Q—Where can I find out if my country is listed?

A—Foreign nations associated with the United States in mutual defense activities.

Q—What nations are involved?

A—There are 44 of them around the world.

Q—How much time does the alien have to have spent in the armed forces of his country to get the exemption from the U. S. armed forces?

A—At least 18 months.

A—In class IV-A, the same as one of our citizens who has completed service in our armed forces.

Q—What does the draft board need as a basis for this classification?

A—A certificate of service in English from his country's diplomatic mission or consular office.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

FOR/AGAINST: The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances. 2. FOR/AGAINST: Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas. 3. FOR/AGAINST: The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops. 4. FOR/AGAINST: The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission. 5. FOR/AGAINST: The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxpayers electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county. 6. FOR/AGAINST: The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale. 7. FOR/AGAINST: The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county.

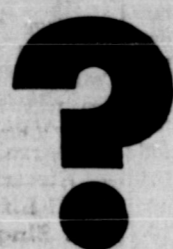

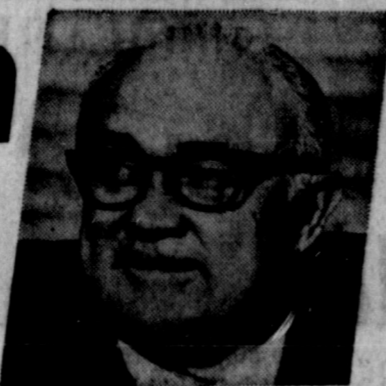

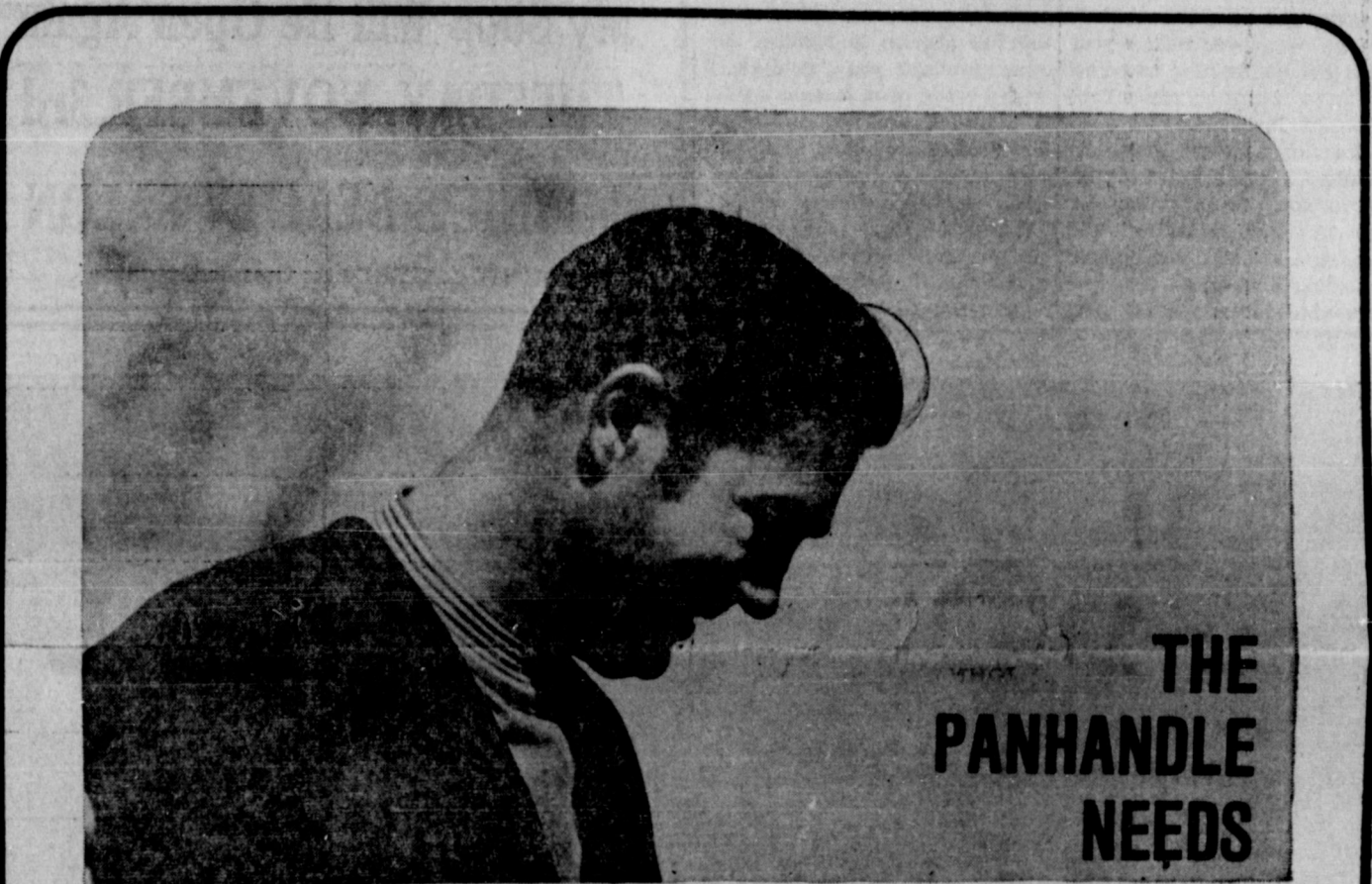

Taxpayers Ask IRS

Both of my children are having orthodontic work done and I'm going to have a big medical expense deduction for this year. Is there anyway to get some kind of tax credit for this now to help me pay some of the bills?

A—Yes, you may be able to have your employer reduce your income tax withholding based on the larger itemized deductions you expect. Instructions for making this change are given in Schedule A, Form W-4. Ask your employer for a copy.

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 allows you to claim additional withholding allowances for large estimated deductions even when

they exceed what you claimed last year. Until this change in the law, taxpayers were limited to the total claimed the previous year.

Q—The tickets I bought for a theater benefit list an amount I may deduct as a charitable contribution that is much less than what I paid. Why?

A—The law limits the charitable deduction to the difference between what would normally be paid for the tickets and what you actually paid. The amount listed as deductible on your tickets reflects this.

Be sure to save the tickets or other information that will establish this tax deduction. Since the full amount is not deductible, a check or receipt showing what you paid for the tickets needs to be supplemented by additional information. The deductible amount remains unchanged even if the tickets are not used.

Q—I'm collecting Social Security benefits in addition to my company pension. Is any of this taxable?

