LION'S CLUB LIGHT BULB SALE NOVEMBER 2

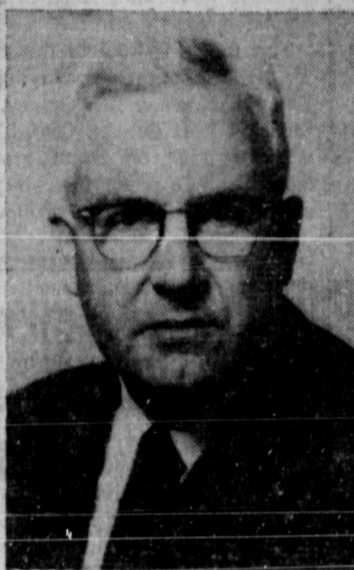

Tax Management Meet Tuesday Nite

An income tax management meeting will be held Tuesday, November 2, 7:30 p.m. in room 102 of the Classroom Building, Clarendon College, according to Ronald Gooch, County Agent.

Speakers for the meeting will include Ed Garrett, Area Economist Extension Service and Michael Sprout, Economist Extension Service, College Station.

Topics to be discussed include Income and Outgo — a discussion of tax management tips; What's New in Taxes — change in the tax law that affect farmers and ranchers; Records and Reporting; Gains and Losses — a discussion of capital gains and losses, casualty and drought losses and involuntary conservations.

The meeting is sponsored by the Extension Service, Donley County Program Building Committee, and the Agriculture Committee of the Chamber of Commerce in support of the Pan-handle Economics program.

This meeting will be of special interest to all farmers and ranchers. Everyone is invited to attend Gooch said.

Broncs Romp Past Claude Mustangs 25-0

The Clarendon Bronchos racked up their second district win of the season Friday night by defeating the Claude Mustangs 25-0.

The Bronchos opened up their scoring in the second period with Mack Tomlinson passing to James King for 18 yards and 6 points. Scotty Lindley's kick was good for the extra point. A short time later the Bronchos blocked a Claude punt and Tomlinson passed to Mike Leeper for the TD and then ran the ball over for 2 extra points. Elray King made a brilliant run of around 45 yards on a quick-breaking play for pay dirt and Lindley's kick was true to the mark as was his field goal a short time before time ran out in the game.

The Bronchos gained 330 yards, rushing and passing, to Claude's 105. Clarendon racked up 15 first downs and Claude had only 6. Elray King was the top gainer with 116 yards on 20 carries for an average of 5.8 yards. Steve Carter had a total of 70 yards on 12 carries for a 5.8 yard average also and Tommy Shields carried 12 times for 59 yards and a 4.9 average. Mike Leeper was high in the pass reception department with 4 for a total of 62 yards and a 15.5 yard average.

MOISTURE TOTAL NEAR YEAR'S AVERAGE

Showers falling the latter part of the week and first part of this week have brought our year's total to 20.37 which is 1.3 under the year's average for this area.

Our official weather observer measured .34 last Friday and .11 for Tuesday which brings the month's total to 1.58. Outlying areas in all directions from town in most instances received much heavier amounts.

Farmers are looking forward to a good stretch of sunny weather.

USDA Announces 1972 Cotton Program

Major provisions of the 1972 Upland Cotton Program — aimed at continuing the progress achieved this year — were announced recently by Secretary Hardin.

The 1972 cotton program is basically the same as this year's program. The program again provides for a national base acreage of 11.5 million acres, a national average loan rate of 19.5 cents per pound, a preliminary set-aside payment of 15 cents per pound and the set-aside requirement of 20% of the farm base acreage allotment.

As in 1971, the farm allotment will not limit the acreage of cotton a farmer can plant. A cotton producer who sets aside the required acreage to conserving uses can plant all of the cotton he wishes — without penalty — and receive the full payment on his farm base acreage allotment.

