLOSION AT SIPE SPRINGS

Clifton Milligan of Desdemonia, mention of which was made in our last issue, was killed Tuesday afternoon of last week in an explosion that followed an attempt to shoot the Atlantic's Lusk No. 1, which is located five miles northeast of Springs.

Two members of the casing crew were also severely injured and one man representing the Illinois Topedo Company as a shooter sustained a broken shoulder.

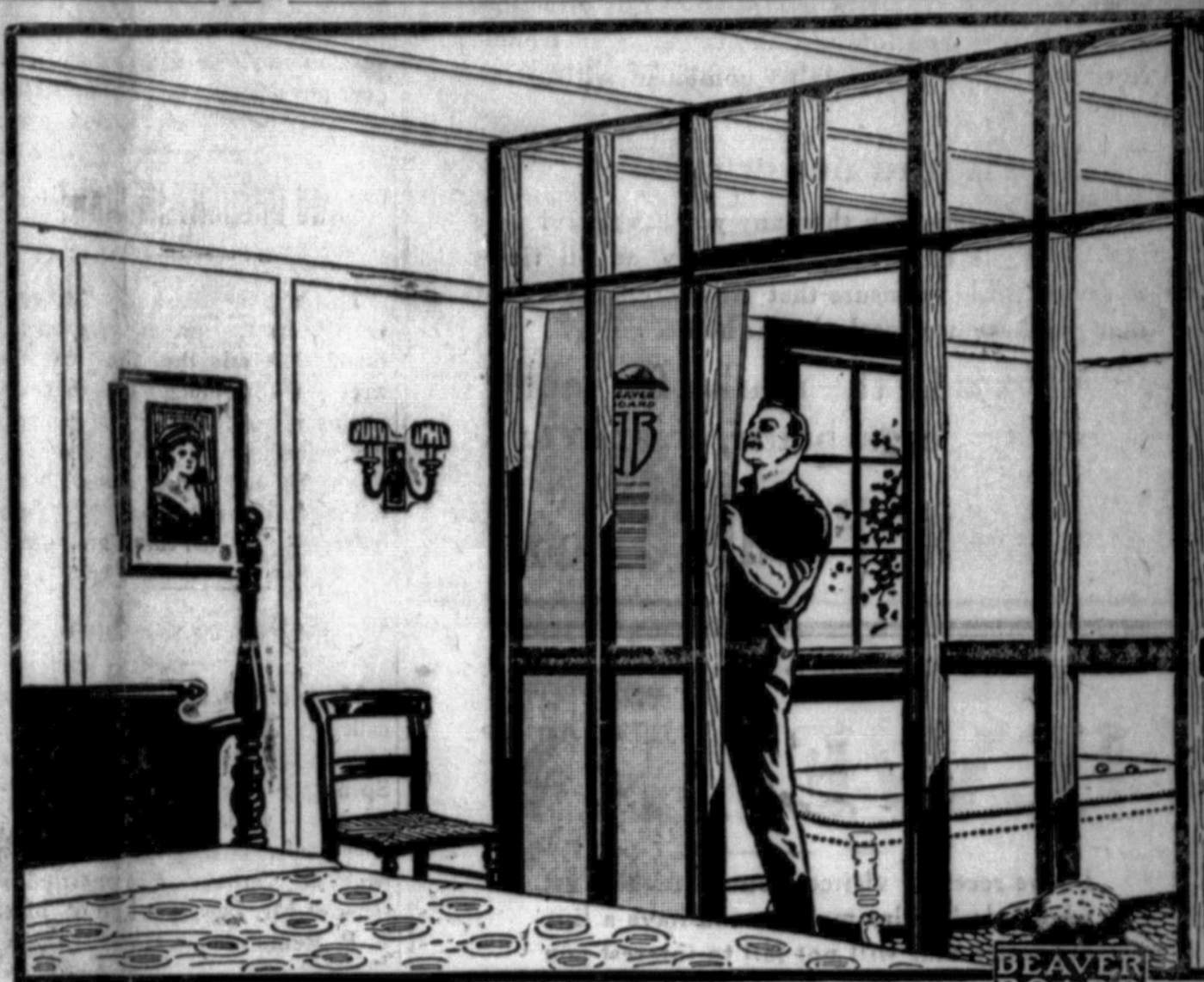
The shot intended to bring in the well was placed in position when the well started to make head and gas forced the shot to the surface, when it exploded, setting the derrick on fire and causing instant death of Milligan and injury to the other three men. A second explosion took place when an automobile, which contained a second charge of nitro, took fire.

