Students To Register For Public School On August 15 - 16

Superintendent Jeff Walker released the Public School Calendar for the coming school year with registration set for August 15th and 16th.

Football boys will report for practice August 12th and Teacher Inservice days will be August 12-19.

August 15, Thursday, Seniors will register from 9 a.m. to 12 o'clock and Juniors will register from 1 to 4 p.m. that same day. Friday, August 16, Sophomores will register from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and Freshmen from 1 to 4 p.m. Grades 1-8 will also register Friday, August 16, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Kindergarten students will register from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. reporting at Mr. Cain's office.

Youngsters enrolling in Kindergarten must have their Birth Certificates and Record of Immunizations, reminds Superintendent Walker. If the youngster attended Kindergarten here last year and will be enrolling in the first grade here you need not bring the certificate or record. However, if the child did not attend Kindergarten here but is enrolling in first grade here you will need the Birth Certificate and the Immunization Record.

After serving the people of this area close to 45 years, Johnnie Johnson decided to sell his welding and blacksmithing business and make it a bit easier but not completely retire.

The business was sold to Wondell Luttrell, a native of Donley County and a son of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Luttrell. Wondell has been with Southwestern Cement in Amarillo the past four years. He and his wife Ann have two children, Mark 7 and Stephanie 4.

Mr. Johnson started out in the blacksmithing business while only a boy working for his grandfather, Erskine Johnson and his dad, Will Johnson at Stephenville, Texas. The going price for horseshoeing at that time was 25c per shoe and the blacksmith furnished the shoe, Johnnie stated.

Will Johnson and his family moved to Clarendon in 1930 and opened a blacksmith shop here with Johnnie as his main hand. The Johnson's had one of the best equipped machine shops in the area. That business was located northwest of the Depot. They later moved into a new building on east highway 287. Twenty-one years ago Johnnie built the building he has sold to Luttrell.

Greenbelt Water Use Up Thru Month July

More Greenbelt water was used during the month of July 1974 than ever before according to a report released by James L. Kuhn, Manager. Member cities used a total of 168,021 million gallons compared to 11,515 million in July 1973 and 124,077 million in July 1970.

Water used by the City of Clarendon totaled 34,284 million gallons, an all time high. The next peak year for the City was July 1970 with a usage of 23,108 million gallons.

Other cities reaching into the five digits were Childress with a total of 60,485 million gallons for July 1974; Quanah with 28,373 gallons, Crowell 15,350 gallons, and Red River 17,440 gallons.

Farm News

FAILED ACREAGE: Remember!!! If you lose your crop, come by this office before you make other use of the land.

If you have feed grain planted and decide to graze it out or plow it up you must get an appraisal before turning animals in or before plowing, in order to protect your payments.

PROTECT YOUR ALLOTMENTS: We have several farms that are going to lose 20% of the allotments if producers don't certify their acreage. The final date has been extended to Sept. 1, 1974. There are numerous ways to protect the allotment on your farm, so if you haven't already certified, come on in and do so. If you did certify earlier to an intended acreage to be planted and that intention has changed for some reason, you need to come back in and correct your certification.

REAP: We have funds available to carry out needed conservation measures on your farm or ranch.

BURNING OF CROP RESIDUES: The Texas State ASC Committee has determined that deliberate burning of any annual crop residue, other than flax, violates reasonable conservation principles and will be considered a practice tending to defeat the purpose of the 1973 REAP and 1974 RECP Programs.

CROP AND LIVESTOCK REPORTS NEEDED: In early July, over 24,000 Texas farmers received questionnaires from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas. Information from this survey will be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the State of Texas and for each county. These reports are very important, so please complete and mail them back.

Postal Exam For Sub Rural Carrier Set

The United States Postal Service has announced that an examination for Substitute Rural Carrier of Record at Clarendon, Texas will be given at Childress, Texas. Closing date for applications will be August 30, 1974.

The examination is being given to establish a register of eligibles from which future substitute rural carrier of record vacancies will be filled. Applicants must take a written test consisting of vocabulary and reading comprehension questions and computations. Sample questions will be sent applicants. The test requires about 3 1/4 hours. Additional time will be required to complete necessary forms.

Applicants will be rated on the written test scale of 100. To be eligible a rating of at least 70 must be attained. Physical requirements must be met including vision and hearing. Applicants must have a valid state driver's license and safe driving record and pass the Postal Service Road Test.

All substitute rural carriers of record must furnish and maintain at their own expense vehicle equipment necessary for the prompt handling of the mails but are given an equipment maintenance allowance based on daily mileage schedule or a minimum allowance per day.

Applicants must have reached their 18th birthday, must be citizens of or owe allegiance to the United States of America.

Application forms are available at the post office. Eligibility for this exam will be limited to one year unless after 10 months you request eligibility extension for an additional year. Maximum eligibility is two years.

