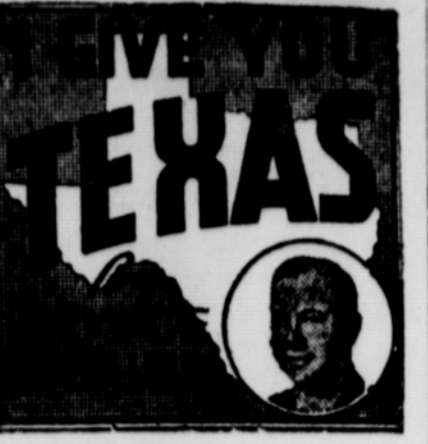
LOCAL BOY JOINS MERCHANT MARINES

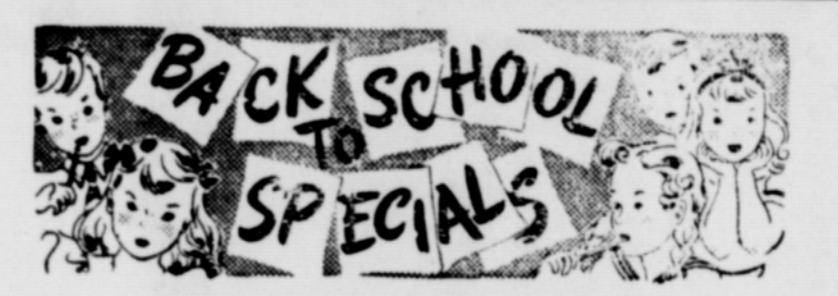

I was more fortunate than many boys—my father was a "drummer". That's what a traveling salesman was called in those days.

Maybe Indians were on the war-path was my first thought from having seen the pictures on the covers of "Buffalo Bill Diamond Dick" and "Young Wild West"—but, no, it was New Year's. Though too young to pay a fare, I was often given a hat check, punched with mysterious holes, and once the conductor allowed me to keep it, so I lighted on the train in my home town and marched proudly up the street, still wearing the check, the envy of all my playmates—unlucky lads whose fathers were not drummers!

Albany To Coleman Road Completed To Callahan Co. Line

According to the Albany News the Albany-Coleman road is about completed to the Callahan county line. T. M. Brown and son will complete their contract the first of next week on a five mile strip of the Albany-Baird highway, this will leave only a short strip on this road not completed and will give the public an all-weather or hard service road from Albany through Baird except a short strip to Callahan county line.

The contract which is being completed called for drainage structures grading and culchie on the road, beginning at the end of the strip completed during the past several years, and carries the all-weather road from Albany to a point near the Callahan county line. The large bridge over Hubbard creek has been completed.

The road ends in a pasture South of Hubbard Creek, traffic having to take a dirt road before reaching the end of the new highway to get to Baird.

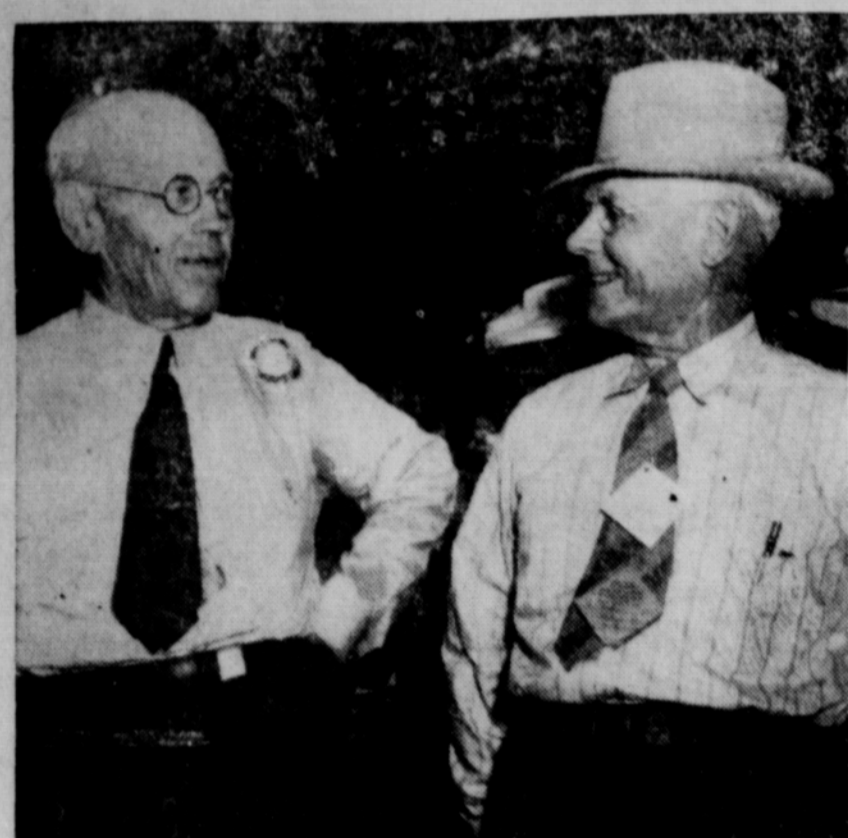

at Clyde, working in a box car office when there was only one other family there. "My father lived to live a hundred years, and my mother were married 72 years, with out a single divorce, but they had 11 children and 150 grandchildren." Mrs. John Atwood of Lubbock, who told of her family's moving in with 300 head of cattle in 1879 and building a 16 by 14 log cabin. Her father was Y. R. (Uncle Rab) Williams.
