FIRMED BY HIGHER COURT**

TO LOCAL OIL FIELD**

Cross Plains is going ahead with its building program and daily increase in population as fast as locations and building material for things substantial can be put together, while our neighboring little city of Pioneer is simply "whoopin' 'em up."

With every class of development work in the main field and reaching far out into new territory being rushed with the usual haste and excitement that follows the discovery of a new oil field, the greatest interest for the past week has centered on the outcome of the King well at Pioneer. Rumors of various nature are current regarding the delay in completing this well, and have caused doubt among a few of the less optimistic as to its ultimate value. However, from a standpoint of its location and a knowledge of its condition obtained by observation, leads practical oil men and a majority of the general people to the belief that when brought in it will exceed in production any of the completed wells in the field.

Two other wells, each of the average production, were completed in the field the first of this week. The Scott well (steel rig) come in for about 150 barrels, and the well on the Webb tract, across the road from Teston No. 3, came in for what is claimed to be an equal of Teston No. 1.

A report from the field Thursday morning states that the pay sand was struck in the King well at Pioneer late Wednesday evening, and that it is coming in for a big producer.

**GEORGE HORNSBY TO  
HANG ON APRIL 14**

George F. Hornsby was sentenced to be hanged in Belton on Friday, April 14th, by Judge M. B. Blair of the Bell County District, last week. Hornsby was convicted of the murder of J. N. Weatherby at Brownwood in Oct., 1920, and his conviction was affirmed by the Court of Criminal Appeals, which last week declined a new hearing of the case. Judge Blair was officially notified of the action of the appellate court on Monday, and called the convicted man before him for sentence.

"I am an innocent man tried without a chance," Hornsby said as the sentence was pronounced. "I haven't had a chance all the way through. I hope the good people of Bell county will pray for me because I am an innocent man."

**FLOCK OF WILD DUCKS  
BLINDED BY SAND STORM**

Barbour noticed the peculiar actions of a flock of wild ducks, flying around in circles, gradually closing the circle, and flying lower and lower until reaching the ground. Barbour got out of his car and walked toward them. As they did not show signs of fright, he walked into the flock and picked up one of the ducks. To his surprise, he found that all of them, twenty-three, had had been blinded by the sand dust that had been blowing all day.

**CISCO MAN FROZEN  
TO DEATH ON ROAD**

M. V. Hallmark of Cisco, who travels for a tobacco company, and has many business acquaintances in Cross Plains, was found frozen to death the first of last week, fifteen miles west of Clairmont on the Clairmont and Post City road. He left Clairmont, it is stated, about 5 o'clock Tuesday evening for Post City. It is supposed he had trouble with his automobile and worked until he was chilled. He left his automobile and walked about a mile toward Clairmont. He was found near the road the next morning, supposed to have frozen to death, as it was bitter cold, while some are of the opinion that he died from heart failure, caused by over-exertion while working with his car. Nothing in his car had been disturbed and papers and money were found in his pocket intact.

**NEW DEEP TEST FOR  
CALLAHAN COUNTY**

The Dudley Oil, Gas & Development Co. purchased from the Higginbotham Lumber Yard in Cross Plains this week, derrick timbers for a deep well test in the southwest corner of Callahan county. This well is under contract to be spudded in by April 1st, and to drill to a depth of 4,000 feet, unless oil in paying quantities is struck at a lesser depth.

**W. R. JOHNSON  
DIES AT ANSON**

## Condensed Austin News

### LESSON FOR MARCH 19

#### THE DOWNFALL OF ISRAEL

LESSON TEXT—II Kings 17:1-41. GOLDEN TEXT—Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people.—Prov. 11:3.

This was the fulfillment of that which Amos had predicted in the days of Jeroboam II, at a time when the nation was at the height of its prosperity. The northern kingdom was ruled by 19 kings, all of whom were wicked. Their wickedness was not because of lack of information, or opportunity, but in spite of it. God promised the first king His blessing if he would be loyal to Him. Jeroboam departed from God and the apostasy thus began. Continued downward to the end in the reign of Hoshea, the last king, the king of Assyria came and besieged Samaria and carried the children of Israel captive to Assyria, from which they never returned.