Today's Moral Dilemma

One of our National Leaders recently discussed the moral decline of our nation in a television interview. He brought the problem right back home: the failure to train up a child in the way he ought to go (Prov. 22:6). He laid the blame for today's moral dilemma at the doors of our schools, courts, and churches. He said that our schools and institutions of learning in our local communities do not teach moral concepts. He mentioned the decision of the courts to completely separate learning from the moral foundation of the Bible. We expect a person to grow up knowing that he should not lie, cheat, or steal; but never teach him this in our public institutions. How can a child expect to grow up with a strong moral fiber when we don't even teach him the Ten Commandments in a classroom? Even morality must be learned. Have we legislated the moral foundation of the Bible out of our learning process? Are we justified in imparting knowledge and inspiring learning without founding that knowledge and learning on the wisdom of strong moral concepts? Has our system of government with all of its good qualities, in order to protect the seared conscience

of a few who don't believe in God, laid the foundation for the moral convention of our society?

The story is told about a preacher who was discussing this point with a local business man. The business man was arguing against the validity of the moral code of the Bible. To get his point across the preacher picked out the best pair of shoes in the house, stuck them under his arm, and headed for the door. The business man said, "Preacher, that's stealing." Whereupon, the minister replied, "Who said it is stealing?"

If you do away with God's moral law, God's code of moral rightness; you have no basis for morality. If God never said, "Thou shalt not steal;" then what makes stealing wrong? If God never said, "Thou shalt not kill;" then what makes murder wrong? If God never said, "Thou shalt not bare false witness (lie);" then what makes lying wrong?

How can today's youth learn what is right and wrong if the moral guidelines have been taken from their books, their lessons at their schools, or their homes? The result is well educated persons with low moral standards.

The Jewish historian closed out the historical account of the Israelite people in the Book of Judges with these words: "In those days . . . every man did that which was right in his own eyes" (Judges 21:25). The highest moral standard, the historian was saying, was right as it was interpreted by each

man. This period was called the Dark Ages of Israel's history.

Right and wrong must be interpreted from the view point of God's law, not man's. Corruption begins when men lay aside God's moral law to follow what is right or wrong as they see it.

How do you know what is right or wrong? God says: "Thou shalt have no other gods before me: Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image; Thou shalt not take the name of Lord thy God in vain; Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy. . . . Honor thy father and thy mother that thy days may be long upon the land. . . . Thou shalt not commit adultery; Thou shalt not kill; Thou shalt not steal; Thou shalt not bear false witness; Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's wife; manservant; maid-servant; nor his ox . . . nor anything that is thy neighbor's." (Exodus 20:1-17).

Sun Can Hurt

Skin cancer is the most widespread and curable of all the more than 100 forms of cancer. The skin is the body's largest organ. It protects the body from injury, eliminates waste, regulates our temperature, and receives sensory impressions. Abnormal conditions often develop which in most cases are non-cancerous but sometimes the sore that doesn't heal is cancer.

Cancer of the skin is readily detectable. One should bring any suspicious skin changes or sores to the attention of a physician. Any dark brown or black mole — like growth which becomes ulcerated or bleeds is suspect. Any lump, scaly area or white spot on the lips or in the mouth which lasts longer than two weeks should be seen by a physician.

Anyone can develop skin cancer although it is most prevalent among people with fair complexions who are exposed to excessive sunlight.

Treatment for skin cancer is by surgery, radiation or a combination of both. Of course one should avoid prolonged exposure to sunlight as a major way of preventing skin cancer.

 Sort clothes according to type of fabric, color-fastness, degree of soil and garment construction. You'll save both hot water and electricity by doing similar items together. Accumulate a full load before running your washer.

Be Selective
 Choose the cycle that is precisely appropriate for the clothes you are washing. Is a "hot" temperature setting really necessary? Except for heavily soiled items, most loads will come clean in either a cold or warm wash. Look into cold wash detergents.

Use the least amount of detergent that will get your clothes clean—most loads require only an ounce or less!
 Overloading causes extra strain and wear on your equipment; check the manufacturer's recommendations for load weight. Balance your load by alternating small and large items.

For Safety Sake
 Be sure control is "off" before reaching into your washer. If one is necessary, use only a heavy duty extension cord. Keep dry cleaning agents, color remover and Fiberglas out of your washer. It's a good idea not to wash clothes containing cleaning fluids in your washer.

THE MANTLE OF POWER PASSES

The President the American people elected has resigned. It is my prayer and wish that every man, woman and child in our nation will join together in a mutual, national and individual renewal of dedication to America in an effort to remove the animosities, prejudices and other obstacles which divide our people. As the mantle of power passes from Richard Nixon to Gerald Ford, it is vitally important that we have national unity.