The same skip-row planting rules which were in effect for 1971 will be applicable to 1972. Skips of two or more rows will be eligible for set-aside. Skips of one or more will count toward the conserving base requirement for the farm.

Producers who wish to participate in the program must sign up at their local ASCS County Office. Signup dates will be January 17 through February 25, 1972. Producers will be notified of their base acreage allotments, payment yields, conserving bases and set-aside requirements prior to sign-up. Information on sale or lease of allotments, release and reapportionment, failure to plant and other program provisions are available at the ASCS Office.

1972 Feed Grain Program

Secretary Hardin has announced a feed grain program for 1972 designed to increase farm income and reduce carryover stocks. The feed grain program will work this way:

1. During sign-up, starting January 17, a farmer can decide whether to set aside a minimum 25% of his feed grain base acreage to qualify for loans and payments.

2. Loan rate for grain sorghum is \$1.79 per hundredweight (1.73 in 1971) and \$1.08 per bushel for corn.

3. Set-aside payments will be 40 cents per bushel for corn, 32 cents per bushel for barley, and 38 cents per bushel for grain sorghum (29 cents in 1971). These are paid on the established yield times one-half the base.

4. At sign-up time the farmer can agree to set-aside an additional amount of acreage, up to 10% of his barley base. The payment for this additional acreage will be 52 cents per bushel for corn, 49 cents per bushel for grain sorghum and 42 cents for barley. Also at sign-up time, the farmer may offer to set-aside still another 5 or 10 percent of his corn or grain sorghum base. The Secretary of Agriculture will announce by mid-March whether to accept the additional acreage.

5. Sweet sorghum again may be planted on the set-aside acreage and grazed, except during the five principal months of the growing season.

Other details of the program are available at the ASCS Office.

Red China And The United Nations

My major activity last week was aimed at showing the members of the United Nations that the Congress of the United States looks with great disfavor upon the possibility of Nationalist China being expelled from the U. N. and being replaced by Red China.

The main thrust in this effort was introduction of a bill to reduce this country's contribution to the U. N. At the present time we furnish more than one-third, 37 percent to be exact, of the total monetary contributions to the world organization. Although I have never been a supporter of the United Nations, it is my contention that if we are to remain in the organization we should not bear the lion's share of its financial support.

The bill I introduced would limit the U. S. contribution to an amount equivalent to this country's population in proportion to the total population of all U. N. members. This would reduce our contribution to about seven percent of the total budget.

I know of no other way in which we could more graphically illustrate this nation's opposition

to the expulsion of Nationalist China.

Emergency Loan Guarantees

As a part of my continuing effort to assure adequate credit for the farmers and ranchers of our area, I have introduced legislation to allow the Farmers Home Administration to guarantee emergency loans made to disaster victims by private lenders.

FHA emergency loans have saved many farm families from financial ruin. However, there is a constant problem of keeping the emergency revolving fund supplied. My bill will relieve the pressure on the emergency fund by allowing FHA to guarantee loans made by private investors. This would not cost the taxpayer any money.

Rhodesian Chrome

The Senate has added an amendment to the Military Procurement Bill which would lift the ban on U. S. companies purchasing chrome from Rhodesia. This law prohibiting the purchase of chrome from Rhodesia was enacted because some Members of Congress did not like that country's racial policies. However, Rhodesia has always been one of our strongest allies; and I believe we should be purchasing chrome from them rather than the Soviet Union, our avowed enemy.

Legislation Adopted

The House unanimously adopted the Agriculture Committee version of my bill to broaden

and expand the powers of the Secretary of Agriculture to operate with countries in the Western Hemisphere to prevent or retard animal diseases such as the recent outbreak of sleeping sickness which affected thousands of horses in Texas.

The House last week adopted legislation to settle the land claims of Alaska natives which has been pending since the territory was purchased from Russia in 1867.

The bill provides for giving 40 million of the state's 375 million acres and \$925 million to the approximately 55,000 Alaskans whose ancestors inhabited the land at the time of the U. S. take over.

