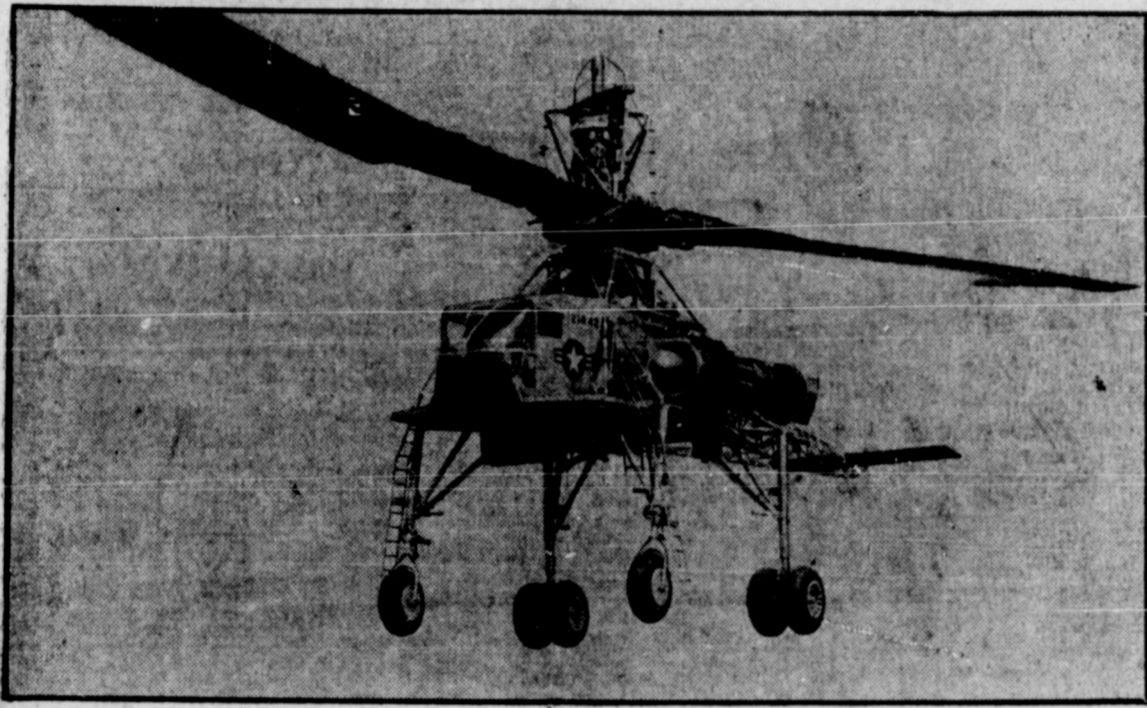

**WIDE WHIRLING ARMS**—Biggest helicopter in the world, the XH-17, made a test flight at Culver City, Calif. The long blades extend more than 125 feet from end to end. This is expected to be the first of experimental heavy-lift machines able to pick up and carry heavy artillery, trucks, even sections of bridges. Because it is able to land where conventional aircraft cannot, the XH-17 will be able to supply almost inaccessible areas with heavy equipment. The machine was built by Howard Hughes' aircraft company for the U. S. Air Force. It is powered by two turbojets, one at each blade tip.

A number of local residents saw a Porcupine for their first time here last Thursday morning when John Richey brought the animal to town after it was killed on the George Bagby place north of Ashtola by Bill and Willard Marshall. The Porcupine was treed in a hole by the Marshall's dogs and was dug out and killed. It is very unusual for a Porcupine to be in this part of the country, but it is believed that there are possibly others in the same neighborhood since this one had a den, which was an indication that it was not traveling.

## Subsoiling Approved For Donley County

The county office received a notice in regard to a letter to the State Office requesting that subsoiling be approved for Donley County. The State Office approved this practice and added it to the list of practices for 1952. The specifications for subsoiling are as follows:

Prior approval will not be given for subsoiling sandy land where equipment will not penetrate a clay soil or hardpan, nor for any acreage for which assistance was given for this practice under any previous program.

Subsoiling must be carried out to a depth that will effectively shatter the hardpan or plow sole. **FARMER'S OR RANCHER'S RESPONSIBILITY**

Secure written approval of the county committee before subsoiling is begun. Report performance, using the form on which the practice was approved after the practice is completed and not later than the date for reporting established by the county committee.