**I. The Sins Which Caused Their Doom (vv. 1-18).**  
1. Conformed to the ways of the heathen (vv. 7-9). God had commanded them not to follow in the ways of the heathen, but these Israelites instead of maintaining their separation, secretly did that which was displeasing to God. Secret sins just as surely as open sins bring ruin, for all things are naked and open to Him with whom we have to do. One may maintain his reputation before men while practicing sins, but ruin will sooner or later overtake him.

2. Served idols (vv. 10-12). They not only compromised by "walking in the statutes of the heathen," but worshiped their gods. It was not a long step from following in the statutes of the heathen to worshiping them. Before they worshiped idols they first of the true God. Idolatry comes in because the race did not wish to retain God in its affection (Rom. 1:21-23). People today are worshiping idols because they have first cast off the authority of the living God. Man is a worshipful being. When he ceases to worship the true God, he worships other gods. Neutral ground is impossible.

3. They were rebellious (vv. 13-15). God by His prophet had said unto them "Turn ye from your evil ways and keep my commandments," but they stubbornly refused His testimony, even rejected His statutes. God, in love, tried to save them. He sent some of the noblest and best prophets who ever spoke to man to persuade them to turn from their sins, such as Elijah and Elisha, but they hardened their hearts and plunged deeper into wickedness.

4. Caused their sons and daughters to pass through the fire (v. 17). This was the dreadful Moloch worship—the most cruel rite of heathen worship. It was done by kindling a fire in a hollow metal image until its arms were red hot and placing live children therein to be burned to death.

5. Resorted to magical practices (v. 17). When faith in the true God wanes, men always turn to the magical arts. In this way they sold themselves to evil in the sight of the Lord to provoke Him to anger.

**II. Judgment Falls (v. 18).** At this stage of the drama the curtain falls. God could not be inactive longer.

1. God was very angry. God's anger is not raving fury, but the revulsion of His holy nature against sin. Sin cannot exist in His presence. His wrath must strike. Though He waits long, the debt must be paid and always with compound interest. There is only one way to escape God's wrath; that is, to turn from sin.

## THE ATTORNEY GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT

The Attorney General's Department has approved an issue of \$30,000 of bonds of Everman Independent School District, Tarrant County.

M. C. Erwin, sanitary engineer of the State Bureau of Sanitary Engineering, has resigned to become City Engineer and Sanitarian of Fort Arthur, Texas.

A total of nearly \$19,000 was paid last week by officers of the American Legion in satisfying certain claims, explanation of which was made by Assistant Attorney General L. C. Sutton.

H. R. F. Holland of San Antonio has been appointed assistant sanitary engineer for the State Board of Health. Mr. Holland received his engineering degree at the State University in 1911.

The Attorney General's Department has approved the following bond issues: City of Chillicothe, \$75,000; city of Robstown street improvement bonds, \$40,000.

The Railroad Commission has granted authority to the Wichita Falls & Southern Railroad Company for the adoption of a rate of 13c per 100 pounds on gasoline, naphtha and kerosene from South Bend to Graham.

Cabbage shipments from the Lower Rio Grande Valley in January and February of this year totaled 1,501 cars, compared with a total of 1,670 cars for all of last season, according to reports received by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Prohibition enforcement officers in Texas seized during the year 1921 property having a total appraised valuation of \$167,918, according to the annual report of David H. Morris, federal prohibition director for Texas. Property valued at \$31,664 was destroyed and \$135,919 of property was retained.

The State Banking Board has granted authority to do business to two new banks. They are: Guaranty State Bank of Oakwood, Leon County capital stock, \$25,000 and Golden State Bank of Golden, Wood County, capital stock, \$10,000. Both banks adopted the guaranty fund plan for protection of depositors.