Also adopted was legislation to allow retired military personnel to leave part of their retirement pay to their survivors.

TWO RURAL ACCIDENTS CITED BY HIGHWAY PATROL IN COUNTY

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of September, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1971 shows a total of 42 accidents resulting in six persons killed and 35 persons injured.

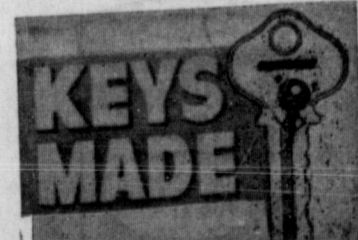

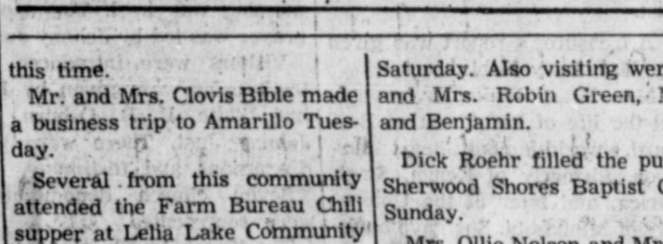

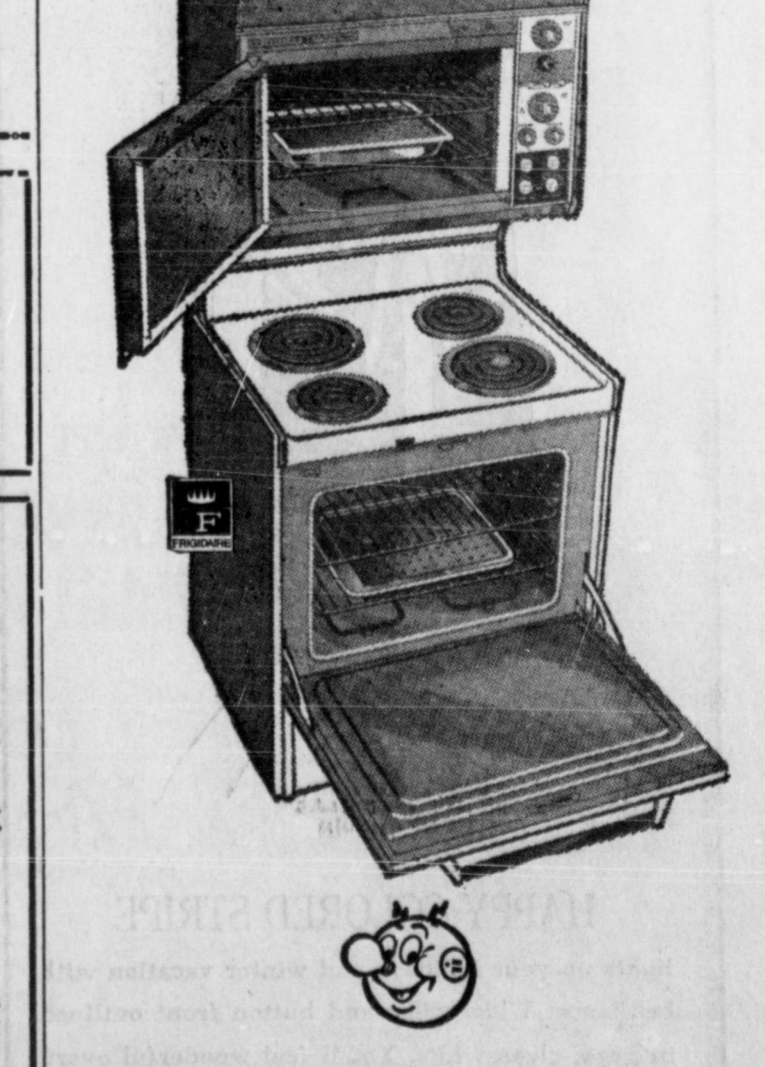

USE WINTER PASTURE SPARINGLY

"High-quality winter pastures should be judiciously grazed," says Dr. Neal Pratt, Extension agronomist at Texas A&M University. "Winter pastures usually produce higher quality forage than is produced during the summer months. These pastures also are more expensive and require slightly more delicate management practices."