The different assistance rates for subsoiling are:

D. At a spacing of not more than 48 inches in width and a minimum depth of 12 inches. \$1.50 per acre.

E. At a spacing of not more than 42 inches in width and a minimum depth of 14 inches — \$2.00.

F. At a spacing of not more than 21 inches in width and a minimum depth of 12 inches — \$2.00.

## White Deer Bucks Defeat Broncos 21-13

The Clarendon Broncos had their thoughts of any district participation banished last Friday night when they lost another heart-breaker to the White Deer Bucks. The final score was 21 to 13.

Local fans had the opportunity of watching the Broncos stack up a nice lead in the first two quarters, only to see that same something that has plagued the Broncos all season (with the exception of the Panhandle game), take over and the Broncos go down in defeat. The Bucks came back on the field after the half-time period and ran rough shod over the Broncos, scoring three touchdowns with extra points, to win by 8 points.

The Broncos literally ran over the Bucks and even pushed them back toward their own goal line on most plays during the first half. The first Bronco score came early in the first quarter when Cotton Hall went over from the five yard line. They followed up a few minutes later with Myers going over from the 11 yard line. The Broncos were nearing pay dirt when the half ended.

The second half was just the reverse with the Bucks on the offense, scoring twice in the third and once in the fourth.

The entire Bronco squad turned in a nice game in spite of the reverses in the second half.

### Irrigation Meeting Draws Much Interest

Over one hundred farmers attended an irrigation meeting at the court house in Clarendon on November 13th at 7:30 in the evening. H. M. Breedlove, county agent, was in charge of the meeting. Mr. R. V. Thurman, Extension irrigation specialist was the speaker for the evening. He explained locating irrigation wells, types of irrigation and answered questions for the audience.

There are now about twenty irrigation wells in Donley County and more are being drilled. Irrigation water in Donley County is spotted and Breedlove says that the only way to tell if you have irrigation water on your farm is to drill a test hole or put down a well and then you will know.

There is much interest in irrigation at this time and any one wanting information should call by the office of the county agent and discuss it with him.

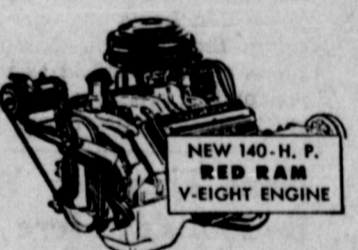

#### WASHINGTON AFTER THE ELECTION:

The Capital City, as is usual after all presidential elections, reflects a mixed feeling of elation

and gloom. This would appear rather odd to many, as it is commonly believed in many places that when one administration is turned out and a new one is coming in, the entire picture in the Capital should be all gloom. The reason for such belief is the common view that most federal employees depend upon the adminis-

tration for their jobs and are therefore jeopardized by a change of administration. However, this is not the case. The truth is that there is only a very small percentage of job holders who will be affected by the change. These are the top administrative jobs and number less than 2,000. All of the other federal employees are

under civil service and are not subject to dismissal from their jobs for political reasons. Many people have thought that all federal employees were more or less affiliated with whichever political party might be in power and that the party in power could always count on a large bloc of votes from this source. However, this

is also not the case. The fact is that a majority of the federal employees in and around Washington usually vote against the administration in power. This has been proven many times in presidential elections since the civil service system was established. It was conclusively proved in this presidential election. Eisenhower carried all of the sections around Washington where the federal workers live and vote. This includes many precincts in Maryland and Virginia. The vote received by Eisenhower in the sections of Virginia most heavily populated by federal employees gave him a larger majority than other sections of the same state. The same is true in Maryland. The residents who live inside of the District of Columbia are not allowed to vote. However, they engage in politics as much as, or more so, than in other cities of like size. It was very evident inside of the District of Columbia that had the people here been allowed to vote, Eisenhower would have carried two large sections of the District where most of the federal workers are housed.

