Hon. T. L. Blanton Addresses Audience

GIVES RESUME OF WORK IN CONGRESS—NO REFERENCE MADE TO HIS OPPONENT



HON. T. L. BLANTON

Thomas L. Blanton, M. C. of Abilene, spoke to an attentive and appreciative audience on Monday of this week, in the Higginbotham building in Cross Plains. His coming, thru some mistake, was not announced, and only the townspeople and those that happened to be here, heard him. He spoke for an hour and a half, his talk being confined entirely to his record for the past three years in congress. He engaged in no mud-slinging, making no mention of his opponent, H. C. Grisham of Eastland.

Judge Blanton was for eight years our district judge, and though a few did not agree with him on some issues, all admit that he was indefatigable in his labors as judge, always clearing his docket, a thing very few judges could do. He proved a human dynamo in his first campaign: for congress, and that same dynamo seems to have been storing energy all the while for his work in congress, for he is likely its most active member. He is making an unceasing fight on the octopus methods of the American Federation of Labor under the leadership of Samuel Gompers, being about the only congressman who has the courage to oppose it. He has done much to make himself unpopular with the other members of congress in fighting unnecessary appropriations, private bills, etc., but has saved the country millions already. Though sentiment in the cities may have been against him at first, in his fight on ultra unionism, we believe that now the farmer, the clerk, the business man, the consumer wherever found, unless he be under the influence of the A. F. L. not only in this district, but throughout the State, are pretty solidly with him.

In opening his address, Judge Blanton stated that he was touring the district, not for campaign purposes alone, but to make a report to the people of his work in Congress, and the following is part of his speech in condensed form: "I gladly report my stewardship to my constituents," began Judge Blanton. "I come with a clear conscience, knowing that I have left no stone unturned in doing everything within my power in their behalf. In my platform I pledged the following: "Untrammelled service and constant attention to business; condemnation of the prevalent activity and absence of congressmen from Washington; strict public economy and a cleanup of useless, wasteful departments. "Merit, rather than the spoils system; national prohibition and national woman suffrage; rural farm credits; real help rather than the usual camouflage for the farmer, bringing him and the spinner closer together so as to eliminate the gambler and middleman. "I worked for a fair and square deal alike for labor and capital; an uncompromising fight against all pork barrel, garden seed and other graft. "Maximum government assistance for education, for the eradication of tuberculosis and other menacing diseases, boll weevil, tick,

blackleg and hog cholera; and a real partnership between all the people and the Federal Government, instead of between special interests and the Federal Government."

"I have faithfully kept every campaign pledge. My record in congress shows favorable results on every promise. No other member has been in more constant attendance of the house floor or given more active and painstaking attention. I have to all public business. I have participated in every debate of importance during my membership. Of the Texas delegation of eighteen members, I was the only congressman who made a speech for national prohibition. "Through exhaustive personal investigations, made at my own expense, I have succeeded in having several thousand useless employees discharged and several departments cleaned up. "The graft best known to the public is the rivers and harbors appropriation. Since I have been in congress only one small river and harbors appropriation has been made. "By investigating and filing minority reports against unmeritorious private claims, I have saved over \$100,000,000 of the people's money—your money. "By making points of order against improper appropriations, which were sustained by the chair, I have saved about \$200,000,000, proof of which is shown in the excerpt from the Congressional Records sent you, entitled, 'Let the Record Speak.' "Refusing to obey orders and wear yoke, in forcing members of congress to stay in Washington and attend to business by recording their absence, in opposing and defeating their private bills, involving millions, in trying to reduce mileage to actual expenses, in denouncing the giving to each member every session cedar chest, a pine chest and an oak chest, in blocking all efforts to raise members' salary from \$7,500 to \$10,000, in denouncing extravagant and expensive junketing trips, in fighting garden seed and other graft in making points of order against making appropriations for special interests, I very naturally made some enemies, but I survived their side jobs and under-cuts, and now joy the respect and personal friendship of every member worth while in the House of Representatives."

HOW TEACHERS' SALARIES MAY BE INCREASED

Austin, June 17.—Teachers' salaries may be increased in schools with less than 500 pupils, and one half the increase to met by the state provided certain requirements are met. Schools eligible to receive aid from the rural aid fund may obtain it for salary increase not to exceed more than one-half the salary increases; provided no school shall receive more than \$500 in one year for this purpose. Further requirements are that state aid applies only to increases made relected teachers who have made cert in professional advancement during the year. Trustees should keep these facts in mind when electing teachers and fixing salaries for the coming school year.