Winter pastures should be grazed with livestock that have high market value, adds the agronomist. This is one reason why stocker calves on winter pastures are becoming so popular in Texas. Stockers that have grazed winter pasture are a readily marketable product.

"For cows grazing winter pastures, a system of limited grazing can be most profitable," suggests Pratt. "This means that pastures can be used to supplement the protein and energy requirements of the cow and its young calf. Dry cows have little need for high quality forage during the grazing season."

To reap the most benefits from winter pastures, withhold grazing until winter is approaching. Grazing winter pastures before plants are thoroughly established and growing rapidly reduces the total forage growth by 50 percent or more, contends the agronomist.

AOUDAD SHEEP CONTINUE TO MULTIPLY IN PALO DURO

From a nucleus of 44 animals released in 1957, the aoudad sheep population in the Palo Duro Canyon area has grown to more than 650 animals, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists.

Hunters going after the big sheep have a good hunt during the Nov. 14-20 season, say the biologists.

Landowners designated as having surplus animals can pick up the required permits beginning Oct. 18 at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department office in Amarillo.

Aoudads are natives of the Atlas mountains of Africa. The big sheep may weigh as much as 270 pounds, and the world record aoudad had horns 34 5/8 inches long. The largest horns taken from the Palo Duro Canyon area were 32 inches long.

Aoudad hunting is traditionally tough on the hunter since cold and rainy weather has blustered into the canyon area during the hunt for the past few years. Getting the aoudad out of the rugged canyon area demands the utmost in stamina.

The annual harvest of aoudads is less than 50 animals. Hunters spend an average of eight hours each and fire an average of three shots each.

Only in the Panhandle counties with an open aoudad season are the sheep considered

game animals. In all other counties they are classified as exotics.

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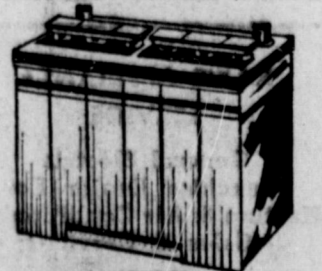

From Your State Capitol

Ballot order has been selected for 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on at the November 7, 1972, election.

Major changes, including authorization for a constitutional convention, four-year terms for major state officials, higher state bond interest ceilings and equal rights for women are included in the list.

The amendments, in the order they will appear on the ballot, follow:

1. A salary raise for legislators from \$4,800 to \$8,400 a year.
2. To abolish Lamar County hospital district.
3. To provide for compensation of all justices of the peace on a salary basis.
4. To establish a constitutional revision commission and call a convention to revise the state constitution in January, 1974.
5. To allow tax exemptions for disabled veterans, their surviving widows and children and widows and children of armed forces personnel killed on active duty.
6. To provide a minimum \$3,000 property tax exemption for resident homesteads of those 65 and over.
7. To guarantee that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed or national origin.
8. To provide four-year terms for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller, treasurer, land commissioner, secretary of state and other statutory state officers.
9. To allow soil and water conservation district directors to hold or be compensated for, more than one office.
10. To require that proposed constitutional amendments be described twice in clear language by statewide newspaper publication (633 papers).

11. To fix an annual salary of \$22,500 for speaker and lieutenant governor.

12. To permit state employees to serve on local governing boards.

13. To set a six per cent weighted average annual interest rate for constitutionally-authorized bond issues.

14. To allow counties to reduce their permanent school fund and distribute money to independent and common school districts on a per-scholastic basis.

DEMOCRATS ELECT — Feuding Democrats settled a row over election of a new chairman with unexpected calm.