I have just returned from making a radio statement that will be beamed to countries behind the Iron Curtain. The statement concerned Adolph Sabath, of Illinois, whose recent death was mourned by the whole nation and free peoples everywhere. Congressman Sabath came to the United States as a Czech immigrant at the age of 15 years. When he landed in Baltimore he had \$1.36 in his pocket, but he was well armed with courage, ambition, intelligence and faith. In his first job he received \$3.00 per week, and from that humble beginning rose to national prominence. He was elected to Congress in March of 1907, and had served continuously since that time, a longer record of service than any other person in the history of the United States. The great success story of this Czech immigrant is a typical success story in America. Let us all hope that his life will be the guiding light to those of his native land and other countries now enclosed behind the Iron Curtain, and to whom opportunity has been obliterated by communist oppression. The life story of Adolph Sabath could well furnish the strength to these peoples that will enable them to cast off

the yoke of totalitarian enslavement and build in their countries the kind of government that would afford to their children the freedom and the opportunity that we in America cherish.

#### Faith Gospel Mission

Last Sunday was a Banner day for the Mission. Fifty three were present in the service and a fine spirit of fellowship prevailed. Perry Jordon, one of our fine young people, took the place of Duane Hearn as our Sunday School Supt. and is carrying on in a commendable way. Duane is away in New Mexico working for the time being; we are missing him from our mission.

All sorts of remedies are being proposed for our national ills but we treat the symptoms instead of the disease. It is not money that we need, for God's remedy is without money and without price. It is not education that we need for the trouble is of the heart, not the head. Politics cannot save us; the average politician's platform is like a street car platform—not to stand on but to get in on.

What shall we do? The Prophet Amos gave us the remedy in Amos 4:12. "Prepare to meet thy God." This was a much used text in other days, but today God is not regarded as a person; Hell is a by-word; Heaven is a joke, and the Judgment day a superstition, but for all this, Humanity is hastening on to give an accounting at the great Judgment Day.