I sincerely believe that all the people of our nation must take a more active part in our political process in order to maintain democracy. Our government reacts in direct relationship to the efforts put forth by its citizens to see that the men and women they have elected to public office are responsible to other needs.

Having known Gerald Ford for eight years in the House of Representatives as a personal friend, I believe he meets the qualifications necessary to become an outstanding President of the United States.

I hurt inside with disappointment as if a tragedy had happened to my own family, which time — and time alone — will heal; but time does heal many wounds to the mind and body.

Richard Nixon has served his country well and has reduced war suffering on our planet. He has succeeded in bringing about the closest thing to peace among all the people of the world that has existed in my lifetime. Peace, prosperity and help for the suffering have all been among his aims and goals. His-

tory I believe will show he has been in large measure successful in these goals. But the atmosphere in Washington had been like a lynch mob.

No man is perfect — nor will any of us mortals be final judge.

AS ONE OF HIS LAST OFFICIAL ACTS, President Nixon did veto the appropriations bill for Agriculture and Environmental and Consumer Protection because the bill exceeded by some \$540 million his budgetary request. I had voted for this bill, although I had opposed spending money on food stamps for strikers, estimated by some at \$234 million annually, and I would have preferred reductions in other unnecessary areas in the non-agricultural portions of this bill. Funds for water and power improvement, conservation and rural development are among the items in this bill which I believe are virtually important, and I shall work for a substitute measure which still provides the vital assistance to rural America which is so necessary.

DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME is the subject of House Commerce subcommittee hearings which open Monday. The subcommittee will have under consideration my bill to abolish Daylight Savings Time as well as other proposals from other members.

Last year the Congress passed a 2-year nationwide full-time Daylight Savings Time law in hopes of saving energy. The Department of Transportation has reported that the energy saved by DST last winter amounted to only one-half of one percent. I had suspected such a negligible saving and had opposed the law because I felt it presented a danger to children going to school in the dark. Now the Transportation Department is urging that winter-time Daylight Savings Time be ended.

The Congress will have to act before November if we are to avoid another winter of Daylight Savings Time. I am encouraged that this week's hearings have been called and I am urging the abolishment of Daylight Savings Time.

THE CAMPAIGN FINANCING REFORM BILL was carefully orchestrated in the House last week by the leadership of the Democrat majority. At the onset of the House debate, the minority attempted to open up the rule under which the bill was being considered so that any and all proposals could be considered by the full body. The majority leadership had brought the measure to the Chamber under a restricted rule in which only amendments already ap-

proved by the Democrat leadership could be considered by the whole House. The effort to open the rule failed, 219 to 190, on a nearly straight party-line vote.

I supported reasonable reform in campaign financing practices, but opposed public funding of political candidates. In my opinion, political campaigning is not a valid use of taxpayer funds. Political candidates should not depend upon a few very large contributions, but the desirable alternative is a sufficient number of small contributions to provide the desired independence. People should support the candidates of their choice with small contributions as well as votes, but campaign funds should not be taken out of the national treasury.

My view prevailed on the financing of Congressional and Senate candidates and the taxpayers will not share this burden. But public financing was voted for Presidential campaigns. Under the bill passed by the House, each political nominating convention will get a \$2 million subsidy and each party's Presidential candidate in the general election will receive public financing through the check-off provision on income tax forms.

THIS PAST WEEK the Congress took a number of votes. Here is a synopsis of my votes on major issues (and how the House voted):

—Opposed reduction of defense spending by \$2.5 billion (rejected, 178-216).

—Opposed reduction of defense research and development by \$169.5 million (rejected, 69-328).

—Supported improvement in veterans home loan programs (agreed to, 341-0).

—Opposed funding denial for our missile defense system (rejected, 182-219).

—Supported comprehensive review of our national security and international policies regarding chemical warfare (agreed to, 315-70).

—Supported effort to lower campaign expenditure limits by \$34,500 (rejected, 187-223).

—Supported effort to lower campaign expenditure limits by \$15,000 (agreed to, 240-175).

—Supported effort to bar public financing of Presidential nominating conventions (rejected, 205-206).

—Opposed Federal Election Campaign Financing Act containing public funding provisions (passed, 335-48).

—Supported National Health Service Corps Scholarship Act providing scholarship and loan assistance to medical and nursing students in exchange for agreement to a period of service in the National Health Service Corps in areas designated as

medically under-served (passed 371-9).

State Capitol Highlights and Sidelights

By BILL BOYKIN

Views of citizens on how to save current assets of the Texas coast while permitting its orderly economic development are being sampled in a series of public hearings.

Hearings are a major initial step in development of a Coastal Zone Management Plan.

More than 150 representatives of business, labor, agriculture, industry and environmental groups outlined expectations for the plan at a workshop here last week.

