An Ordinance fixing and determining the general service rate to be charged for sales of natural gas and natural gas service to residential and commercial consumers within the city

limits of Baird, Callahan County, Texas providing for the manner in which such rate may be changed, adjusted and amended and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAIRD:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered on or after the 1st day of May, 1960, the general service rate for sales of natural gas and natural gas service rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Baird by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

Minimum Monthly Bill \$1.00
First 60 Cu. Ft. @ \$.1760 per CCF gross; \$.1584 per CCF net.
All over 600 Cu. Ft. @ \$.8433 per MCF gross; \$.7590 per MCF net.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.

This ordinance does not regulate any rate or charge except those specifically set out hereinabove.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. The fact that there is an imperative public need for an immediate change and adjustment in the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the mayor.

T. J. Hollingshead, 87, of Abilene, died at Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Monday, May 25.

Mr. Hollingshead had been in ill health for the past three years, and had been confined to his bed for the past 5 months.

Born June 14, 1872 at Amity, Arkansas, he was married to Nora Howell Nov. 29, 1891 in Arkansas.

Clyde until he moved to Abilene in 1924. A truck and fruit farmer, he operated one of the largest apple orchards in this area. He was a former member of the Clyde school board and of the Clyde Fruit Growers Association. 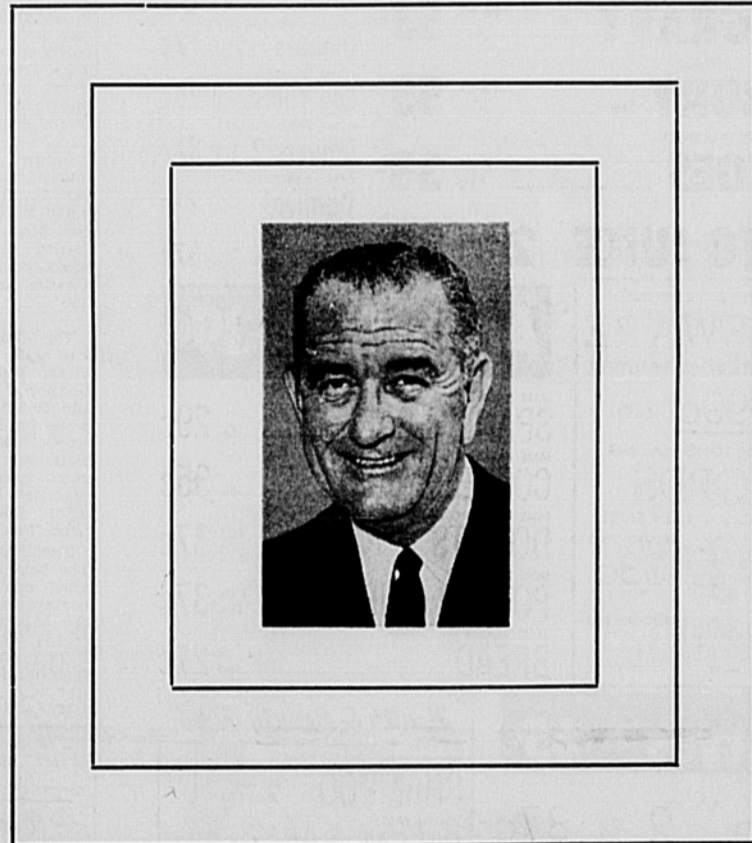

IT'S THE LAW In Texas . . .

WHAT IS LAW?
While getting ready to ob-
serve LAW DAY USA on May 1,
perhaps we should ask ourselves
the question -- "What is law?"
The English language uses one
word "law" to express two dis-
tinct ideas I found. In many
foreign languages these two
meanings are expressed by two
different words. When we speak
of the "rule of law", we are
thinking of the whole body of
law, under which we live togeth-
er in a civilized society.

In Latin the word law in its
broad concept is "jus", but for
a specific statute it is "lex",
from which our word "law" is
derived. In French it is "droit"
and "loi"; in Spanish, "derecho"
and "ley".

The French word for law is
identical with the word for right.
This is not a coincidence. The
whole purpose of the law is to
define and enforce our rights.
We are forbidden to speed on
the highway so that others may
enjoy their right to travel the
same road in safety. Laws speci-
fying how wills and deeds shall
be made have been adopted for
the benefit of the people.