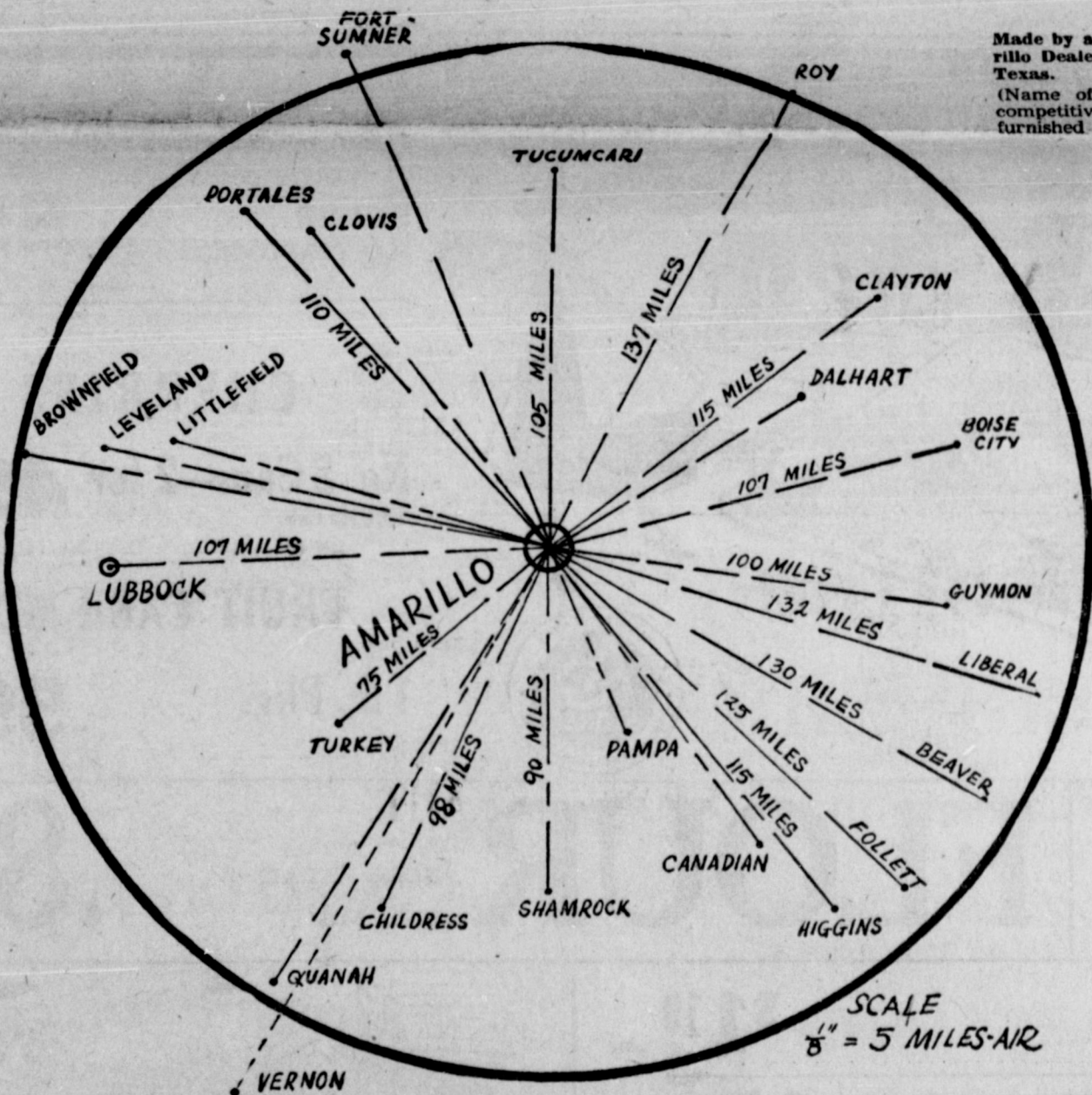

Mrs. Greene, leader of the program introduced her subject by saying citizens know of war projects of the atom, but few know how much it is being used in civilian times.

A technical background discussion of the atom, how it was composed and its structure was discussed by Mrs. J. R. Porter. Scientific terms were defined in simple, understandable language by Mrs. Porter. She illustrated her talk by drawing the chemical structure of the atom and showing how it was split. A Geiger Counter and how it operated was also shown.

Mrs. J. T. Patman gave the use of the atom in medicine. She said the isotopes were perhaps the greatest advent since the invention of the microscope. The atom is used as a tracer in medicine and as an internal radiation treatment.

Mrs. Greene then concluded the program with the use of the atom in agriculture and industry. Farmers, by using the atom to advantage, can tell when the soil needs phosphorus and other fertilizers. Experiments have been conducted by using the isotopic factions for improving the breeding of plants.

**A Gift of \$25,000 in Scholarships For University of Texas**

AUSTIN—A gift of \$25,000 in scholarships for University of Texas Journalism students will help ease the path to a degree for several students a year for the next 10 years.

The gift, made through the Houston Endowment, Inc., was made possible through the interest of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse H. Jones. It was presented at the dedication ceremony for the new Journalism Building by John T. ones, r., president of the Houston Chronicle and nephew of Jesse H. Jones.

To newspapermen throughout the country, Jesse H. Jones is known primarily as the owner and publisher of the Houston Chronicle. Outside the journalism profession, however, he is known best for his industrial interests. He entered the lumber business in Texas in 1895 and established the Bankers Mortgage Company (then known as the Texas Trust Company) in Houston in 1909.

In public service he was director of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation from 1932 to 1939 and Secretary of Commerce from 1940 to 1945.

Details for awarding the journalism scholarships will be announced later. According to the grant, however, \$2,500 will be awarded each fall, beginning next September, for 10 years.

Paul J. Thompson, School of Journalism director, said of the gift:

"The scholarships will be of great benefit to many Journalism students who face the necessity of paying for their own college careers. Many of our journalism students are earning all or part of their expenses while in school. Occasionally a worthy student will have to drop out because of lack of finances. These scholarships should relieve the strain upon eight or ten such students each year. We are deeply grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Jones and to the directors of the Endowment."

**Cotton Troubles!**

Cotton is the overcoat of a seed that is planted and grown in the southern states to keep the producer broke and the buyer crazy. The fiber varies in color and weight, and the man who can guess nearest the length of the fiber is called a cotton man by the public, a robber by the farmer, and a poor business man by his banker. The price of cotton is determined in New York and goes up when you have sold and goes down when you have bought. A buyer working for a group of mills was sent to New York to watch the cotton market, and after a few days deliberation he wired to this effect: "Some say it will go up and some think it will go down. I do, too. Whatever you do will be wrong—act at once." Cotton is planted in the spring, mortgaged in the summer, and left in the field in the winter.