Need for a balance between economic development and protection of natural resources emerged as the key element for the CZM plan.

CZM is concerned with economic development, urban population growth, water supply, local control, residential and resort home development and power plant siting.

Hearings are slated for August 13 in Harlingen, August 28 in Corpus Christi, September 5 in Victoria, September 12 in Beaumont, September 23 in Houston, September 24 in Galveston and September 27 in Austin.

The technical phase of the program starting in the fall will seek to arrive at estimates of demands on coastal resources, assess capability of resources to support the demands and to evaluate possible management mechanism.

After more hearings in 1975 and 1976, final recommendations resulting from the plan will be made to the legislature in September, 1976.

DPS CHECK ASKED — Gov. Dolph Briscoe asked a full report on intelligence activities of the Department of Public Safety.

Briscoe said he would not rule out a separate citizens committee inquiry into DPS surveillance of individuals, but he will look at a DPS report before asking any further probe.

Surveillance activities of DPS came under critical scrutiny due to an agent's report on Robert W. Pomeroy, who led a citizens' group opposing a nuclear power plant near Fort Worth.

DPS Director Wilson Speir has apologized for the Pomeroy report, and noted that it was never made a part of DPS per-

manent files since Pomeroy was not engaged in illegal activity.

Meanwhile, the state Senate's Jurisprudence Committee will have a select sub-committee headed by Sen. Oscar Mauzy of Dallas checking into the Pomeroy case and, generally, into invasion of privacy issues.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. John Hill held the state Office of Traffic Safety isn't authorized to sell T-shirt with a "drive friendly" "logo" to finance a traffic safety program.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

Willacy County cannot use federal revenue sharing funds to support its hospital district or a non-profit clinic for low-income residents.

Texas Tech University can purchase group term life insurance from mutual companies for its faculty and staff.

Blood donors over 18 are entitled to the same compensation as those over 21, regardless of a state statute.

Parttime employment as social workers is not prohibited under the dual employment prohibition of Texas law.

A statute exempting from forced sale for taxes homesteads of persons over 65 is constitutional.

A county may locate its juvenile detention facility in the same building as its county jail, as long as juvenile and adult offenders do not come in contact with each other.

A district judge may assess as court costs reasonable investigators' fees for social studies called for in the family code.

APPOINTMENTS — Dr. Hugh Meredith has been named president of Sul Ross State University, effective September 1.

Kenneth Decker has been promoted to agent-in-charge of the 122-member DPA narcotics service, and Benny C. Boyd is assistant agent-in-charge.

Robert G. Welsh of Corpus Christi will succeed J. C. Roberts as Texas Highway Department district engineer in Abilene.

Rights Commission adopted a final determination of water rights in the Cibolo Creek Watershed of San Antonio River Basin.

The area was the first in the state to receive a complete adjudication of water rights under the 1967 Water Rights Adjudication Act.

The determination and the entire record of the proceedings will be filed in district court in San Antonio. The watershed contains parts of Kendall, Bexar and Karnes Counties.

PRISON PLAN CARRIED OUT — Agreed — on procedures were

used to handle the Fred Gomez Carrasco siege at Huntsville prison, according to Governor Briscoe.

Briscoe said a variety of contingency plans had been approved for any emergency at the prison.

He said he is convinced that under the circumstances Department of Corrections Director W. J. Estelle Jr. "did all that was humanly possible to protect the lives of hostages and at the same time, (to) protect the people of the State of Texas."

DPS named Ranger Capt. J. F. "Pete" Rogers to investigate how guns and ammunition were slipped into the prison to Carrasco.

A Walker County grand jury is also investigating the incident, in which Carrasco, another inmate and two women hostages were slain during a break-out attempt after the longest prison revolt of its kind in U. S. history.

SHORT SNORTS

Nearly 1.1 million Texans — 9.14 per cent of the state's population — received food stamps with a total value of \$35.1 million in May, Welfare Commissioner Raymond Vowell reported.

The Texas Folklife Festival is scheduled in San Antonio September 12-15 at the Institute of Texan Cultures.

Eleven Jewish delegates filed a federal court suit to force recess of the September 17 State Democratic Convention which falls on Rosh Hashana, a high Jewish holy day.

Texas truck and bus owners are getting calls from Internal Revenue Service on the highway use tax due August 31.

Business activity in the state reached new record levels during the first half of 1974.

Revenue from cigarette taxes increased nearly \$2 million from July 1973 to July 1974 — to \$22.5 million for the month.

Water districts, under a new order of Texas Water Rights Commission, will be allowed to raise interest rates on bond issues as long as the action doesn't affect the overall amount of the issue or raise the district's tax rate.

Texas Manufacturers Association recommended changes in legislation to enable the state to administer and enforce its own occupational safety and health program.