Attorney General W. A. Keelting, who left last week for Mexico, said he would assist in the reorganization of the police department of that city and the forces of Limestone County, in accordance with the promise made by the citizens of Limestone County to Governor Neff, which led to the Governor lifting martial law.

A loan for the prison system was successfully negotiated last week, as forecast in last week's news dispatches. The money will be obtained on a 7 per cent basis without the payment of any bonus or expense items. It will be slightly more than \$700,000, the Governor thinks. It is to be repaid by Feb. 1, 1923, but not sooner than Oct. 1, next.

The State Fire Insurance Commission has awarded San Antonio the maximum good fire record credit of 15 per cent off the final rate, its loss ratio having been an average of 252 for the last three years. Recently the commission bulletined San Antonio as being entitled to a 12 per cent reduction. This was found to be erroneous and the new bulletin extends the full credit.

Contract for another unit of the American Legion Memorial Sanatorium at Kerrville was awarded last week by building committee. Contract for construction of the nurses' building was awarded at \$25,080. The building committee has now awarded contracts for three units, making a total of four units, the first unit having been completed when the State took over the property from the American Legion.

The Attorney General's Department has approved two issues of Angelina County special road bonds, one for \$60,000, and the other for \$7,500.

The widow of a Confederate pensioner who marries again and is subsequently divorced from her second husband is entitled to a Confederate pension, according to an opinion given by the Attorney General's Department. Its Comptroller, Louis A. Smith.

### PREPARE TO COMBAT DANGEROUS HOUSE-FLY

The common house-fly is the chief cause of typhoid fever and it also transmits such diseases as tuberculosis, dysentery, anthrax, cholera and diarrhea, states D. E. Breed, Executive Secretary, Texas Public Health Association.

Flies thrive in such places as cess-pools, manure, decomposing vegetable matter, etc. It takes the eggs a week to hatch so their breeding places should be removed or disinfected at least every five or six days.

To secure comfort as well as protection against infection by flies and other insects every one should see that his house is properly screened so that they cannot gain admittance to the home. It is much better to screen the house and prevent their entrance than it is to try to kill them with swatters after they have gained an entrance. If the breeding places of flies are destroyed and houses properly screened the spread of many diseases will be materially lessened.

Now is the time to start the campaign against the fly as an army at this time is very small. However the fly increases so rapidly that unless we wage an unremitting campaign against him from this time until every house, town and county is free from this pest, our earlier efforts will have been in vain.

A doe rabbit is known to have about five young at each farrowing time and she farrows about five times a year, barring calamity and domestic troubles, therefore, the 7,500 doe rabbits if undisturbed would, at the end of the year, have become the progenitors of 187,500 virile young rabbits waiting for the crop harvest; not taking into account the thousands of rabbit nieces and nephews that break into society and start keeping house at a tender age.—Coleman Democrat.

### MODERN CITY'S EPIC Subject That Would Give the Poet Play to the Most Powerful Imagination.

We suggest a return to the true romance, which is only possible through the exercise of the imagination. There have been a few epic novels of America. It is no longer a theme for poetry, even for a book of poems—it demands an epic treatment in prose. The significance of its true proportions is too great to grasp otherwise.

It is so crowded with grotesque, ironic, evilly fantastic things that all the "reach of rocky hell" fades by comparison. A "New Inferno" was once attempted by the poet Stephen Phillips. But a "New Inferno" of the modern city has never been penned or even typewritten. In its powerful imagination could find the fullest play—for verily nothing is too terrible, absurd or sublime to happen here and now. The palette is proposed with every conceivable color for the master painter.

### PROVED TRUTH OF OLD ADAGE

California Citrus-Fruit Growers Know That a Remedy Can Be Worse Than the Disease.