A—Social Security benefits are not taxable. However, your company pension will be taxable in whole or in part depending on how much you contributed to its cost.

If the plan is of a type where your contribution is recovered within the first three years, the pension is tax-free until your cost is recovered. After that, the full pension is taxable. Another provision you should check is the retirement income credit. It allows a taxpayer to reduce his income tax by up to 15 percent of his retirement income when certain conditions are met.

Details on these provisions are given in IRS Publication 524, Retirement Income Credit. Send a postcard to your District Di-

rector for a free copy. Q—Can my son claim a withholding exemption for himself on his job if I still claim him?

A—Yes, your son may take an exemption for himself even though you are still entitled to claim him. If he is not aware of it, you should tell your son that it may be possible for him to avoid having income tax withheld from his wages. If he had no tax liability last year and expects his earnings to be less than \$1725 this year, he should file Form W-4E with his employer to accomplish this.

Q—I sold some farmland at a sizeable profit. Can I reduce my taxes by using income averaging?

A—Yes, capital gains are eligible for averaging. There are new provisions on both capital gains and averaging so check with either your local County Agent or IRS office if you have any questions about them when you file your return next year.

Panhandle Counties Plan to Improve Law Enforcement

A comprehensive multi-year plan for upgrading law enforcement and criminal justice in the 24-county Panhandle Regional Planning Commission has been received by Governor Preston Smith's Criminal Justice Council.

The Panhandle plan, along with those from the other 21 regional councils, will provide input for the 1971 Criminal Justice Plan for Texas, scheduled to go to the printer in December.

Included in the Panhandle plan is an evaluation of the criminal justice system, including problems, needs, resources and priorities, of the entire region, which is made up of the counties of Collingsworth, Lipscomb, Potter, Randall, Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher and Wheeler.

The background data information provided by the cities and counties in the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission was prepared through the cooperative efforts of the Council and the Public Protection Committee.

In a proposed annual action program, the plan sets forth immediate goals while projecting long-range goals in a multi-year (five year) plan. It calls for concentration on such areas as upgrading law enforcement personnel, prevention of crime and juvenile delinquency, improvement of prosecution and court activities, police, community relations and information and communications.

