Proposed Reservoir
A Fallacy.

Mr. Editor.—There is a fable not as old perhaps as "Aesop's," but just as fabulous, "that a sharp eyed practical cat, seeing what he took to be the conclusion of a rat protruding from a hole, crept upon it and when near enough made the spring and caught a snake by the tail instead of a rat, and the snake tarred upon it and bit it in the neck and it died." Moral: "It is a dangerous thing to jump at a conclusion."
When our city concluded to put in water works, the aldermen did the right thing, they employed a civil engineer, who got them up their plans and specifications, but when the work was let and was being performed they did the wrong thing by not still keeping their engineer to see that the work was performed according to the plans and specifications, but instead of that some sharp eyed, practical alderman saw a rat's tail and proceeded to jump at it and inadvertently caught a snake, and the town instead of him "caught it in the neck." The pipe line as surveyed by the engineer was composed of mathematical straight lines and curves, and I am informed that the line was permitted to be swung to and fro, by the contractor according to his wits will, to avoid rock excavation or anything else. The grade line of the pipe was laid by the engineer to throw out all avoidable humps. I am

informed that in digging the ditch for that line, if they struck rock, instead of taking it out, the pipe was laid over it, causing a hump for the collection of air. Some one permitted these changes, some one jumped at the conclusion that it made no difference, caught a snake by the tail and the town "caught it in the neck." From a scientific view, it is just as feasible to make elbows in a rail-road track as in a water main, and more feasible to make humps in the form than that of later, yet it is done regardless of consequences. The plan of our water works contemplated the pipe entering the bottom of the well, the contract was signed to put it there, yet some sharp eyed, practical alderman saw a rat's tail jumped at it, caught a snake and the town again "got it in the neck," by him concluding that the water would run out of the top of the well as free as it would from the bottom, permitted the contractor to put the pipe in there. I understand that there is another big "rat tail" in sight and that a majority of the aldermen have crept up to it, and have concluded and in fact have made the spring by concluding, and ordering that the kind be put at the head of bed of the well be as they are going to catch a snake. If we have anything at all to do with the merit of our system, if it is the head of pressure, we have a natural head of two hundred feet as shown by the profile. Cut that off and you have de-capitalized the system, and like the cat,

such a false conclusion, will end in practical defeat. By no argument or reason can such a conclusion be justified. It means an entire destruction of a fire department, or the purchase of a fire engine, it means the waston waste of natural advantages, that other cities would give thousands of dollars to have. They offer as a demny justification to the act, "that the city cannot control a reservoir outside of its limits." If she owns it she can. Dallas to-day is building one a long way from her limits and I dare say she proposes to discuss it.
In this article I do not propose to discuss what should be done, but what should not be done. It will take a stand pipe one hundred and fifty feet high set at the head of St Street and it kept full all the time to give as the pressure we now have. Do they propose to put one there that high? If not where is the benefit from the stand pipe or reservoir? It cannot possibly increase the supply of water as we get all the water one that the pipes afford. They cannot increase the pressure by

taking the water from the main, unless they cut off the stand pipe and that puts us exactly where we are now, so where is the benefit to come in? I venture the prediction that if this Council puts it in, their successors in office will take it out, and the city will be the loser of so much money. "It is a dangerous thing to jump at conclusions."
While standing on the banks of the Colorado river and viewing the magnificent ruins of Austin's famous or infamous dam, my attention was drawn to about two-thirds of the dam which stands intact on the Southern side. "There," says my informant, "where that wall stops is where the engineer is charged was discharged." After getting the best plans and specifications that engineering science could devise and starting the work in charge of an engineer as it should be done, the Hon. Mayor thought he saw a "rat tail" and concluded that his own could supervise the building as well as an engineer, discharged the engineer and put in his son, and where the son was in the dam went out and Austin today is mourning the loss as a result

of such a jumped at conclusion. There was a time when the experienced eye of the practical puddler was relied upon to seal when the carbon was consumed from the cast iron and the molten mass was wrought iron, of a variable texture, but now science has produced the spectroscopic, which, unerringly tells the point and gives the uniform mass. There was a time when the Virginia plaster relied upon the skilled eye of his negro foreman as to when his tobacco was properly "dried"; now science has discovered the proper temperature and the thermometer does the rest. There was a time when the practical man ran his furrows for the water to follow raising a little here and lowering a little there, but that time is now passed. The exact science of hydraulics is in the saddle based upon the infallible laws of nature, prescribing as to what you shall do here, and what you shall not do there, so as to avail yourself of your advantages and any deviation from these laws are but jumping at conclusions.
Practice as far as it goes is all right, but at this age and time practice with out theory is as a closed book. Theory is the understanding of all laws, practice is simply the application of them, and conclusions adopted in practice without understanding the theory, are sometimes very dangerous.