It is possible for the remedy to be worse than the disease. This has been very forcibly demonstrated in citrus-fruit regions in California. Two years ago, a fly of the plant-house family was brought from Africa for the purpose of eliminating the black scale that had taken for years a toll of millions from the citrus-fruit industries of the state. As hoped for, the scale disappeared entirely, but the fly increased enormously, and is now one of the greatest insect pests there. Its bite is in some cases so serious that sufferers have to go to a hospital. Two insectaries conducted by the state department of agriculture were temporarily closed recently, pending the recovery of a dozen employees from the disagreeable bites of these insects. Consequently, now the department is searching frantically for an exterminator of its former friends.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

### HUMANE TRAP.

Differ from former traps in that it kills its victims instantly, instead of mangling the leg or tearing the flesh, is a trap for rats, gophers and similar animals, described in Popular Mechanics Magazine. Two small frames with telescoping iron side pieces and connected at their outer corners by strong springs, are held apart by a central trip arrangement, and carry sharp spikes on the end pieces. These frames are locked apart by the trip and laid over the hole of the animal. As the latter pokes its head through the trap in search of the bait, it operates the trip and the springs bring the spiked frames forcibly together. The spikes enter the head of the animal, killing it instantly.

### HAS OWN "MOVIE" THEATER.

Blenheim palace, the famous seat of the duke of Marlborough, is to have its own motion-picture theater. The new duchess of Marlborough, formerly Miss Gladys Deacon of Boston, is an ardent movie fan, and to gratify her passion for the pictures the duke has arranged to have a complete motion-picture outfit placed in one of the halls of the palace, and will have all the newest films sent down from London.

### THRILLS OCEAN JOY-RIDERS.

A new "hydroglider" just completed on the west coast is described and illustrated in Popular Mechanics. It is said to furnish all the thrill and speed of a hydroplane gliding over the surface of the ocean. In fact, it amounts practically to a flying boat without wings, and is driven over the surface of the water by an air-propelled motor at a speed of 60 miles an hour.

STATE BANK AT NEW BRAUNFELS ROBBED

BANDITS FORCE FIVE EMPLOYEES INTO VAULT WHILE BANDITS TAKE CASH.

San Antonio, Texas.—Five bandits in one of the most daring daylight bank robberies in the history of Texas looted the New Braunfels State Bank at noon Friday and escaped with an estimated \$75,000.

According to A. R. Ludwig, assistant cashier, there was \$25,000 in cash and \$50,000 in securities, mainly Liberty bonds, taken by the bandits.

The robbery consumed only about five minutes. No shots were fired. The five employes on duty at the time were locked in the vault, but succeeded in getting out after the robbers had fled. The bandits were believed to have fled in an automobile toward San Antonio.

The report of the robbery was spread over New Braunfels by the ringing of the fire alarm. The entire town was alerted. Poses were rushed from San Antonio. The New Braunfels State Bank is located on the city plaza, which marks the business center of the town.

Mr. Ludwig, an eye-witness to the robbery, declared that three men, wearing yellow-colored spectacles, but not masked, entered the bank at 12:25 o'clock.

"Stick 'em up and lay down," they commanded as they entered the bank. The safe was then looted of its contents. All loose money on the counters and in cash drawers was taken. The men were in the bank only about five minutes.

The three men with their swag in sacks ran from the bank and leaped into a waiting automobile, in which two other men were seated. The gang escaped from the city without being fired.

New Braunfels was alerted by the boldness of the robbery for a few minutes after the hold-up.

RANGERS TO HELP CLEAN UP AUSTIN

Headquarters Police to Co-Operate With Police in Drive.

Austin, Texas.—Instructions have been given Headquarters Company of the State Ranger force, commanded by Captain Frank Hamer, former Federal prohibition enforcement agent, to aid the police in cleaning up Austin.

Adjutant General Thomas D. Barton, who has admitted that such instructions have been given, said that many complaints had been received regarding conditions in the capital city.

Mr. Barton said that the Rangers have instructions to look into things around Austin a little more than has been the case in the past.

"I would not have the impression go out, however," said General Barton, "that we are grasping the bull by the horns. It is not as bad as that."

The Adjutant General asked if Governor Neff had been instrumental in the issuance of orders to the Rangers "to keep their eyes open" in Austin and vicinity, answered that he did not believe that he had conferred with the executive on the matter.