At a Dallas meeting, the State Democratic Executive Committee named Roy Orr, 39, mayor of DeSoto, chairman, rejecting Gov. Preston Smith's preference for Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Orr won by a razor-thin 22 votes to 30 over the veteran statewide official. Backers of both argued that their man would be the best choice to unify the state party for election-year battles ahead. White had backing of liberal and some moderate and conservative members of the committee. Orr drew support of most SDEC conservatives and some moderates.

Both candidates, the winner and the loser, pledged future cooperation with all factions.

Orr succeeds Dr. Elmer Baum of Austin as SDEC chief until the September, 1972, state party convention.

Bogard of Tyler; Claude L. Chambers of Irving and Mike A. Burkholder of Pecos. State Board of Barber Examiners — Thomas J. Hullum of Burnet.

Joe Reeder Jr. of Knox City was named 50th district judge succeeding Lewis Williams of Knox City who resigned.

COURTS SPEAK — The State Supreme Court affirmed lower court findings that state employees are constitutionally banned from city council service.

In another new decision, the High Court set a hearing November 3 in the controversy over whether 588 acres were legally acquired at Odessa for a new University of Texas of the Permian Basin campus.

Third Court of Civil Appeals here held a law preventing vending machine owners from holding financial interests in taverns is constitutional.

The death penalty conviction of a Refugio County man for slaying a sheriff in 1969 has been upheld by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

DISASTER AID APPROVED — Texas Employment Commission will pay disaster unemployment compensation to persons made jobless by tropical storm Fern September 9 - September 30 in 14 South Texas counties.

Counties covered in the assistance plan and Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Nueces, Refugio, San Patricio, Jim Wells, Hidalgo, Starr, Willacy, Jim Hogg, Live Oak and Calhoun.

Special aid determined in accord with U. S. Labor Department regulations will correspond in amount and duration to benefits paid under the state unemployment insurance program and manpower development and training act. Maximum is \$45 a week for 26 weeks.

Eligible include those who no longer have jobs or a place to work as a result of the storm or who were unable to reach work, who were injured or who were made heads of households as a result of deaths in the disaster.

ALLOWABLE REDUCED — For the seventh consecutive month, Texas Railroad Commission reduced the statewide oil allowable.

A cut of .7 of a per cent sets the November production factor

at 62.5 per cent of potential. The allowable has been slashed 19.6 per cent since last April.

A maximum production of 3,275,749 barrels daily will be permitted under the November controls, compared with 3,305,129 this month.

BOND SALE OFFERED — A total of \$31.5 million in veterans land program bonds will be offered for sale November 1.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said sale of additional bonds is necessary to continue the program under which 20,000 applications for low interest rate land purchase loans have been made since last February. The interest ceiling on the bonds is 4.5 per cent.

APPEAL FILED — Texas is appealing U. S. Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe's decision to impose a 10 per cent penalty on the state's share of highway construction money from the federal trust fund.

The threatened cut — because Texas has not enacted a billboard control law under the highway beautification act — would cost the state about \$24 million a year. The appeal to Volpe noted legislative efforts to comply with the federal requirement and asked a decision on the penalty be withheld until the next regular legislative session.

In a recent meeting the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission rescinded one action taken in its June 4 meeting. In June the commissioners closed state-owned riverbeds and railroad rights-of-way to all hunting except waterfowl.

In all counties under regulatory authority, except Dimmit, Uvalde and Zavala Counties, hunting is not prohibited in state-owned riverbeds.

In all counties under regulatory authority hunting regulations for the area will apply to railroad rights-of-way.

NORTHERN PIKE NEW RECORD

A Clarendon man went fishing in the dark depths of Greenbelt Reservoir and hooked a monster — a 13-pound northern pike. The fish is a new state record, approved by the Texas Game Fish Records Committee of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Clarence L. Hamilton caught the pike on a deep running lure on the afternoon of Sept. 10, 1971. The fish measured 37½ inches in length and had a girth of 15¼
