Anti - Strike Bill Is 2 Sided Issue - - Dodson

Austin, Texas: Walked into the House chamber recently just in time to hear Governor W. Lee O'Daniel address a joint-session of the Senate and House. The nature of the message O'Daniel was to bring had been an enigma to the law makers, and naturally the House was packed, no one wanting to miss what might be big news.

The Governor lost no time in getting underway and informing the solons that he desired the passing of a statute to prevent striking and lock-outs of national defense projects. You could have heard a pin drop as he talked. It was clear that the galleries and members of the two law making bodies were with him. Several times during the address the Governor was interrupted with enthusiastic rounds of applause.

Governor O'Daniel did not flinch say he would use the National Guard to protect workers and plants from what he termed racketeering among labor leaders, but that interference was accepted by many.

While discussing the "anti-strike" bill the House conducted an investigation of the condition that exists on a number of defense projects. One worker testified that he went to a certain camp several months ago and was told that he would have to join a certain organization to gain employment. It was explained to him that the initiation fee was \$175, but that he could be given 35 days to pay if he didn't have the ready cash.

One labor leader spoke to the law makers, saying that when our defense program started that no big contractors would accept contracts and that the government had to guarantee the contractors a cost plus 10 percent agreement to get them to accept the jobs. He contended that capital struck first.

Bill McCraw, former Attorney General and a candidate for governor three years ago, addressed the House in opposition to the measure. McCraw is a World War veteran, having won a croix de guerra in France for daring service. He was a pilot and yet files his own plane. McCraw is very witty and drew a lot of laughs. McCraw read the bill he commented on the various paragraphs. For example he pointed out that if the bill is passed and a good woman should get fretted with her no-account husband and take a broom and run him out of her kitchen, she could be put in the "pen" for two years for committing an act of violence.