Our rights are in three broad
groups. First, specific legal
rights; thousands of these have
been established through the
years as the law strives to keep
itself responsive to the chang-
ing needs of the people it ser-
ves.

Second, fundamental rights
such as the right to vote, to
bear arms and to participate in
government.

And third, there are "basis
rights" so basic that they be-
long to all men everywhere. Call
them God-given rights, if you
will -- rights guaranteed under

law and named in the Declara-
tion of Independence -- Life,
liberty and the pursuit of hap-
piness.

Law guarantees us freedom,
peace and progress, ideals which
are, and always have been, de-
pendent upon the adequacy of
our legal system and the pro-
tection awarded the individual
by our courts.

LAW DAY USA is the Amer-
ican way; it is America's answer
to communism.

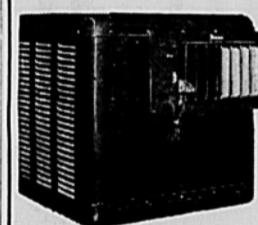

As It Looks From Here...

Research has this information on Presidents. The youngest

President was Theodore Roosevelt, age 42 and 10 months when inaugurated. The youngest candidate was William Jennings Bryan, age 36 when nominated to oppose William McKinley in 1896. The oldest President to be inaugurated was William Henry Harrison at the age of 68 years and 23 days. The oldest President at leaving office was Andrew Jackson who was 2 days short of 70. President Eisenhower will break this record when he leaves office January 20 next year, at the age of 70 years and 98 days.

Of the 32 Presidents prior to President Eisenhower, 9 were Episcopalians; 7 were Presbyterians; 4 were Unitarians; 3, Methodist; 2, Baptist; 2 were members of the Dutch Reformed Church. Coolidge was a Congregationalist; Garfield, Disciples of Christ; Hoover, Quaker. Three Presidents - Jefferson, Lincoln and Johnson - were of no specific denomination. Only one Catholic - Alfred E. Smith - has received the nomination.

Seven Presidents were residents of New York; 6 of Ohio; 5, Virginia; 3, Massachusetts; 3, Tennessee; 2, Illinois; and 1 each of California, Indiana, Louisiana, Missouri, New Hampshire, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

Several Presidents - 13 in fact - have been elected without receiving a majority of the popular votes. These include Abraham Lincoln, Woodrow Wilson, and Harry S. Truman.

Twenty-four Presidents were lawyers and 5 were professional soldiers.

George Washington, who is said to have been the wealthiest man in the country in his time, left an estate valued at \$530,000. F.D.R. left the largest estate - \$1,085,500. The financial conditions of President Eisenhower and former Presidents Hoover and Truman are not matters of public record. According to rumor, however, Mr. Hoover was a millionaire before taking office. Mr. Truman has made a million since leaving office, and Mr. Eisenhower is the first to become a millionaire while in office.

Only one man has been elected while serving in the Senate - Warren G. Harding (R.-Ohio), elected in 1920. Only one, James A. Garfield, has been elected while a member of the House. John Quincy Adams was the only President to serve in the House after his term of office.

The longest nominating Convention was the Democratic convention of 1924, which lasted 14 days. It took 103 ballots to select a candidate - John W. Davis.

In the first Presidential elec-

tion and in the next three thereafter, no distinction was made between votes for President and Vice President. The person receiving the highest electoral vote became President, and the second highest became Vice President.

The first American political parties formed with the election of 1796. Adams was the Federalist candidate and Jefferson the Anti-Federalist candidate. The Republican party today evolved from the Federalist party, and the Democratic party from the Anti-Federalists.

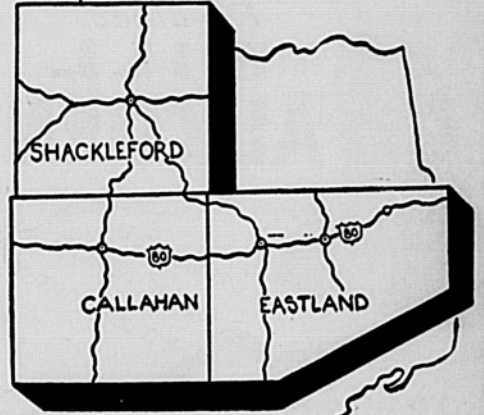

Texas Drops In Trained Teachers

In five years Texas has dropped from second to fifth place in the percentage of college trained teachers in its elementary schools, latest national rankings show.