The explosion was terrific and was plainly felt in Sipe Springs, five miles away, where some window lights were smashed out. There was a large crowd present to witness the shooting and no doubt many of them would have been killed had the manager of the company not kept them back, and especially when the car containing the nitro, which was intended for the Watkins well exploded, caused by the intense heat from the fire.

ANOTHER PASSENGER TRAIN WRECKED AT RANGER

One man, J. B. Tyler, business man of Sweetwater, was killed, and eight others, Mexicans and negroes were injured when the oil special, eastbound, was wrecked, supposedly by deliberate intent, last Monday morning two miles east of Ranger.

The wreck was caused by an open switch. According to Engineer Smith a man threw the switch and ran when the train was three car lengths from it, and was plainly visible in the glare of the headlight. Two box cars standing on the switch track were splintered. The engine did not leave the rails, but the baggage car and one coach were ditched. The man who was killed is supposed to have been riding the blind baggage and was mangled almost beyond identification. This is the second fatal wreck to occur at Ranger by the train being headed into an open switch.

BAIRD STAR OIL NEWS

Pierce Oil Corporation has made a location on survey No. 147, about three miles south of the McGowen well, this to be known as J. A. Gilliland well No. 1. It is reported that the same company will make one or two more locations during the next few days.

The Hilburn well located about seven miles northeast of Cross Plains is drawing lots of attention now, as the well opens up a new territory. This well is making about 300 barrels per day and the production is expected to be increased to two or three thousand barrels per day when drilled deeper into the oil sand.

17 PRODUCING WELLS IN SIPE SPRINGS FIELD

There are now seventeen producing wells in the Sipe Springs field, according to A. A. Dunlap, prominent resident of that place.

Fifteen wells in the shallow field, according to Dunlap, have reached the sand and are producing at the rate of around 60 barrels of oil daily each. A pipe line from the shallow field carries the oil to Sipe Springs to the loading racks, while a great deal of crude is being used from these wells as fuel for drilling other wells. There are about twenty other wells now in process of being drilled.

Although the big companies have tried repeatedly to cast a shadow on the field, the report has been given out, says Mr. Dunlap, that \$34,000 worth of oil has already been produced by the Moorman No. 1.

The companies doing the greatest knocking on the field have been the most active in buying up all the acreage that could be had for a low figure, and it is the opinion of the average man of Sipe Springs, that these damaging reports are allowed to be circulated for no other purpose than to drive down the price of acreage.—DeLeon Press.

A LETTER TO YOU

Dear Friend:

Another little child has shrivelled up and died!

The mother, creeping back, gaunt and cold, from the desert, has put down the thin little bones with those that strew the road, so many miles, and has sunk beside them, never to rise again.

Only a little child, and a mother, out on the bleak Armenian road - but what is that Vision hovering there - and what is that Voice the cold winds bear to the ears of our souls - "I was hungry and ye gave me no meat - I was naked, and ye clothed me not!"

To-day - yes, to-day - while we are preparing our gifts for Christmas - many more of these little children - not a hundred, nor a thousand, but two hundred and fifty thousand of them - are still wandering uncared for and alone in that dead land, "their weakened skins clinging in fear to their rattling bones", and they are crying out with gasping breath, "I am hungry! I am hungry!" And the Voice of One who watches us as we prepare gifts to celebrate His Birthday, comes again to the ears of our souls - "I am hungry! I am hungry! I am hungry!"

Now the children, and the mothers of Armenia are dreading the winter. "Just human remnants, they are, not protected, many of them, from the elements by even the dignity of rage."

But we can feed and clothe those perishing ones - some of them - before it is too late. Herbert Hoover cabled from the Caucasus: "It is impossible that the loss of 200,000 lives can at this day be prevented, but the remaining 500,000 can possibly be saved." They need not starve, and freeze and die if we will save them.