General policies, Mr. Barton explained, were discussed with the Governor, but "my office naturally attends to the details."

Man Found Frozen On Road.

Talia, Texas.—Joe T. Mitchell, a traveling salesman for the Gates Rubber Company, was found Friday twelve miles north of here, frozen to death during the snowstorm of Thursday in an auto for Canyon and the car became entangled in a snow-bank.

Evidence shows that he had left the car and had gone one and one-half miles on down the road, where he was found dead against the fence.

Appropriation For Buying Grain.

DALLAS COMPANY SELLS RAILROAD

ADAM H. DAVIDSON ANNOUNCES DEAL CLOSED FOR LOUISIANA AND NORTHWESTERN.

Dallas.—Properties of the Louisiana & Northwestern Railroad, including stocks and bonds of the road to the extent of a total par value of \$4,600,000, were sold Thursday to New York investors by the Dallas Guaranty Mortgage Company of Dallas, according to information received here Thursday night from Adam H. Davidson, president of the company, of this city.

The road is approximately 150 miles in length, extending through the Home and Haynesville oil fields of Louisiana and into Arkansas, terminating near the El Dorado field.

The sale was consummated in St. Louis where the reorganization of the railroad company was completed, according to telegraphic information from Mr. Davidson, who is now in New York.

Mr. Davidson was elected treasurer and a director. Financial offices of the railroad will be established in Dallas. Mr. Davidson said the deal was handled by Mr. Davidson and A. H. Winston, also of Dallas.

The sale, according to the announcement, involves the stocks and bonds of the railroad of a total par value of \$4,600,000, which, together with other considerations, brings the total amount of securities sold to \$6,000,000.

At the meeting the following stockholders in St. Louis, the following directors were elected: W. M. Cannon, all of New York; W. F. Carter, St. Louis, and Odum H. Davidson, Dallas. The directors in turn elected W. M. Cannon president; Sherry O'Brien, vice president; Peter Roshback Jr., secretary; and Adam H. Davidson, Dallas. The financial office will be established in Dallas, Mr. Davidson said.

PERSHING IS OPPOSED TO ARMY REDUCTION

Would Have Less Efficient Men Discharged From Service.

Washington.—General Pershing has reiterated before the House Military Committee his opposition to the plan of the House subcommittee to reduce the number of enlisted men to 135,000 and officers to 11,000.

He repeated his recommendation that authority be given the War Department to reorganize its officer personnel by the immediate discharge of the "less efficient" men.

The chief of staff urged prompt passage of a bill which would create a "plucking board" which would discharge enough officers to bring the total down to 12,000. There are a little less than 13,000 officers on the active list at present, he said.

Reporting that the enlisted strength of the regular army approximated 340,000, General Pershing protested against slashing appropriations to an extent that would require the discharge of about 25,000 men and nearly 2,000 officers by July 1, contending that it would "cripple the army very materially."

Effort Being Made TO AVERT COAL STRIKE

Washington.—Coal miners and operators have been urged by Secretary of Labor Davis "in the interest of common sense to get together and save the country from the costly results of a strike."

The Labor Secretary in a formal statement said that with the approval of President Harding he had entered into direct communication with representatives of the coal operators of the central competitive field with a view to a joint meeting of the operators and miners prior to March 1, the present working agreement expires.

Washington, D. C.—Home building throughout the Nation during the last three months "exceeded in volume the activities for the same months in any year since 1915," according to Secretary Hoover.