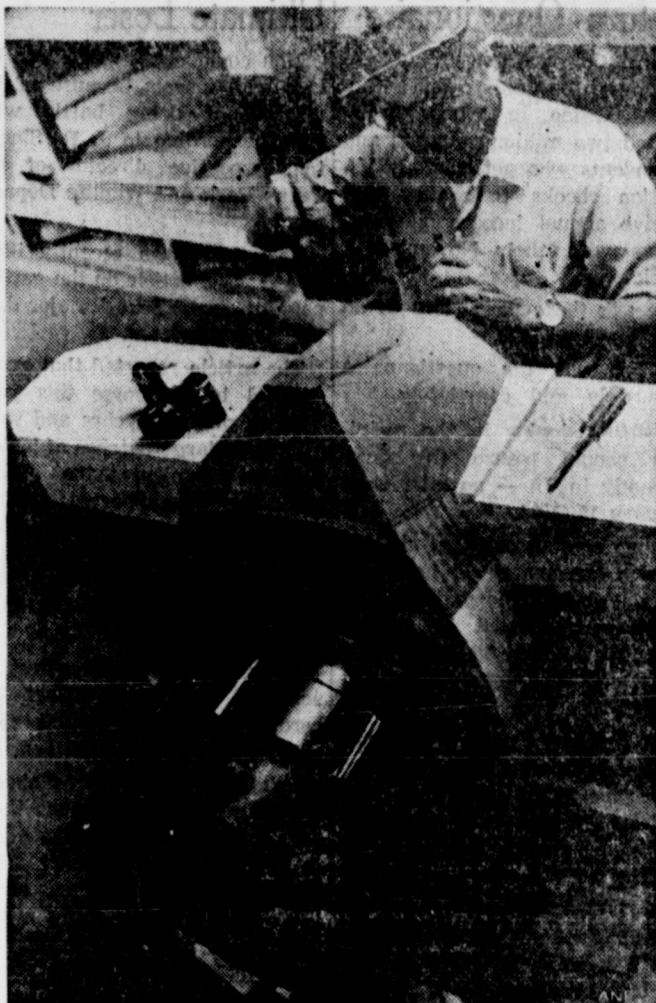

New IRS Regulations

TOPIC: New IRS Regulations Permit Retirees to Request Tax Withholding on Annuities and Pension Payments On or after January 1, 1971 Using Form W-4p.

The form for retired people and others to request withholding of Federal income tax on pension and annuity payments is now available at Internal Revenue Service offices, Ellis Campbell, Jr., IRS District Director for Northern Texas, announced today.

New IRS regulations permit retirees to request withholding on annuities and pension payments made on or after January 1, 1971.

The withholding provisions do not apply to annuities that are wholly exempt from Federal taxation, such as social security benefits and Veterans Administration pensions, Mr. Campbell said.

Form W-4p, Annuitant's Request for Federal Income Tax Withholding, should be filled out by the retiree and sent to the bank, insurance company or other taxpayer from which he receives his annuity or pension payment.

Since payers do not have to

begin withholding until three months after the Form W-4p is filed, retirees who want withholding to begin next January should file Form W-4p with the payer of annuities and pensions by October 1, 1970. Payers may begin withholding anytime after they receive the Form W-4p but not before January 1, 1971.

Mr. Campbell said withholding must be in a whole-dollar amount and must be at least \$5 a month. Withholding, however, cannot reduce below \$70 the amount of pension or annuity payment which the retired person receives.

The firm making the payment in the retiree requests that it be done. However, withholding is optional on the part of the retiree.

A firm that withholds tax on an annuity will give the IRS and the retiree a special withholding form showing the amount of the annuity and tax withheld. This form will be available after January 1, 1971, Mr. Campbell said.

Through voluntary withholding, retired persons will be able to avoid having to make quarterly payments of estimated tax to keep their tax payments current.

Treat Peach Trees Now For Tree Borer

Peach trees that are attacked by the peach tree borer, are unprofitable, and may produce off-color foliage. Infested trees usually die within a few years, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

The larvae of the peach tree borer destroys the cambium layer and inner bark of the peach trees near the ground line. Infested trees have large masses of gum around the base of the trunk. This gum is mixed with a brownish frass or sawdust.

Control can be obtained from October 20 to November 15 or before the soil temperature drops below 55 degrees Fahrenheit by placing paradichlorobenzene (PDB) crystals in a band around the trunk of the tree.

All leaf material and grass should be cleaned out and the soil loosened in an area of one foot from the tree trunk. The PDB crystals are then placed in a narrow circular band or shallow trench about two inches from the trunk of the tree. This band is then covered with soil, free

of leaf or grass trash, and the soil is mounded around the trunk so as to form a cone-shaped pile about six inches high. Avoid pushing any of the PDB crystals against the tree since crystals in contact with the tree will cause injury, Gooch said.

The mound of soil should be raked back away from the tree in the early spring. Failure to do this may result in injury to the tree.

The amount of PDB crystals to be applied will vary with the age of the tree. For two and three year old trees, use 1/2 ounce of crystals; four to five year old trees, 3/4 ounce; mature trees, one ounce.

Hints Offered On Cotton Planting Seed Problems

The quality of cottonseed for planting purposes could become a problem. Therefore, points out Fred C. Elliott, Extension cotton specialist, careful attention should be given to harvesting, ginning, and seed handling in order to insure quality seed for next year's planting.

He lists five primary areas where damage to seed can occur.

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cur. They are pre-harvest damage; mechanical damage during harvest; damage during trailer or bulk storage at high moisture levels; mechanical damage during ginning and damage from acid delinting.

Follow the moisture guidelines, suggests Elliott, during harvesting and ginning for this is most important and is the one practice where growers can help.

