FROM CONVERSATION we have heard around town, we were not the only ones pleasantly surprised by the polished performance last Friday night by the Baird High School stage band.

Perhaps we were being unfair to the band, but we definitely expected far less than we heard, because of the group's newness and inexperience. And apparently others shared these feelings.

Instead, we heard music in which the school — and the entire town — can rightfully take pride. And it gave rise to some high hopes for the stage band after a couple of years to develop experienced members.

This week the stage band will be at the annual festival at Brownwood, one of the best of its kind anywhere. The Baird band probably won't win any top awards in its first try — that's asking just too much — but the benefits will be many for the members.

We hope we, and Baird, can have another opportunity to hear more of this new stage band soon.

A COUPLE OF BAIRD businessmen were discussing a mutual friend the other day. And the friend must have been a little overweight.

"Did he really get on his diet and stick to it?" said one.

"He certainly did," replied the other. "And he said it was the most miserable four hours he ever spent in his life."

IN THE RUSH of reporting what all went on Friday night at the Baird Chamber of Commerce banquet, one thing the speaker said which struck us as significant has been generally overlooked.

He suggested each person ask "what kind of community would this be if everyone did as I do?"

This is a trite old phrase which, nevertheless, is the key to a progressive town. The attitude of the individual on the street can have far-reaching effect in shaping the future of a community.

We become convinced of this a few years ago when it was our privilege to accompany a group of men from Seury County on a tour to learn how to make their area more attractive to outsiders.

Goal of the trip was Rome, a bustling, progressive town in northern Georgia. Everyone you met there had something to say about how good business was, or what a wonderful place to live Rome was. It didn't take long for the visitors to begin believing.

And the town was soaring. Newcomers were impressed with the community spirit and were deciding to stay.

ON THAT SAME trip we stopped in another town, this one in Louisiana.

There the man on the street was grumbling about business, or was griping about something else. The town was actually losing its business and population. These two contrasts convinced us that the attitude of the man on the street has a great deal to do with a town's future.

Here, early in 1964, is as good a time as any for everyone to ask, "What kind of community would this be if everyone did as I do?"

## TB Skin Tests Due in Schools

A skin testing program is being conducted in Callahan County public schools by the Callahan County Tuberculosis Assn. Tests are being administered in alternate grades by Mrs. Eulala Ault, school nurse.

Students who show a positive reaction, and their families, will be X-rayed to determine whether or not any member might have active tuberculosis.

Last year two students in the county showed possible tuberculosis. Both families were put under medication and the members of one family still undergo regular X-rays.

There was no active tuberculosis found in school children from either family, however.

The program began last week in Cross Plains. Tests were given Feb. 17 to Eula students and on Feb. 24 Baird schools will be tested. The schedule calls for tests at Putnam March 2, with the program winding up March 9 in Clyde schools.

# Baird and Rock Springs Girls Tangle in Winters Next Week

Rock Springs High School will provide the opposition next Thursday night (Feb. 27) when the Baird High School girls basketball team tackles its third tune-up game in preparation for bi-district action.

The game will begin at 8 p.m. in the Winters High School gymnasium.

The title will follow two practice games against Wylie High School this week. The second of the two was to be played in Baird Thursday night. Originally the game was scheduled for Friday night, but was moved up a night to enable Coach L. B. Howard to attend a playoff game between Goldthwaite and Copperas Cove.

The playoff game, set Friday night in Lampasas, will determine Baird's bi-district opponent. Details of the bi-district game will be worked out following the Goldthwaite-Copperas Cove title by Howard and the winning coach.

Goldthwaite and Copperas Cove tied for district championship honors to force the playoff.

Baird's girls won their 31st game of the season Tuesday night in Wylie, setting the stage for the return match Thursday night. But the Callahan County sextet had to overcome a Wylie stall and a late Wylie lead for the victory, 43-40.

The entire first half of the game was tight, with Baird holding a thin 14-13 lead as the first quarter ended and an equally shaky 35-34 margin at halftime.

In the second half Wylie went into its stall, holding Baird to a single point, on a free throw by Paula Corn, while scoring four points for a 38-36 advantage.

Keeping up the stall, Wylie was ahead by 40-38 with four minutes to go before Baird managed to fashion a 40-40 tie. Wylie lost the ball before it could score on that possession, and Miss Corn looped in a field goal with 1:15 left to give her team a 42-40 bulge.

Karen Bearden added a free

throw with seconds to play for the final margin of victory.

Miss Corn meshed 28 points for the evening and Miss Bearden collected 12. Elaine Hass had three points. Kathleen Long was high for Wylie, notching 22 points.

In an earlier game, Wylie's B team thrashed the Baird B team, 52-19. Wylie roared to a 13-9 lead after a quarter, made it 23-14 by halftime, and had a comfortable 37-18 edge going into the final period.

Peggy Gordon led the Baird attack with 11 points, Joyce Howard had four and Shirley Simmons and Maggie Westbrook had two points each. Lynn Lockley paced Wylie with 28.