Oklahoma now leads the nation with 99.6 of its elementary teachers having four or more years of college. Arizona, Florida and New Mexico also lead Texas, which is fifth with 95.6 per cent.

Both the border states of Oklahoma and New Mexico, as well as Arizona, have higher average teacher salaries than Texas.

In 1953-54 Texas was in second place. At that time, Arizona was first and Oklahoma was down in seventh position.

By 1958-59, the latest figures available, Oklahoma vaulted to first place on the strength of higher requirements and better salaries. Only 80 of Oklahoma's 21,400 teachers do not have at least a bachelor's degree.

In Texas, records of the Texas Education Agency reveal that 1,772 out of the 82,088 total public school personnel did not have a college diploma in 1958-59. The majority of those were in the grades one through eight, where 1,509 teachers out of 49,828 failed to have degrees.

National rankings deal only with elementary teachers and with those having four or more years of college preparation, irrespective of degrees.

National Writers Favor Johnson

"I doubt if in the history of our government we ever have had a man so capable, able and efficient as Lyndon Johnson."

The speaker of those words probably comes as close to qualifying as an authority as anyone passibly can. He is Reiman (Pat) Morin, top foreign correspondent and former chief of bureau at the Nation's capital for Associated Press. He spoke at a recent meeting of the Panhandle Press Association.

In a recent interview in a Washington newspaper, another noted author and columnist, Dorothy Thompson, had this to say:

"From what I know, Lyndon Johnson has been the greatest Senate leader in the history of the United States. I don't know what kind of a president he would make, but friend in the Senate, who is not of the same party, tells me that he does everything from a long view. That's an asset. And he has an incredible gift of harmonizing people."

Miss Thompson is rarely wrong in sizing up prominent personalities. This estimation of Texas' own Lyndon Johnson will do her record no harm.

AN EDITORIAL

NOT READY TO SURRENDER

The unappetizing spectre of a general sales tax was hovering over the heads of a generally unawakened or uncaring Texas citizenship this week as one major candidate actually based his campaign on a program calling for a three year "broad-based tax" to ease the state's troubles.

Last week the East Texas Chamber of Commerce, which certainly ought to know better, came within a gnat's hair of endorsing a sales tax. Only a strong speech by the Governor, who attending the convention, prevented the amazing action.

Big business, of course, is not so opposed to a sales tax as it is a personal income tax. Labor unions, which are becoming more and more powerful in Texas, favor the personal income tax, which is a progressive thing and hits the higher income people harder than the lower paid groups, which comprise labor. Governor Daniel believes that neither tax is desirable or necessary yet, that natural resources and other selective taxes can be made to pay the way.

Thirty-four states now have a sales tax, thirty-one have a tax on individuals' income. Half of the states using the sales tax are getting three per cent or better. That would mean that the family living off an income of \$3,000 a year would probably pay around \$100 a year extra state taxes, just about what that same family would pay in county, city and school taxes on their small home.

Merchants, and especially the small tradesman who must do his own bookkeeping, is the one who really has it tougher under the sales tax. He must keep a record of all his sales and fork up the three per cent at regular intervals. The cost of the accounting is terrific, and many firms find themselves getting into hot water with the state simply through negligence.

Families or persons living off a fixed income, such as old folks on pensions or social security, are the hardest hit. They have no way to increase their earnings, yet must pay an extra three per cent on everything they buy, from the rent to their bread.

There is a terrific lobby, armed with every legal trick and endowed with millions of dollars, that sits with the state legislators and urges them onward toward the goal of getting a "broad-based bill" actually on the books. But for the fighting spirit of Governor Price Daniel this lobby would have succeeded last year. Only he can prevent it this coming session and he can't win without the militant support of citizen groups throughout the state.

Texas is not yet ready to accept this mean tax on people least able to pay. Let's not give an inch.

they're final -- for two years or even four years.