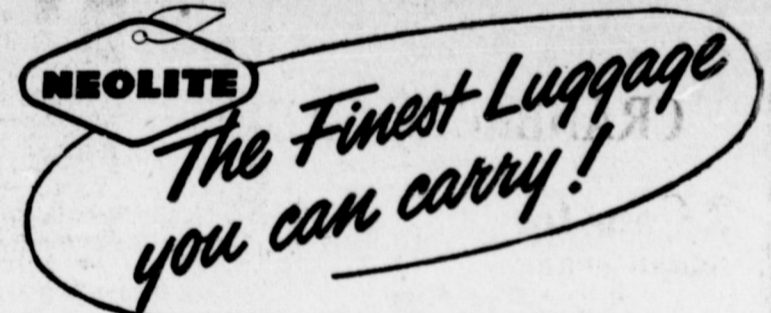

The musket over the fireplace once stood for security in American homes. It meant game for the pot. It gave protection against unfriendly beasts and Indians. It was a first defense against hunger and danger in the new land.

Our Thanksgiving celebrates the security of the colonists. Our turkeys are the descendants of the wild turkeys their muskets brought down; our cranberries, of the cranberries they found in the bogs. Our pumpkins, potatoes, and onions still commemorate the good harvest the Pilgrims gathered in 1623.

Now automobiles roll in days over highways that once were trails to scout on horseback or a

wagon took months to travel. Airplanes soar across the continent in hours in a single hop. The ways-in which American families live have changed as swiftly as the ways in which they travel.

Within the lifetime of people still living, the frontier has all but vanished. Change is so obvious that we are likely to take it for granted. It has come so quickly that it is hard to realize what it meant to us who live today.

Remember the deadline for these forms is December 1, 1952, but if it is at all possible come in this week or the early part of next week.

