





## New Federal Regulations CHARGE AND INSTALMENT ACCOUNTS

The new Government charge account regulations will not affect the majority of charge customers of our store. These customers, who pay their bills in full during the following month after purchase, may continue to use their charge accounts exactly as they have in the past.

The Federal Government through the Federal Reserve Board has decreed that 30-day charge accounts must be paid up relatively quickly. This regulation was issued and effective beginning Tuesday, May 5, 1942. Hitherto, the purchase on credit has been regulated to some extent, but this new decree stiffens the requirements. The rules that effect credit purchases at our store are as follows:

(1) CASH PURCHASES, no restrictions.

(2) CHARGE ACCOUNTS, must be paid by the 10th day of the second month after purchase, but no down payment is required. For instance, a listed article bought any day up to the end of May must be paid for by the 10th day of July. That date also is the dead-line for charged articles on the list which were bought before Tuesday, May

(3) INSTALMENT CREDIT, any person buying a listed item on instalment must pay 1-3 down and the balance in 12 months, except that furniture may be bought by paying 1.5 down and 12 months to pay. However, regardless of the total price, payments must not be less than \$5.00 per month. Previous rules usually 15 months, permitted smaller payments and did not fix a minimum down

There are other rules concerning the issuance of credit but these are the ones that will apply to our store. There are several relief clauses, however, in this bill. One particularly relating to charge accounts. If a charge account is not paid up in the required 40 to 70 days (depending on the day of the month the purchase is made) the technical default may be cleared up by making arrangements with us to pay up in the following six months on a fixed monthly basis of not less than \$5.00. Until such arrangement is made or the default paid up, we will be prohibited from charging any more listed articles to that account.

Please bear in mind that these are Government regulations and we are backing the Government in every way that we can by carrying out every order that they give us. Your kind cooperation is earnestly solicited.

### Charge Accounts Not Paid By 10th of Second Month After Purchase Are Automatically Suspended By Government Regulation

Section 5 of Consumer Credit Regulation W, as revised effective May 6, 1942, stipulates that a charge account shall be in default if not paid in full by the 10th of the second month after purchase. All merchants are requested to cease further extension of credit on such accounts. They may be re-opened for us at any time, however, by payment of amount past due.

### **Seasonal Income Customers**

Charge account customers with seasonal incomes, such as farmers and stockmen, may arrange terms in accordance with their incomes—as usual.
