

Professional athletes in big hats and high-heeled boots will gather here this week end to play at America's most rugged and highly competitive sport. They will pay their own expens-es to get here, and will then lay down a fee to enter the contests of the Callahan Co. Sheriff's Posse Rodeo which opens May 5 and runs through May 7. In the arena these rodeo hands will be matching their own skill and courage against that of other cowboys and at the same time against rank rodeo livestock, furnished by Bob Estes of Bolic of Baird.

The rodeo here is in the sport's big league, one of some 500 approved each year by the Rodeo Cowboys Association, With contests held under national R. C. A. rules, the local rodeo will be open to the entry of top professional rodeo contestants in the United States and Canada. They will battle in the contest events for a purse of \$1,500, which will probably be doubled by their own entry fees. Money won here in the con-tests will be credited to the world championship standings. World titles in the cowboy sport are decided by the simple mea-sure of who wins the most mo-






Former Clyde Man **Dies In Abilene**

The unappetizing spectre of a general sales tax was hovering over the heads of a generally unawakened or uncaring Texas citizenship this week as one major candidate actually based his campaign on a program calling for a three year "broad-based tax" to ease the state's troubles

Last week the East Texas Chamber of Commerce, which certainly ought to know bet-ter, came within a gnat's hair of endorsing a sales tax. Only a strong speech by the Governor, who attending the convention, prevented the amazing action

Big business, of course, is not so opposed to a sales tax as it is a personal income tax. Labor unions, which are becoming more and more powerful in Texas, favor the personal income tax, which is a progressive thing and hits the higher income people harder than the lower paid groups, which comprise labor. Gov-ernor Daniel believes that neither tax is desir-able or necessary yet, that natural resources and other selective taxes can be made to pay and other selective taxes can be made to pay the way.

Thirty-four states now have a sales tax, thirty-one have a tax on individuals' income. Half of the states using the sales tax are getting three per cent or better. That would mean that the family living off an income of \$3,000 a year would probably pay around \$100 a year extra state taxes, just about what that same family

Merchants, and especially the small trades-man who must do his own bookkeeping, is the one who really has it tougher under the sales tax. He must keep a record of all his sales and fork up the three per cent at regular intervals. The cost of the accounting is terrific, and many firms find themselves getting into hot water with the state simply through negligence.

Families or persons living off a fixed in-come, such as old folks on pensions or social security, are the hardest hit. They have no way to increase their earnings, yet must pay an ex-tra three per cent on everything they buy, from the rent to their bread.


There is a terrific lobby, armed with every legal trick and endowed with millions of dol-lars, that sits with the state legislators and urges them onward toward the goal of getting a "broad-based bill" actually on the books. But for the fighting spirit of Governor Price Daniel this lobby would have succeeded last year. Only he can prevent it this coming session and he can't win without the militant support of citi-zen groups throughout the state. zen groups throughout the state.

Texas is not yet ready to accept this mean tax on people least able to pay. Let's not give an inch.
