Prospects for a bumper crop are good now, but continued wet weather would menace the crop through operation of the bollworm.—Reporter.

BUSH WELL COMES IN AS A BIG GUSHER

Makes 3,000 Barrels After Being Shot Last Thursday. Eight Producing Wells Now in Operation in Hilburn Field. Other Oil News

Those interested in Cross Plains and surrounding country are no little elated over the bringing in of the Bush well six and one-half miles northeast of town on last Thursday. It was shot with 600 quarts nitroglycerine and immediately bridged. The bridge was knocked down with the tools and the well flowed at the rate of 3000 barrels when it bridged again, and is now spraying oil nearly all of the time thru the bridge. Its coming in indicates that the field is coming toward Cross Plains in a southwesterly direction, the Bush being one mile southwest of the original Hilburn. Its success makes the Gooch well near Pioneer, four miles southwest of Hilburn, and four miles east of Cross Plains, indeed a very fine prospect. Look out for Cross Plains.

Humble Clark, No. 1, 1/2 mile southeast of the Hilburn No. 1, was shot on Thursday with 240 quarts, and responded with 1600 barrels initial production.

The W. C. Hilburn No. 1, brought in in January, seven and one-half miles northeast of Cross Plains, making 250 barrels. Had an initial production of 500 barrels.

W. C. Hilburn No. 2, the second producer in the field, is making 1200 barrels.

W. C. Hilburn No. 3, rig on location.

W. C. Hilburn No. 4, rig up.

M. L. Shook No. 3, brought in on 21st ult., initial production estimated at 4800 barrels; when 6-inch casing was pulled, a cave resulted, reducing flow to 2400.

H. L. Vestal, drilling at 1500.

Consolidated Vestal No. 1, two miles northeast of Cross Plains, on pump, producing fifty barrels.

Greenlee Harris No. 1, shut down at 1775, on account of losing bit in hole. A hook has been made to fish for bit, but a cave on top of bit had to be cleaned. The drillers are now ready for the fishing job.

Consolidated C. E. Barr, drilling out logs at 2900.

L. P. Litzinger et al, J. N. Gooch near Pioneer, resumed drilling at 2100 feet on Monday night after being shut down a few days to put in new crank shaft.

West Texas Oil and Gas Co. Odom No. 1, seven miles west of Cross Plains, shut down.

CALLAHAN COUNTY IS SELF-SUPPORTING

A farmer in this country does not need to make a money crop, if he is out of debt. He can raise everything he needs to eat at home, and should be pretty well doing that this year. Two acres planted to sweet potatoes, peas, and other garden crops adapted to this climate should supply the average family with all the vegetable food it needs, and a few hogs will supplement the table with meats and cooking oil. (This is not to be construed as an argument in favor of hog raising.) A few bushels of wheat and corn will supply the bread portion. But these money crops are just as easily produced. So have it all.

NEFF NOMINATED BY OVERWHELMING MAJORITY

In the run-off last Saturday Neff was nominated by a majority of more than seventy thousand votes. Davidson of Houston was nominated over Johnson for Lieutenant Governor. Pierson received the nomination for Supreme Court over Hawkins.

The total incomplete vote for Governor, as tabulated early this week, was 237,165 for Neff and 164,508 for Bailey.

Bailey carried Callahan County by 79 votes. He carried Comanche by a small vote. He carried no other county in this section of the State. Cross Plains went for Neff by 38 votes, and Cottonwood for Bailey by the same majority.

Old Settler Passes Away

Joe Pierce, aged 63, for thirty years, with an intermission of two years, a resident of the Curtis country, died on last Saturday, and was buried on Sunday in the Nimrod cemetery. Death resulted from paralysis and complications. The deceased was a brother of J. H. Pierce, who lives north of town.
