

The article reported that grubs seemed to be worse this year than in previous years and were killing off large patches of lawns Several chemicals the article said, including Spectracide and Heptachlor, have been used for control in the past, but three times as much as previously, and even this heavy dosage does not always work. ed by the January 15, deadline to

The grubs are not the first insecticide - resistant insect, according to Singleton, and most probably will not be the last.

breeding potential it takes them only a few generations to adapt to adverse situations," said Singleton. "Out of millions of insects in a species, only a few individuals may be resistant to pesticide, but these few may survive a spraying, reproduce and pass this resistance to their off-

According to Singleton, by the process of natural selection, the insects will become almost totally immune to pesticides, necessitating a change in pesticides and larger doses.