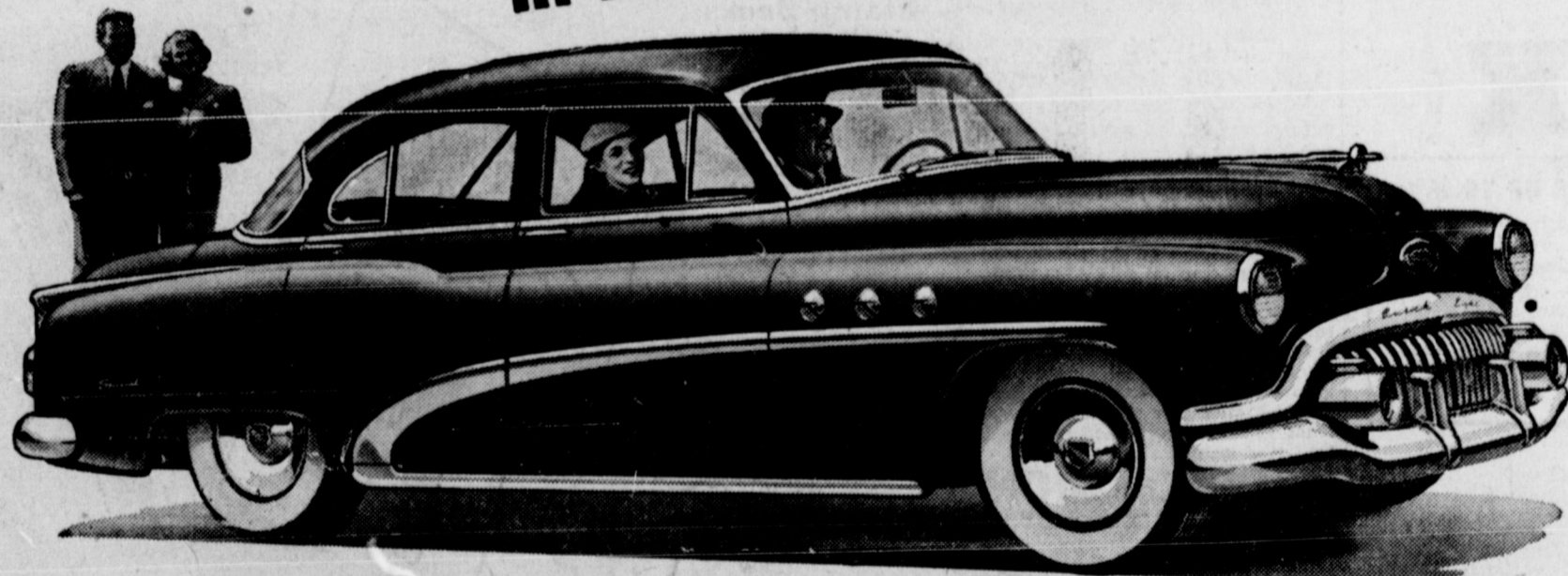

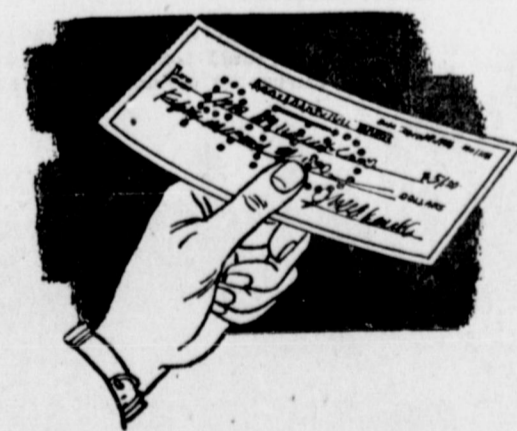

#### THE JOB AHEAD IN MY SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT

Many thousand acres of native and introduced varieties of pasture grasses and legumes have been seeded in my District. Many of our abandoned farms have been re-seeded to grass and are now producing more beef per acre than native range.

The assistance given by my District in revegetation has in my

opinion been the greatest benefit of any offered. Reseeding land to grass was almost unheard of before my District began operation. Using the land according to its capability and treating it according to its needs was my District's objective at the start. Now this is the objective of the Department of Agriculture.

To meet this objective, one of our major jobs ahead is to get back to grass all of our land now in cultivation which cannot be farmed safely.

Many farmers are realizing the importance of stock and dairy farming—for a man with a cow herd is never broke.

Another measure being carried out in our District is the spraying

of mesquite to improve native pasture grasses. Some work has been done to eradicate sage brush, too. These practices have been quite successful on the larger ranches in our area. Our grassland goal for 1953 is "Two Blades of Grass Instead of One."

Of the Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse—War, Famine, Pestilence and Death—who have ridden roughshod over humanity since the beginning of time, the most dreaded and feared is undoubtedly Famine.

Here in our land of plenty it has been hard to realize that hunger and want are still man's daily companions on vast areas of the globe.

Today we are faced with the task of not only feeding adequately an ever increasing population at home, but furnishing large quantities of food to other nations.

The world is currently adding to its population at the rate of 60,000 to 70,000 a day and the rate is increasing.

The first generation did well on our fertile soil, the next generations have been able to get by. But what about these coming generations.

Our job ahead is to see that the dreaded Famine does not make himself known in their lives.

We must all become more conscious of soil fertility day by day. We must talk soil conservation with our friends and neighbors to get them to realize that good soil means abundant living. Poor soil means poor living.

Much can be done by teaching conservation in our schools. This may be one of the fastest ways of promoting our job ahead, as these boys and girls are our land owners of tomorrow. Much will depend on how they care for the soil.

Statistics can be dull, but the most recent figures from the Soil Conservation Service show that there is an increase of 7 percent in soil and water practices carried out on land by district co-operators in the past fiscal year. We must look to these services for aid and guidance, as their technical advice and help is so valuable to us in our effort to improve the fertility and productivity of our farms.

We must promote our conservation programs and make every farmer so soil conscious that he will go ahead with conservation regardless of payment programs.

We must tell the world how conservation pays through radio talks, movies, and magazines. The recent publication, "Soil and Water," is doing much to make people conscious of our job ahead.

"One generation passeth away, and another generation cometh; but earth abideth forever." Ecclesiastes, 1:4.

Most soil, now unproductive, can be made useful by proper and intelligent management. Whether we own our land or not, we are dependent on the soil for everything we have.

Each of us has a vital concern in maintaining its productivity.

I look to the future with utmost confidence in the task ahead for my District. A grass roots organi-

zation such as ours, completely independent, democratic in principle, locally operated and controlled, is no doubt the key to our success.

With a medium whereby farmers, government, industry, business, and education can work together as a team, I have no fear that the job can be done and we can hand on to posterity the same glorious heritage which we enjoy today!

### Health Notes

**AUSTIN**—Studies show that most people have two or more colds a year, each lasting about two weeks and causing a considerable amount of stuffy discomfort, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Fortunately, many of the respiratory diseases are not as dangerous as they used to be. Modern infection-fighting drugs, such as penicillin and the sulfa drugs, offer highly effective treatment for

many cases. But, of course, it is always better to prevent a serious illness whenever possible.