Open now your heart and purse. They need not die! Give ye them to eat!

To-day nearly eight hundred thousand destitute Armenians - His people - need food and clothing. He took little children in His arms and blessed them To-day will you take one, or more, of those sad, cold, hungry little children of Armenia into your arms and heart, in His name, and give them food, and warmth and life?

"In as much as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, My brethren, ye have done it unto Me."

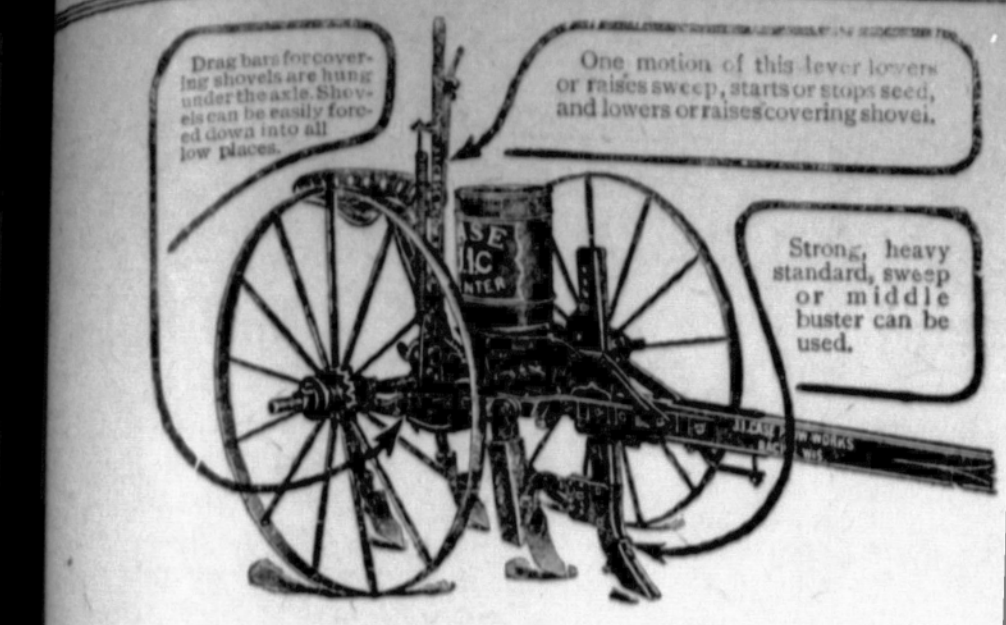

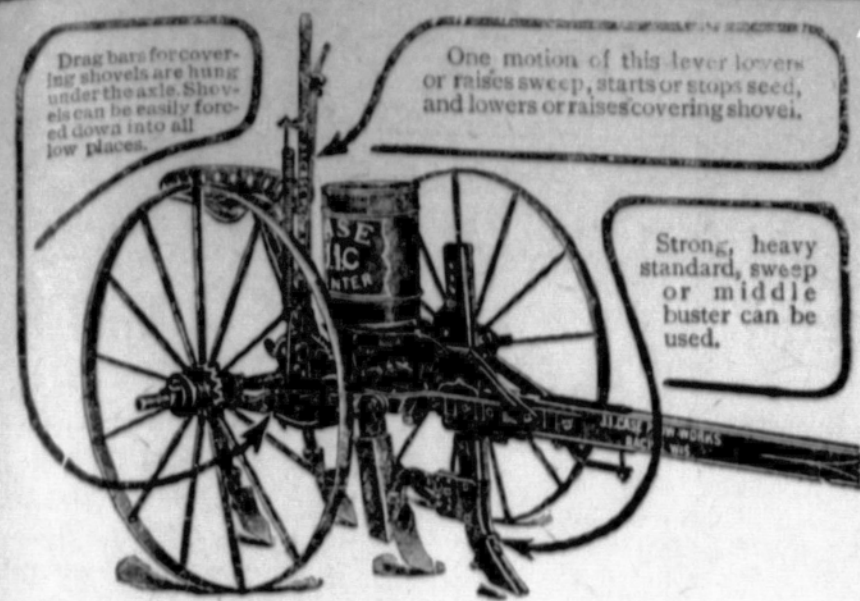