LOUISIANA RACE RIOT

One White Man and Nine Negroes Killed at Balltown. MORE BELIEVED DEAD

Many of the Negroes Who Ran into the Swamp Escaped in a Driving Gale.—The Troops Over and Quiet Restored.

Balltown, La., Oct. 30.—The race war between the blacks and whites which started at a negro camp meeting at Duncan's Chapel Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock, has left a carnival of blood up the Pearl river valley, unequalled in the history of that country.

One white man is dead, another is dying with a bullet wound in his stomach and a third white man is badly wounded.

Negroes were killed in the bloody affray—five men, three women and one small child. A dozen or perhaps more negroes escaped to the woods and swamps with wounds that are believed to be certain death.

No one is able to estimate the number of wounded. They were encamped around the church, in tents and in hastily constructed shanties around the place. It was to continue rain today. There was no fighting left and had service in the chapel.

The trouble came from the burning of the Negro church at Balltown. It was led by Mrs. Ball. There was some trouble over a restaurant license and Cross Lot, because the center of attention. There were some trouble started by a white man who had no blood.

The blacks fled from the trail, wooden church, for it was no shelter from the rain bullets. Let them be shot and shooting and fighting. A torrent of lead was sent whizzing through the rafters and through the church, while most of the negroes fled.

The negroes around Lot's place kept up a steady pour of shot. It was dead and blood, and the wounded and dying were on every side. Lot's old mother-in-law, two daughters and a grandchild lay in a heap inside the shelter. Sophia Lot saved her life by crawling herself behind the door. Lot was killed during the fusillade.

For 24 hours it looked like a general struggle to wipe out the blacks in Washington parish. The news spread like wild fire, and all Monday over 1000 negroes men had gathered in a battle. They came by miles and miles, some from as far as Monticello.

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How Trouble Near Caldwell. Caldwell, Tex., Oct. 30.—Over a fight between a white man and a negro near Caldwell, Tex., Oct. 29 occurred. While no one was injured the state of affairs today were very serious. The trouble was precipitated by a white man and a negro to surrender to militia.

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"CAN BE REFINED."

Assassins Executed. Pays the Death Penalty for Murder of President McKinley. NO FEAR DISPLAYED.

He Denied to Let His Head Be Put on a Forked Pitcher.—For Which He Suffered the Extreme Penalty of Law.

Auburn, Oct. 30.—Leon Colquhoun, the murderer of President McKinley, paid the extreme penalty exacted by the law for his crime at 11 1/2 yesterday morning. He was executed by death by 1900 volts of electricity. He was given three contacts of electricity before he was finally pronounced dead. He went to the chair in exactly the same manner as have the majority of the murderers in this state, showing no particular sign of fear but in fact, doing most of the talk.

From the time Colquhoun had left the cell until the full penalty was paid, he spent five minutes talking to the physicians and a head nurse and other staff to determine if any life remained, and at 7 1/2 the warden raised the chair and the "hot lead" fell through the half-adjusted face straps, he said.

"I killed the president because he was an enemy of good people, of good working people. I am not sorry for any part of my life," he said. "I would not go through the half-adjusted face straps, he said."

When Warden Mackey gave the signal to turn on the current, the current was turned off the last left at 7:15. HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Mix stove blacking with a little ammonia to prevent it turning off. A stank should never be allowed to stand on the side of the fire with a small quantity of water in it.

A rose poultice is made by packing the rose petals in a cloth, and keeping them covered for six months.

For ink stains on furniture add six drops of oil to a teaspoonful of water and apply to the stain with a feather. If the stain does not yield to the ink, it may be made it stronger and repeat the process.

Stains on silverware require prompt attention. To remove them, mix a little turpentine with a little water to remove them. Sulphuric acid will remove the stain left by medicine. Rub the acid on the stain, and repeat the process until the stain has disappeared; then wash in very hot water.

Diluting Tea.

Few housekeepers remember, as they should, that when tea is brewed to dilute strong tea it should be done with water at the boiling point. The poorer flavor of the tea, the more water is then reduced, such as is too often served at receptions and "at home," is entirely caused by the water being hot, not boiling, water to the first infusion. A lesson in this matter may be had from the kitchen of a first-class restaurant, where it is the custom to put the strength, while with water kept boiling in the same receptacle, but is renewed as needed. Freshly distilled water is insisted upon by all connoisseurs in tea-making.

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
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EAGLE COVE CULLINIS.
