## **Marketing Quota** Election Dec. 15

Cotton producers will vote in a marketing quota referendum Dec. 15, to determine if marketing quotas and acreage allotments will be in effect for

A "yes" vote by at least twothirds of the growers voting will mean that price support of from 65 to 90 per cent of parity will be available to producers allotments.

In addition to this, price support payments will be available to growers who voluntarily reduce their acreage to be within their farm's domestic cotton alotment. A farm's domestic cotton allotment will be 65 per cent of the 1965 effective farm allotment or (for small farms) the smaller of 15 acres or the 1965 effective allotment.

A "no" vote will mean cotton producers can grow all the cotton they so desire at whatever price they can obtain and there will be no domestic allotment program.



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