## Firemen Answer Two Baird Calls

Baird Volunteer Firemen answered two calls in rapid succession Wednesday morning, with neither blaze producing major damage.

The first, about 9 a.m., was to a trash fire just off Highway 20 east of the Callahan County courthouse. A fence was slightly damaged.

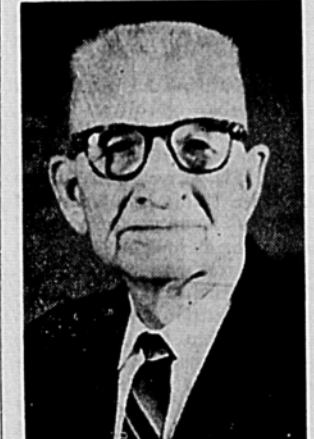
Services will be at 10 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. Leonard Payne, church music director, will be in charge of music for the revival.

## Evans Issues Statement in District Race

Roger Q. Evans, Baird businessman and veterans' activities leader, Wednesday issued a formal statement concerning his candidacy for the 63rd District state representative post now held by Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge.

The statement said: "After careful consideration of the economic problems facing many of the citizens of the 63rd District, composed of Callahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Stephens and Shackelford counties, I have come to the conclusion that there should be a long-range, well-planned and well-executed agriculture and livestock program backed by an industrial research program.

"Self-employment should be made available to unemployed men and women, regardless of age, if they have the knowhow and are able to work toward helping sustain themselves. Otherwise, the tax dollar must be used to meet this growing problem of carrying for needy citizens or it will become the responsibility of local charities.

"The federal census, in its 1960 report, confirms that a large percentage of the population in most of this five-county district has an increasingly sub-standard income which is inadequate to provide even the necessities of life.

"When we reduce buying power, we reduce the profits of business and in time may close the doors of those businesses. Too much of this has already happened in our small towns and cities.

"A thorough understanding of balancing our spending against our income will add much toward stabilizing our economy and removing the pressure of new taxes.

"It is the responsibility of our legislators to offer their assistance.

## 17 County Residents Get Free Receipts

Only 17 Callahan County residents who did not pay their poll tax this year have secured the free poll tax receipts which entitle them to vote in national elections, according to Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell.

Persons who paid their poll tax before the deadline are eligible to vote in all elections. The free certificates entitle voters to a ballot only on national matters, for which the poll tax has been abolished.

# C-C Speaker Outlines Future Possibilities For This Area

An imaginative look at the Baird of the future was given some 200 persons attending the annual banquet of the Baird Chamber of Commerce Friday night by R. L. McMillon, Abilene insurance executive and principal speaker for the event.

Basing his thoughts on a bright future for the Abilene complex — which includes Baird, Clyde, Buffalo Gap, Tuscola, Lawn, Anson, Merkel and Tye — McMillon pictured Baird as a future residential center for the well-to-do of the area.

He also labeled Baird as an ideal area for the increasingly popular senior citizens center because of its natural assets.

"Baird, Clyde and Buffalo Gap have natural assets none of the other cities in the complex do," he said in explaining his rea-

sons for projecting the towns as natural gathering places for persons of above average income.

He pointed out that Baird's topography lends itself to imposing landscaping which appeals to builders of more expensive homes. "Those who can afford it find it highly desirable to build home in an unusual setting," he said. "This land is good for it."

After detailing what the future can hold for the Baird area, McMillon urged formation of a "dream" committee to outline future plans. He said the committee should use boldness and imagination in its planning but should not burden itself with details.

"Details would spoil such a committee," he said. "Leave the details to others."

McMillon was introduced by James Paul Shanks, who was master of ceremonies for the banquet.

Chamber officers for the new year formally took over their duties with the banquet. They are Raymond Young, president; Howard Farmer, vice president and Charles Walker, secretary-treasurer. Young, who was unable to attend because of illness, began his second term as president.

A highlight of the banquet was an appearance of the fledgling Baird High School stage band. The band, in one of its first public performances, scored high with the audience.

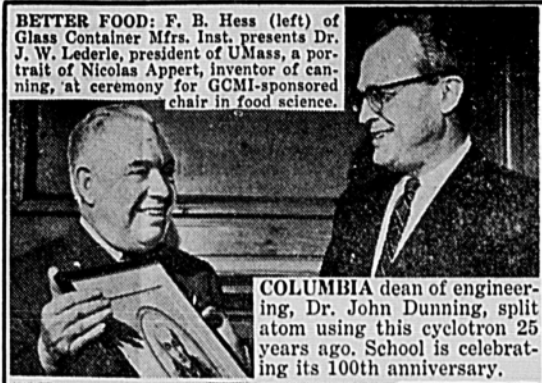

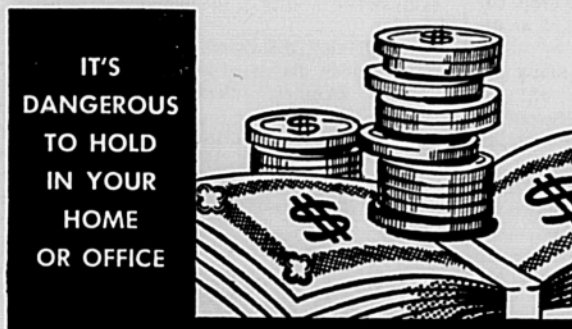

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## Callahan County ASC Committee Urges Feed Grain Participation

Growers who participate in the 1964 feed grain program will have definite advantages over growers who elect not to participate, according to Tommie Harris, Callahan County ASCS committee chairman.