At this point in the campaign almost all candidates and their supporters believe that if there is a big enough turnout Saturday, their side will win handily. And those who aren't pleased with the way things turn out likely will blame it on those who don't bother to show up.

Equally as important as the primaries are the precinct conventions to be held the same day. This is the only means by which the individual voter can participate in the selection of the presidential nominee.

NEW HIGHWAY SIGNS DUE -- New highway signs, bigger and more colorful than any used before, will begin appearing soon on the interstate highways in Texas.

Highway Commission has ordered the posting of route markers and guide signs on 707 miles of interstate highway now completed or under construction in the state.

Conspicuously absent in this marking system will be stop signs. Completion of the 41,000 mile system of controlled access roads will make possible coast-to-coast and border-to-border driving without a stop sign or traffic light.

Motorists soon will become familiar with the interstate marker -- a red, white and blue shield. Texas Highway Department designed the shield which later was adopted for the entire national system.

All markers and guide signs will be larger than usual. Advance exit signs will be placed two miles ahead of interchanges to give motorists plenty of time to plan their next move.

Guide signs will have white letters and symbols on a green background, and signs for rest and service areas will have green letters on a reflectorized white background. Warning and yield signs will remain in the familiar yellow and black but will grow in dimensions.

number of miles of interstate highways completed and under way. Texas' allotment is 3,033 miles of which 697 are finished and 259 are in some stage of progress.

SCHOOLS' SHARE DOWN -- Texas is spending a smaller proportion of its tax revenue on education now than it did 10 years ago.

This statement was issued by the Texas State Teachers Association in support of its drive for enactment of the Hale-Alkin program for school improvement.

In 1958-59, says the report, Texas spent 29.67 cents of each tax dollar for public school education. In the last completed school year the percentage was 27.68 cents of each dollar.

During that period public school spending more than doubled -- from \$156,000,000 to \$322,000,000 -- to keep pace with a 51 per cent increase in

students and 49 per cent increase in teachers. But spending for other purposes increased faster.

Gov. Price Daniel again said that he would like to call a special session after the elections to erase the deficit and raise teachers' pay. But he also said it would depend on getting agreement from legislators.

Profit Predicted -- When everything is finally cleared up,

the state will come out with a profit of \$50,000 -- perhaps more -- on land involved in the Veterans Land Board scandals.

This prediction was made by Land Commissioner Bill Allcorn who called \$50,000 a "conservative figure."

He said that \$1,725,000 has already been recovered from fraudulent land deals and that \$1,679,000 more is outstanding but fully secured.

When the entire \$3,404,000 is recovered, said Allcorn, the state will have a comfortable margin above what was involved in the original transactions.

Costly Error -- Texas Supreme Court has returned to district court for re-trial a case involving a \$100,000 mistake in arithmetic.

An employe of an Arlington contractor made the error in submitting a bid of \$534,175 instead of \$634,226 to the local school board for a school building job. After the bid was accepted by the board, the contractor discovered the error and refused to carry out the contract.

Board then awarded the bid to the second low bidder and sued the first contractor for the \$36,278 difference between the second low bid and the bid they had first accepted.

Supreme Court members disagreed on the case, wrote three different opinions, but all agreed it should be re-tried.

How Big The Grounds -- The State Building Commission is awaiting an attorney general's opinion before putting in sidewalks to the new state buildings.

Reason for the precaution is that the legislature passed a bill in 1957 stating that nothing -- absolutely nothing -- could be

built on the Capitol grounds without specific permission of the Legislature. And the Legislature did not provide for sidewalks.

Who Owns The Oil? -- Another question under consideration by the attorney general's department is "who owns rights to the minerals under county roads."

Request for an opinion was submitted by Jack Cook, county attorney of Kleberg County.

Ultimately to be decided is whether state and local government can claim the right to mineral development of the right of way of some 228,000 miles of streets and highways

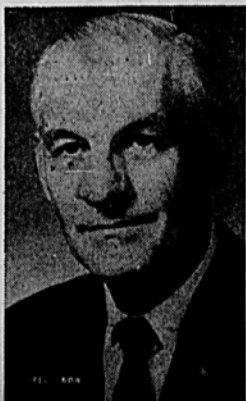
