PATRIOTIC PROGRAM AND FOOTBALL TILT SCHEDULED IN BAIRD

Herd To Meet Bears Before Armistice Day Crowd Of Which 60 Are Draftees

Cross Plains business houses closed their doors Wednesday night not to open again until Friday morning, in observance of Armistice anniversary and in tribute to servicemen who are again fighting to retain the American way of life.

Thursday night at Baird a patriotic observance is scheduled at the high school football field, immediately preceding a football game between Baird and Cross Plains. Honor guests at the game and participating in the patriotic demonstration will be selectees from this county who are soon to enter the service. Other participants in the patriotic program and flag raising will be the Baird volunteer fire department, American Legionnaires, Callahan county 4-H clubs, and possibly pepsquads from the two schools. District Attorney J. R. Black is to make a brief address just before the kick-off for the football game.

Baird is favored to win the grid contest. Failure of Ray Plumlee and Herman Moore to straighten themselves up scholastically as of Tuesday at noon even further weakens the herd's chances. Plumlee has been Cross Plains strongest threat all season, however, he was absent from school Tuesday and Superintendent A. J. McCuin held little hope of his performing the necessary duties in time to straighten out his scholastic troubles in time for the game.

Baird is known to be much stronger than early in the season. Their recent conquest of Lorraine to the tune of 40 to nothing gives promise of plenty of trouble for the Buffaloes Thursday night, whether or not Plumlee plays.

CAN OPENERS STILL HAVE PLENTY TO DO IN COUNTY KITCHENS

Rationing has not emptied the shelves of Callahan county residents of canned foods it was revealed today, a total of 78,084 cans being used monthly, according to A. H. Nugent, general sales manager of the American Can Company.

Mr. Nugent based his figure on the governments compilation of 11,568 ration book holders in the county and the statement by the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics that the per capita consumption of canned goods so far this year is 225 cans a day. On the basis of the average size pre-war can, approximately 188 pounds of pure metallic tin is reclaimable for the war effort from those cans, he explained.

Men in service eat 8,000,000 cans of food a day and millions of pounds of canned items are being shipped abroad for lend lease, he said.

Many foods strange to American palates are being packed in cans for shipment overseas. One of these is "Tushonka" for Russian consumption, this product being highly seasoned pork packed in hard. Squid, a variety of octopus, is being canned for Italian consumption. Canned foods for England are usually seasoned quite differently to those intended for American use, Mr. Nugent said.

TURKEY PRODUCERS SHOULD SELECT 1944 BREEDING STOCK NOW

Callahan County turkey producers should select their 1944 breeding stock early because present indications point to as large a consumer demand next year as this year. The parents of next years crop should be chosen before the best birds in the 1943 flock have been marketed. Those which matured fastest, made the best gains, and fattened out early should be selected for breeding stock.

Walking the birds is the first step in the examination for the selection of breeders. The frame, compactness and body carriage are observed. Sometimes poor balance or symmetry can be detected more easily than by handling the turkey. Select females which develop early, have good width of breast and deep body from back to keel. The keel should be relatively long and extend between the legs, and the back wide and flat. The same consideration should be given in the selection of toms.

Such defects as weak hook joints, off-colored plumage, slipped or split wings and baggy crops also may be detected easily when the bird is walked.

The grower will be better served if he buys toms from another producer who has developed a good strain in the same breed. A number of Texas breeders are trap nesting their breeding stock and points from these strains are pedigreed. In this manner they can locate those birds which give the highest fertility and production. Both of these points are important in a breeding program.

If producers do a good job of selecting this fall, better turkeys may be expected in 1944 than will be produced this year.

SUGGESTIONS ON HOW TO MAKE FRUIT CAKE BY MISS D. WILKERSON

Less fruit cake will be made this year than usual. All the same, some good managers will be able to provide the sugar, fat and other rationed or scarce ingredients.

That calls for some sound general instructions to make sure of no failures. Reports Dorothy Wilkerson, County Home Demonstration Agent, who writes as follows:

First, about preparing the pans. If you'll grease them and line them with waxed paper, that will prevent the cake crust from be-

coming too brown, thick, and dry baking. You can use heavy wax paper or brown paper, however, be sure to grease it well. Remember, fruit cakes rise very little—therefore you can fill the pans nearly full.

Next about cooking the cake. The success of cooking depends on low temperature and a long cooking period. You can bake your cake in a slow oven or steam it in a covered container or pressure cooker and then "dry it" in the oven. If you want to decorate the cake to make it a little fancy, do this when the cake has almost finished cooking. That's because nuts and fruit will become discolored with long cooking in the oven. If you're steaming the cake, you can add the decorations after the steaming period.

After you remove the cake from the oven, let it cool in the paper in which it was baked. Then wrap it in a second layer of heavy paper and tie it with twine. An old stone crock makes the ideal place for storage.