First, he explained, the participating grower earns a diversion payment for reducing his 1964 acreage of corn, barley, or grain sorghum, thereby assuring himself of a substantial income from the diverted acres regardless of drought, flood, insects, hail or crop disease.

This is also true of the price support payment which is made on the acreage planted in 1964 to one or more of the three feed grains — no matter what disposition is made of the crop, the price support payment is assured.

Third, price support loans and purchase agreements will be available on a participating farmer's entire 1964 production of the three feed grains.

If the participating farmer requests it, an advance payment of part of the diversion payment will be made at the time of signing up or as soon as possible after that time.

Growers take part in the feed grain program by diverting at least 20 per cent of the farm's feed grain base acreage into an approved conserving use and carrying out other provisions of the program. If more than the minimum acreage is diverted, a higher rate of payment will apply.

The minimum rate of payment is based on one-fifth of the county's total price support rate. The maximum or higher rate is based on one-half of the support rate.

Farm operators may file applications to take part in the 1964 feed grain program at the ASCS County Office. The sign-up period extends from Feb. 10 through March 27.

ance in research to bring about a program to remove poverty without new taxes. "Your state representatives have voted themselves a year-round salary of about \$100 a week and they are in session only four or five months every two years, giving them a stay-at-home salary of about \$8,000 during a two-year term, or about \$400 per month to represent their district.

"Your tax dollar pays this bill. If they are to be paid this salary they should be well versed in the diversified problems of the rights of human beings, and should have an understanding of our government. They should have available time and knowledge to work on research, and to hold conferences with chambers of commerce and other agencies in developing a better economy and more enterprise for their district.

"In placing my candidacy for state representative for the 63rd District before you, I do so with the full knowledge of the grave responsibility the office carries to those who serve. And I pledge I will serve to the best of my abilities.

"Therefore I am placing my candidacy as a Democrat, subject to the choice of the voters in the May 2 primary, before you.

"In presenting my experiences and qualifications, I do not propose in this brief announcement to spell out how this phase of the program to strengthen our economy can be carried out. But I would like to share my ideas in meetings with city, county and government agencies, with chambers of commerce, veterans and aging groups, agricultural and livestock groups, commissioners courts on rural roads, highway engineers on highway problems, school superintendents and teachers on developing an education system of which Texas can be proud, and others such as oil development and other groups which may blend into a five-county development program to strengthen our economy and conserve tax dollars.

"I have had experience as a school teacher, as Callahan County's first agricultural agent, and as a rehabilitation supervisor in reclaiming bankrupt farmers into assets to the community.

"With eight years experience in the Texas Legislature, serving an agricultural and industrial area, I have a knowledge of basic problems of our citizens and well know the need of conserving the tax dollar without retarding services and benefits that are justified.

"Being a veteran (of World War I) and a consultant on veterans' and aging citizens' problems, I feel I understand both their needs and their deficiencies in income and, with cooperation, that I can develop a program that will solve some of their financial problems. I feel the contacts I have with Congress and various federal agencies gives me an advantage in this field.

## Cotton Farmers Must Take Action Or Have Allotments Trimmed Down

Callahan County ASCS office has been informed by H. D. Godfrey of the ASCS in Washington, D. C. that the recommended amendment to the cotton bill as proposed by a producers committee to provide a domestic allotment choice program would not interfere with the operation of the release and reapportionment cotton program.

Godfrey also said it would be unnecessary to give further consideration to an acreage diversion plan for the 1964 crop.

The producers committee has proposed, for crops of 1964 through 1967, a voluntary domestic acreage allotment within the present national acreage allotment. The domestic acreage allotment would reflect estimated domestic consumption and would be about two-thirds of effective farm allotments established under current legislation H.R. 6196.

Producers who chose to plant within the domestic allotment would receive a higher rate of price support not in excess of 15 per cent above the basic support rate on normal production of the acreage planted to cotton. The higher supports would be effected through the use of accumulated CCC stocks.

Producers who plant on the basis of a domestic allotment would maintain their farm acreage history as under present law. To protect the income of small producers, the domestic allotment for small cotton farms would be established as the smaller of 10 acres or the basic allotment.

Small producers would receive the higher support without a reduction in acres.

There has been some confusion and misunderstanding about the 1964 cotton program. The fact still remains that a cotton producer must either plant, release, have protection of allotment history under the CR or GPC program, or a combination of the above, equal to at least 75 per cent of his effective cotton allotment to insure full history protection. In other words, farmers must either release, plant, or have history protection equal to 75 per cent of your effective allotment or next