A FOUR WAY SPLIT IN WAR PAYMENTS YOU CAN'T TRUST CALOMEL AT ALL

GREAT BRITAIN IS POKETING LION'S SHARE RESERVATIONS MADE FOR U. S. BILLION MARKS IN THE POT

German Payment is Partitioned Among England, Belgium, France and Italy. Paris.—At the last hour, the allies have lost; they have opened for the United States to claim its share of the first billion marks paid by Germany. The United States Government, through R. W. Boyden, unofficial representative of the Reparations Commission, demanded part of this payment to meet the costs of the American army of occupation. Allied Foreign Ministers have signed an agreement partitioning the amount according to the cost of the allied armies of occupation—"subject to the rights of the United States, however, these may claim the amount." Except for this general reservation the American demand was ignored. The entire billion was partitioned with England getting the lion's share and the remainder divided among France, Italy and Belgium. The Boyden note is characterized as "absolutely unacceptable" by Sir Robert Horne of Great Britain, and the United States envoy was advised to refer his demands to the allied governments. However, after the agreement had been submitted to the French Cabinet for approval, it was signed with the important general reservation regarding the rights of the United States. The question raised by the American demand for an integral share of the German payments is a fundamental one. Has the United States, the allies ask, any right to claim benefits of the Versailles treaty, which she refused to ratify in order to avoid its obligations? The agreement just signed provides for partition of the first \$1,000,000,000 paid by Germany as follows: England 550,000,000 marks. France 140,000,000 marks. Italy, the equivalent of 150,000,000 marks. Belgium the remainder. The allied ministers also provided for divisions of German payments in kind to be made this year. Of this France gets 65 per cent, from which she must deduct 300,000,000 on account of her Saar mine holdings and the rest is partitioned among the other allies. The American note presented by Boyden said the United States "intends to obtain integral payment with interest to May 1, 1921, before any portion of the German payments is distributed for reparations or anything else."

HOPE FOR VOTE ON TREATY THIS WEEK

Washington.—If the administration leaders succeed with the plan on which they have agreed, Senate consideration of the four-power treaty will reach the stage of action during the week. Believing that virtually every Senator has made up his mind how he will vote, those in charge of the treaty will begin an aggressive effort to bring the debate to a conclusion. Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, the Republican leader, hopes to secure a unanimous agreement setting a time to begin roll call on the proposed reservations, and if he fails he is prepared to hold the Senate in session until late hours, so that the storm of oratory over the treaty may spend itself as soon as possible. The opponents of ratification are not expected to assent readily to such unanimous agreement as Senator Lodge suggests, although they declare they have no intention of unduly prolonging the debate.

600 CASUALTIES IN SOUTH AFRICA DISTURBANCES

Johannesburg, South Africa.—Striking gold miners have practically surrounded Johannesburg and are attacking desperately in an attempt to seize the city before the arrival of reinforcements which are being rushed to the aid of the besieged Government troops and volunteers. The attack is being conducted by strong forces which include not only strikers, but discontented elements from the mining district's population. Latest estimates of the casualties are 100 killed and 500 wounded in Saturday's warfare.

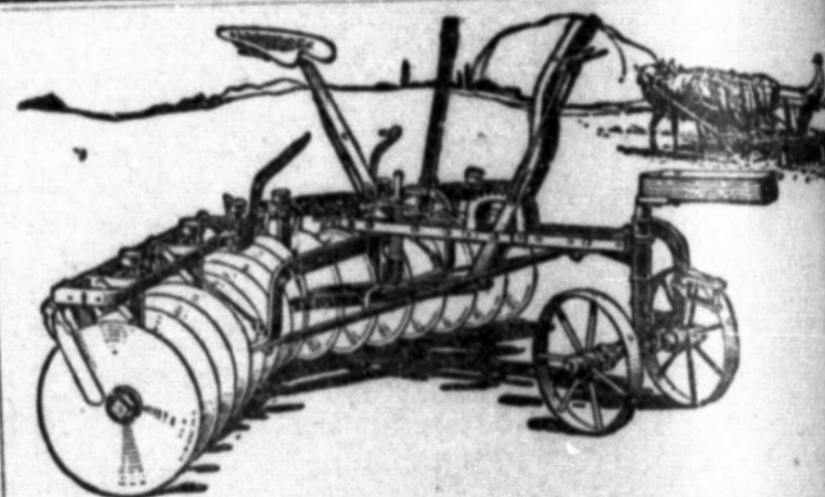

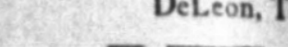