When cotton opens during wet weather, there is some danger of free fatty acid developing in the seed. This can be detected by cutting the seed and observing whether the meat in the seed has a brown color. Under such conditions, seed should be very carefully handled, says the specialist.

Here are other suggestions from Elliott which should help obtain better quality planting

seed. Delay harvesting in the morning until relative humidity at boll height in the field is 60 percent or less. Wait until the bark on the main stalk and stems are dry following frost or desiccation. Too early stripping will result in bumpy grades. Store seed at the lowest possible moisture content, below 12 percent. Also store seed under conditions that will allow cooling or air circulation through them.

And this word of warning, if cotton is harvested early in the morning under high moisture conditions, and the trailer is left on the gin lot during the rush of harvest, injury to the seed can result. Even overnight storage on a trailer with moisture content of the cotton higher than 12 percent can cause heating and seed damage, he says.

And finally, he makes these suggestions, eat an early lunch and start the stripper around 11 a.m. and save planting seed from afternoon harvested cotton, and ask the county agent for publications dealing with seed problems.

VA Pensioners Must Return Questionnaire

Jack Coker, Director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, today alerted two million veterans and dependents who get monthly VA pension checks that they will receive annual income questionnaires with their November 1 checks.

He asks these pensioners to do two things:

1—Fill out the questionnaire accurately and completely.

2—After signing it, the recipients should return the form promptly to VA — no later than January 15, 1971.

Coker pointed out that as 1971 pension payments will be based on submitted information, the questionnaires must be returned by the January 15, deadline to insure non-interruption of pension checks.

VA pension is paid to veterans totally and permanently disabled from non-service-connected disabilities. Widows and children of deceased veterans may also be eligible for VA pension if they meet certain income limitations.

Parents of deceased veterans who receive dependency and indemnity compensation are also required to fill out and return the questionnaire.

The annual income questionnaire requests information on the amount of income the beneficiary received in 1970, and the amount anticipated in 1971.

It was emphasized that if the questionnaire is not returned to the VA, beneficiaries will not only lose next year's benefits, but may also be required to refund payments received during 1970.

Each year, hundreds of VA beneficiaries are inconvenienced because they fail to promptly return or completely fill out their income questionnaires, Coker pointed out. He urged veterans and dependents who need help with questionnaires to contact the nearest VA office.

State agencies have agreed on formal program for cooperation in civil defense matters.

Pesticide User Ultimate Loser

Man could conceivably lose his war with insects because of his method of doing battle with them, according to J. R. Singleton, executive director of the Texas Park and Wildlife Department.

This point was recently illustrated in an article on the garden page of one of Texas' major dailies, said Singleton.

The article reported that grubs seemed to be worse this year than in previous years and were killing off large patches of lawns. Several chemicals, the article said, including Spectracide and Heptachlor, have been used for control in the past, but three times as much as previously, and even this heavy dosage does not always work.

The grubs are not the first insecticide-resistant insect, according to Singleton, and most probably will not be the last.

"With the insect's fantastic breeding potential it takes them only a few generations to adapt to adverse situations," said Singleton. "Out of millions of insects in a species, only a few individuals may be resistant to a pesticide, but these few may survive a spraying, reproduce and pass this resistance to their offspring."

According to Singleton, by the process of natural selection, the insects will become almost totally immune to pesticides, necessitating a change in pesticides and larger doses.

Because of this, insects may eventually win out, and man will have dangerously polluted his environment while helping the insects to win, said Singleton. And, since pesticides adversely affect the natural enemies of insects, the predators which have kept insects in check for millions of years may cease to exist.

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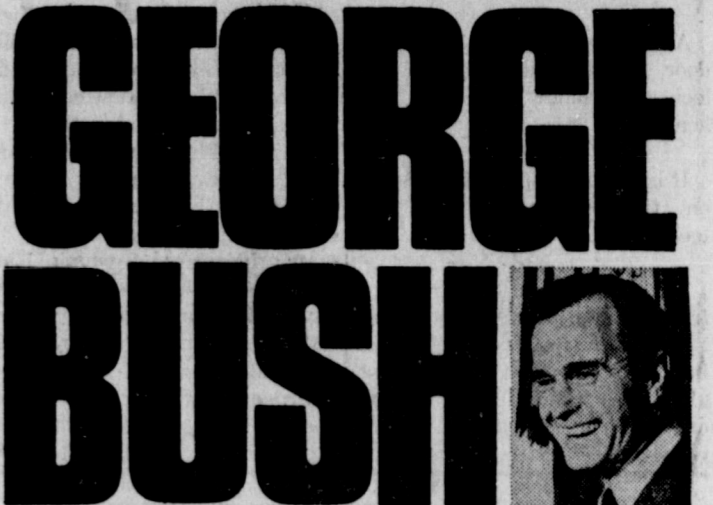
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
