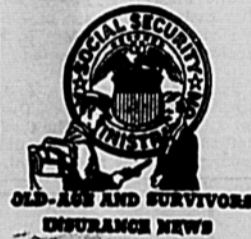

(Editor's Note: This is the eleventh in a series of articles compiled by C. M. Vaden, Jr., Field Representative of the Abilene Social Security Office.)

Social Security is a self-supporting insurance system. It is financed through Social Security taxes paid by the employee and his employer, and by the self-employed individual. The present tax rate is 2 1/4% for the employee matched by 2 1/4% by the employer. The rate for the self-employed person is 3 3/4%.

In order to keep the program self-supporting, tax increases are provided in the law each five years beginning with 1960 thru 1975. The increase for the employee and employer will be 1/4%

until a maximum of 4 1/4% is reached in 1975. The increase for the self-employed person is 3/4% until a maximum of 6 3/4% is reached in 1975.

Social Security taxes, as are all federal taxes, are collected by the Internal Revenue Service. They are then placed in the Social Security Trust Funds. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1957, total tax collections were approximately 6.5 billion dollars. Interest on the approximately 23 billion dollars in the funds amounted to \$561 million.

From the trust funds are paid the Social Security benefits and the costs of administering the program. Payments from the trust funds for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1957, were approximately 6.5 billion in benefits and \$150 million for operating expenses. This latter figure represents about 2.2 per cent of taxes collected. It includes not only the cost of administration of the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance but also the cost of the Treasury Department for issuing Social Security checks.

The 2.2% cost, we believe, represents an efficient administration of your Social Security program.

Texas is First In Farm Legislation

A major advance for the Texas Department of Agriculture was claimed by Commissioner John C. White this week with the announcement that Texas now stands first among 12 southern states in the amount and enforcement of farm legislation.

"Since 1951, we have jumped from seventh to first position in modern farm laws", said White. "These legal provisions have enabled us to increase our services

in Texas by as much as 300%. As a result, Texas can no longer be regarded as an agricultural dumping ground for inferior products from other areas".

The 33-year-old commissioner, who is seeking re-election to the top farm job in Texas, added that "ten years ago we were a convenient 'garbage pail' for the nation. Today, we can put more trust in our own production and know that farm goods shipped into the state must meet certain quality standards."

Commissioner White cited his re-organization of the Department as a major factor in modernizing and increasing farm services. It marked the first big overhaul in its previous 47-year history and helped put many programs on a self-supporting basis.

"Our goal during my past 7 years in office has been to increase state services without making constant demands for new tax money", White stated. "The clean-up of the state grain scandals, better seed laws, more effective insect controls and establishment of a market news service are just a part of the accomplishments under this system", he added.

White is actively campaigning to continue the programs he inaugurated after taking office in 1951. He defeated two opponents without the necessity of a runoff in 1952 and 1956 and was unopposed in 1954.

farms in North Texas, White said that "the challenge today is for even greater progress in our vital industry -- agriculture. It calls for devoted and experienced leadership in the future."

Before election to office, Commissioner White was head of the Department of Agriculture at Midwestern University, Wichita Falls. He and his wife and three sons now live in Austin.

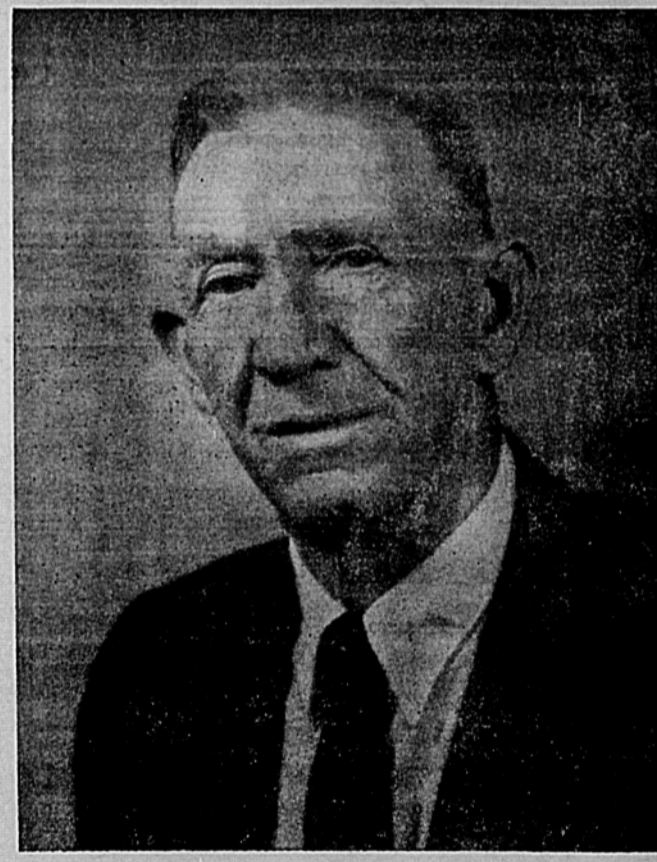
